





It was about 9:30 p.m. at a Love's Truck Stop in Aurora. By the time Karra and her friend arrived at the hospital, Donnie was ready to be released! MRI's, x-rays and other testing had miraculously indicated no broken bones or other significant problems. Donnie had escaped being ran over by a truck with only scrapes and bruises! "I remember thinking, 'Are you sure I can go home? I've just been run over by a truck'," Donnie stated.

Donnie is staying around home these days, recuperating from the bumpy ride, and completing more tests to ensure no back problems, as well as just being thankful.

> Here's how to make your own Sappy Tree. Ingredients for the healthy snack include: 1 small apple, 1 stalk of celery, 1/4 c. peanut butter, honey and toothpicks.

Step 1: Make a small platdish looks like a palm tree form of peanut butter (about 2 tablespoons), flatten out to 1/4" thick and put in freezer to harden some.

> Step 2: Core apple and slice thinly (about 1/4" thick).

Step 3: Take 1 slice of apple and stick 3 toothpicks through it horizontally to make a crisscross shape.



National Fire Prevention Week 2011 focuses on protecting families

Stresses steps that can be taken to prevent fires in the home along with planning how families would escape home fires

With Fire Prevention Week 2011 and the home heating season approaching, State Fire Marshal Randy Cole urges Missourians to remember the importance of preventing fires in the home and practicing a fire escape plan with their families.

Taking proactive steps to prevent a fire in advance and developing and practicing a fire escape plan are two critical steps that vou can take to protect your family," said State Fire Marshal Cole. "Smoke and fires can spread very quickly. Practicing an evacuation plan with your family can save critical seconds and could save your loved ones from injury or death."

Fire Prevention Week, Sunday through Saturday, October 9-15, 2011, is recognized annually by the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) and fire departments and safety agencies across the country. This year's campaign, "Protect Your Family from Fire", encourages everyone to not only plan an effective fire escape route for their families, but also to practice these routes at least twice a

According to the NFPA, in 2009, across the U.S., one home structure fire was reported every 87 seconds and on average seven people died in home fires every day. An NFPA survey also revealed that only one in three American households have developed and practiced a fire evacuation plan.

Cole offered these fire preven-

Never leave the kitchen while

cooking. Turn off the stove if you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time.

- · Keep anything that can burn at least three feet away from heating equipment, like the furnace, fireplace, wood stove, or portable space heater.
- · Have a three-foot "kid-free zone" around fireplaces, wood stoves and space heaters.
- · Replace or repair damaged or loose electrical cords.
- If you smoke, smoke outside.
- Blow out all candles when you leave the room or go to bed. Avoid the use of candles in the bedroom and other areas where people may fall asleep.

The following tips will help keep your family safe if there is a fire in vour home: Install smoke alarms inside

- each bedroom, outside each sleeping area, and on every level of the home (including the basement).
- Interconnect all smoke alarms in the home so when one sounds, they all sound.
- Test smoke alarms at least monthly and replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old or sooner if they do not respond when tested.
- Make sure everyone in your home knows how to respond if the smoke alarm sounds.
- Pull together everyone in your household and make a plan. Walk through your home and inspect all possible ways out. Households with children should consider drawing a floor plan of your home, marking two ways out of each room, including windows and doors.

Home fires: are you prepared?

Everyone expects to feel safe and secure inside their homes, and that includes fire safety. Ev- heaters, furnaces, radiators, boilery year, everyone should take a few minutes to make their homes safer from fires.

Home Fire Causes: Cooking and Home Heating

Cooking is the biggest single cause, accounting for almost a quarter of all residential fires. Heating-related fires came in second and, if the fires that were set deliberately are excluded, then electricity comes in third.

House fires happen most frequently in the dead of winter -December and January - which goes along with cooking and heating being the most common causes. Decorating for the holidays also contributes.

A Christmas tree that catches fire can engulf a small living room in flames in less than a minute. Menorahs are also dangerous because of the candles. Candles are to blame for 1 in 20 home fires and cause nearly twice as many fires in December than any other month. Nearly 20% of candle fires are from unattended candles.

