Shirley was elected to the position in 1981, and has held the office, running unopposed since then. It was when she decided to retire in the spring of 2012, that the job of collecting taxes was shifted to the county.

Shirley also began collecting the Maitland residents' water bills during her 32 year tenure, a job which she is presently still doing.

"I guess I was in it for the long haul," stated Shirley about her 32 years as tax collector. Shirley is still glad to be able to assist the city in that capacity. Hours reduced at rural post offices

Beginning Monday, January 14, two area rural post offices implemented reduced postal office hours at their facilities. In May, 2012, after months of angst and outrage by citizens all across America, the U.S. Postal Service (USPS) announced that 3,700 post offices that were targeted for closing would remain open.

Instead, the USPS planned to reduce the hours of operation at 13,000 rural post offices from a full eight-hour day to between two and six open hours per day, a move that the struggling mail service claimed would save about \$500 million per year.

One of those rural offices affected is the Graham, MO, Post Office at 412 E. Jackson Street. The new reduced hours of operation will be Monday through Friday from 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m., and on Saturday from 12:00

The Skidmore, MO, Post Office at 305 E. Elm Street will also reduce the hours at its office. The new reduced hours of operation will be Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m., and on Saturday from 10:30 a.m. to 11:15 a.m.

At this time, the Maitland, MO, Post Office will not be changing its hours of operation.

The U.S. Postal Service originally floated the idea of closing thousands of rural post offices to save money and began sending out surveys and holding community town hall meetings to get feedback. The Craig, MO, Post Office held its meeting back in November. Following the results, effective Saturday, February 23, the hours of operation for the Craig Post Office will be Monday through Friday from 7:30 to 11:30 a.m., and Saturdays from 7:30 a.m. to 9:30 a.m.





Influenza activity minimal throughout the communities

Influenza activity, while not rampant locally, is likely to continue to rise in the surrounding communities as the influenza season, February and March, approaches.

The Holt County Health Department in Oregon, MO, has been busy taking calls and dispensing flu shots until Tuesday, January 15, when their last adult vaccination was given. The health op department does have a couple children's vaccinations left, but are encouraging adults to seek vaccinations from other sources should they be in need.

The three Holt County schools report cases of the flu to be within the normal limits. School nurse, Susan Lentz, stated, "Knock on wood, all three schools are okay right now. There is no mass influenza at this time."

> "First and foremost, people need to use careful hand cleansing, and get the flu shot," stated Holt County Health Department Nurse Brenda Nelson. "They also need to realize the severity of the flu and if they are sick, they need to stay home."

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

Wilber Newton information

In late 2012, questions were asked in this column about Wilber Newton, a Mound City soldier who had died at Pearl Harbor. The society had been contacted by a forensic genealogy service in Pearland, TX, searching for family members to obtain DNA to bring the remains home for burial. News clippings and obits in society files provided limited information about his sisters. Vicki Book, Holt County Clerk, found the marriage record of one sister. Priscilla Griffith knew where the family plot was at Mt. Hope Cemetery where a memorial stone for him had been placed by his family. All this information was sent to the genealogist and a research donation to the society was received.

Thanks to Albert Tebbe, who recently sent a note that he remembered about 22 years ago, while employed at the Mound City News, an inquiry was sent to the paper asking about relatives of Newton. It was around the time of the anniversary of Pearl Harbor and then there were more folks in Mound City who did remember the family. Many remembered Newton's father was a photographer. Albert found there were two sisters and he did find an obituary for one of them; but, it was difficult to find if any family members survived. The society still welcomes additional information anyone might have.

Secretarial Disaster Declaration designates Holt County as a contiguous natural disaster area

The Secretary of Agriculture designated 31 Missouri counties as primary agricultural natural disaster areas making some farmers and other agricultural producers in the counties eligible for low-interest emergency loans from USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA), in addition to other disaster programs.

The following counties were designated as primary natural disaster areas due to damages and losses caused by drought which occurred November 1, 2012, and continuing. Those counties are: Andrew, Atchison, Audrain, Bates, Caldwell, Callaway, Clinton, Cole, Cooper, Daviess, DeKalb, Dunklin, Gentry, Grundy, Harrison, Henry, Lafayette, Lincoln, Linn, Livingston, Moniteau, Monroe, Montgomery, Morgan, Nodaway, Pettis, Pike, Ralls, Ray, Warren and Worth.

There are 32 counties that were designated as contiguous natural disaster areas due to damages and losses continuing.

Producers in contiguous counties may also be eligible for programs based on this designation. 