Home Fire Safety Tips

Protecting your home and family from fire requires planning and prudence. Here are five easy steps to make your home safer:

Install smoke alarms in hallways and in each bedroom. Many states require smoke alarms before you can sell a home, so it is quite likely you already have them. Push the test button and make sure your smoke alarms still work.

Change the batteries at least once a year. A good rule of thumb is to change the batteries when you change your clocks back to standard time from daylight savings.

Keep clutter away from clothes dryers, heaters, water ers, stoves and ovens. Clean lint regularly from around clothes dryers -- don't forget the inside of the vent hose.

Draw up an escape plan in case of fire. Make sure there are two exits from every room. If you have a multi-story home, put fire ladders in each room above ground level.

Practice evacuating with the family at least twice a year. A perfect time to practice evacuating is when you're changing the batteries and testing the smoke alarms. Pick a spot outside where the entire family should meet. That way, if someone is missing, you can tell the fire de-

partment when they respond. Put a fire extinguisher in the kitchen and the laundry room. Make sure the extinguisher is capable of putting out all three types of fires. Learn how to use the fire extinguisher before you need it.

Some fires can be easily extinguished even without an extinguisher if you know how. Grease fires, for example, can often be put out by simply covering them.

Use caution when burning candles. Better yet, toss out all your candles. For emergency light during power failures, use flashlights or battery-powered lanterns.

Besides these steps, clean your fireplace chimney at least once a year if you have one. Use caution and common sense when decorating for the holidays. Avoid using real Christmas trees or candles in Christmas decorating, and never use the two together. Don't burn wrapping paper in the fireplace and skip the fireworks on New Year's Eve.





The Missouri Department of Natural Resources has issued a boil water order for the VILLAGE OF BIG LAKE, Public Water System ID # MO 1011182. The water system is located in Holt County, Missouri. Department officials declared the boil order on October 7, 2011. The Village of Big Lake was evacuated due to flooding, and water service had to be shut down to the area on June 19, 2011, due to a water main break. Because there was a complete loss of water pressure in the drinking water lines, floodwaters have a high potential to enter the drinking water lines.

The boil order will remain in effect for all of the Village of Big Lake until water distribution lines can be repaired, flushed, disinfected, and two consecutive days of water samples indicate that contamination is not present. Mayor Russell called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. and led the Pledge of Allegiance. Those present were Larry Russell, Jim Krueger, Jason Biermann, Kristine Gibson, Robert Heck, City Clerk Patsy Smith, City Collector Kelly Miller, Sewer Superintendent Kelly Graves, Police Chief John Panning, City Attorney Brian Tubbs, Building Inspector Chris Krueger, Danny and Beverly Diggs, Richard Frederick, Jeff Arp and Ray Lentz.

<u>Minutes</u>

There being no additions, deletions or corrections, Alderman Krueger moved to waive the reading of the minutes from the Tuesday, September 20, 2011, regular meeting and approve them as presented, Gibson seconded. Approved unanimously.

Presentations/Guests

Danny Diggs: Request No Parking on Parts of 8th and Railroad Streets – Mr. Diggs reported problems with rock trucks and 18-wheelers parking along 8th Street and Railroad Street close to the Super 8. They park in front of the exit drive at the new car wash on Railroad St., drive over a shallow tube on the south side of 8th Street and, at times, there is only one-lane traffic. Danny requested the city designate the streets as No Truck Parking. Truck parking is already prohibited on 8th Street between Railroad and Nebraska Streets, but there is only one sign posted between State and Railroad streets. Council members agreed to place additional signs along 8th Street and to draft an ordinance prohibiting truck 7th and 8th streets.

molish his vacant house at 1012 Mill. He presented a contractor's quote for repair/replacement of the roof, which was only one of the items cited as a violation of the dangerous building code, and would like to be given until December 1 to get the roof repaired. He feels he has made adequate repairs to the porch. The structure was first inspected in December, 2010, and the deadline for compliance with the Board of Code Appeals order to repair or demolish was August 28, 2011. The council was concerned that just replacing the roof does not negate other problems that make the structure dangerous. After much discussion, council members asked Building Inspector Chris Krueger to reexamine the house within the next 10 days and report what deficiencies would need to be corrected so that it is no longer dangerous.

Jeff Arp & Ray Lentz, MIR-MA: Claims/Coverage and Award of Grant - Jeff Arp presented a plaque to Police Chief John Panning awarding a grant of \$901 to the police department for purchase of two wearable cameras.

Ray Lentz discussed a recent sewer backup claim. Mr. Lentz stated MIRMA denied the homeowner's claim, but didn't deny coverage for the city. There is a distinction between denying liability versus coverage. He said the city was not at fault and therefore not legally liable for damages. If the homeowner had filed a lawsuit, MIRMA would have provided coverage and stood behind the city and if a court said the damages had to be paid then MIRMA would have paid.

Mayor Russell discussed recommendations

during evaluations that can affect premiums. He questioned whether it costs the city more to meet the recommendations than the savings realized in premiums. Russell feels city officials have become paranoid with trying to meet all the recommendations in order to gather points. Mr. Lentz stated the inspections and recommendations are a service MIRMA provides for loss control, but even if the city doesn't do them it still has coverage. The city's evaluation would have to drop to 60% for two years before MIRMA would drop coverage. The premium is based on payroll and debits/credits are given for loss (claims) experience and loss prevention score. Mr. Arp agreed the city can choose what loss prevention recommendations and practices it wants to do.

Council members felt the information provided helps them better understand MIRMA's position and city liability for sewer backup claims. Mayor Russell again stressed that the council's recent decision to pay for damages is a one-time thing prepared to implement the and the city will not pay any changes. other such claims.

FEMA registration deadline extended to November 10

At the request of Missouri tended the deadline to submit Gov. Jay Nixon, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has extended the deadline for renters, homeowners and business owners who suffered damage from flooding to register for state and federal disaster assistance. Residents of the following six Missouri counties are eligible to register for disaster assistance: Andrew, Atchison, Buchanan, Holt, Lafayette, and Platte.

The new deadline is Thursday, November 10, 2011.

"Please use the extended deadline to settle any outstanding insurance claims and get that information to FEMA," FEMA Federal Coordinating Officer Mike Karl said. "We also request that those who have registered please contact FEMA with address changes if they have relocated since regis-

Registration may be completed online at www.Disas ter-Assistance.gov, by Smartphone through m.FEMA.gov, or by calling FEMA's toll-free regis tration line at 1-800-621-FEMA (3362). If the applicant has a speech disability or hearing loss and uses a TTY, call 1-800-462-7585 directly; if the applicant uses 711 or Video Relay Service (VRS), call 1-800-621-3362. Multi-language assistance is available. Telephone registration is available daily from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m., until further notice. Assistance to individuals can include grants to help pay for temporary housing needs, essential home repairs and other serious disaster-related expenses not covered by insurance or other sources.

Applicants are reminded to keep their FEMA information updated, but not to register twice. Duplicate registrations will delay processing an appli-

The U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) also ex-

disaster loan applications to November 10, 2011. SBA offers low-interest federal disaster loans to homeowners, renters, businesses of all sizes and private, nonprofit organizations to help pay for, repair or replace disaster damaged property. Loan amounts for disaster damaged property may be up to \$200,000 for a primary residence, \$40,000 for personal property and \$2 million for business assets. Interest rates may be as low as 2.688 percent for homeowners and renters, 3 percent for nonprofit organizations and 4 percent for businesses.

Homeowners and renters should submit their SBA disaster loan application, even if they are not sure if they will need or want a loan. If SBA cannot approve an application, in most cases the applicant is referred to FEMA's Other Needs Assistance (ONA) program for possible additional assistance.

Small businesses and most private, nonprofit organizations may apply for SBA loans of up to \$2 million to help meet disaster caused working capital needs. These working capital loans are available regardless of whether the business suffered any property damage.

SBA representatives are at the Disaster Recovery Centers to issue loan applications, answer questions about SBA's disaster loan program, explain the application process, and help each individual complete their application.