Mound City City council discusses 9-1-1 issues at meeting

Jonathan Miller, The Klub: Sunday Liquor License -Mayor Krueger reported Jonathan Miller will not be present, but is requesting approval for sale of alcohol on Sundays at The Klub. City ordinances and state statutes already permit liquor by the drink license holders to sell liquor on certain Sundays throughout the year including January 1st, July 4th, December 31st, when they fall on a Sunday, the Sundays before Memorial Day and Labor Day, and Super Bowl Sunday. The Klub will not need a special Sunday sales license if these are the only Sundays it wants to sell liquor.

Old Business

Bids: Sale of Property at 501 State Street: Mayor Krueger opened the two bids received for the property at 501 State Street as follows: Justin Courtney bid \$8,001 and Mitchell and Donna Corbin bid \$5,685. The city has around \$34,000 in expenses on the property for demolition, etc. After discussion, Alderman Biermann moved to accept the bid of \$8,001 submitted by Justin Courtney, Krueger seconded. Motion approved.

Bids: Sale of Property at 1012 Mill Street: Only one bid of \$500 was received for the property at 1012 Mill Street. The clerk reported the city has around \$3,400 in expenses against this property. After discussion, Alderman Biermann moved to accept the bid of \$500 submitted by Jason and Kerri Acton, Heck seconded. Motion approved. Alderman Krueger moved to approve release of all Special Tax Bills on the property at 1012 Mill Street, Heck seconded. Approved unanimously. Bids: Comprehensive Municipal Insurance: The only response received from the call for bids is from MIRMA. Its rate per \$100 of payroll is recalculated each May so it cannot provide an exact assessment, but estimates the city's annual assessment should be approximately \$32,541 based upon 2012 salaries and the current rate per \$100 of payroll. Alderman Gibson moved to accept MIRMA's proposal, Biermann seconded. Approved unanimously. Lodging Tax: Mayor Krueger reported that State Representative Mike Thomson has filed HB 140 which, if approved, will permit Mound City to implement a 5% lodging tax for tourism purposes. If the legislation is approved by the state, then the issue would have to be submitted to a vote of the citizens. Mayor Krueger would like to see the funds used to fund a position to promote tourism and economic development. Other uses were also discussed.

Alderman placed on its second reading of Sidewalks when Removed: City Attorney Brian Tubbs presented sample language for amending the building ital Radios from Haug Comand zoning codes to require construction of sidewalks in new subdivisions and repair of unsafe sidewalks. Council members will review the information and see if there are specifics they do or do not want to include. The changes would have to go before the planning commission and a public hearing would be required. The council feels the sidewalks should be 5' wide and also suggests including sidewalk requirements for any building permit for a new home constructed on an existing lot.

New Business

Project/Grant: placement The Northwest Missouri Regional Council of Governments is requesting more information for the grant application to replace the bridge across Davis Creek at the south end of State Street. The city filed a Notice of Intent to apply for Hazardous Mitigation funds in November, 2011. Clerk Smith contacted Bob Burnett, Snyder & Associates, for assistance in updating the cost estimate, etc. Burnett reported that the price went up approximately \$23,000, bringing the estimated total to \$345,000 with the city's 25% share being approximately \$86,000. Also requested is historical information on damages to the bridge due to flooding events for the benefit cost analysis.

Misc.: Mayor Krueger recently talked with a representative from Facility Dude, a company that helps find where a facility is losing money through utilities. The company emailed information to City Hall and also offered web demonstrations.



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Missouri's corn and ethanol industries drive rural economy

Missouri's corn and ethanol industries are adding to the state's bottom line according to a study released by the Missouri Corn Growers' Association (MCGA) and Missouri Corn Merchandising Council (MCMC). • \$ 2.2 billion paid in local, state and federal taxes "This is truly a success story

for agriculture and the state of Missouri," noted MCGA

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President Rob Korff, a corn farmer from Norborne, MO. "The state's ethanol industry was built on the faith and dedication of hardworking farm families and support from state leaders."

This dedication by farm families and commitment from the state of Missouri have resulted in big dividends for Missourians. During the 12-year period, the ethanol industry yielded a 6:1 return, a net value of over \$600 million, on the state's investment.

According to the study, Missouri's six majority farmerowned ethanol plants alone generated the following direct and indirect benefits to the state

• \$734 million in economic value

• \$416 million in labor income • \$174 million in local, state

and federal taxes

Annually, Missouri's ethanol industry utilizes nearly 100 million bushels of corn to produce nearly 300 million gallons of ethanol and 825,000 tons of distillers' grains, a high protein livestock feed. In 2011, Missouri corn production added over \$1 billion in value to the state's economy and together the two industries supported 67,000 jobs.
