## FOOTBALL PROGRAM TO BE INDUCTED INTO THE MISSOURI SPORTS HALL OF FAME

The Mound City 8-man football program was notified of its forthcoming induction into the Missouri Sports Hall of Fame at a press conference on Tuesday, October 11, at the Holiday Inn Riverfront in St. Joseph, MO. The Missouri State Hall of Fame announced its Inaugural Satellite Enshrinement Class of seven individuals and one program during the press conference. This is the first time that inductees will be inducted at a location away from the Hall of Fame's home base in Springfield, MO.

Jerald Andrews, executive director of the Missouri State Hall of Fame, recapped the inception and subsequent induction process. The Hall of Fame is 'taking the show on the road' in order to more aggressively induct deserving candidates into the program and to get the word out about the Hall of Fame that is located in Springfield. Hillyard, Inc., is the presenting sponsor of the event; and serving as an associate sponsor is the St. Joseph Convention & Visitors' Bureau.

An enshrinement reception, ceremony and banquet will be held at the Holiday Inn Riverfront on Wednesday, November 30, beginning at 5:30 p.m. to make the inductions. The Mound City Football Program, being considered an 8-man powerhouse, won state titles 5 of the last 6 years, including the last 3 years straight. In addition to Mound City's program, the following individuals will be inducted: Doug Minnis of St. Joseph, first baseball coach of Missouri Western;

Nan Carter of Trenton, MO, 45-year career in women's softball; Richard Flanagan of Maryville, MO, 22-year career as coach and athletic director for Northwest Missouri State University; Vic Eaton of Savannah, MO, University of Missouri quarterback and punter; Harold "Doc" Childress of St. Joseph, 17 years in sporting clays, national champion, and placed in the world championships; Herb Webster of Kearney, MO, 45th year of coaching with most wins in Missouri history in girls' basketball; and Julius Hochman of St. Joseph, who pioneered youth baseball in St. Joseph.

Mound City Superintendent Ken Eaton attended the press conference as did the majority of the other inductees. "To recognize a program where kids, coaches, parents and the community just want to work hard to excel is a humbling thing," stated Eaton. "Mound City R-2 is happy to have been chosen to be part of the Missouri Sports Hall of Fame."

## Water for everyone

### Boil order in effect for residents

The Missouri Department of Natural Resources issued a boil order on Friday, October 7, for residents of the Village of Big Lake, MO. The boil order will remain in effect for all of the village until water distribution lines can be repaired, flushed, and disinfected; and two consecutive days of water samples indicate that contamination is not present.

The boil order is great reprieve in what it means residents. Every full/part-time resident, who has been out of their home for over 100 days, now has water to begin the clean-up process. Floodwaters that ravaged through the Big Lake and Corning, MO, areas in June have now subsided and left quite a devastating mark on the area. Having water, albeit 'contaminated', is still a promising thing for residents in those areas.

As of press time, the Public Water Supply District #1 of Holt County was working to reestablish water supply to residents of Fortescue, MO, Bigelow, MO, Corning, MO, and its rural customers in those areas who have been without water since the floodwaters took out water lines in July. Repairs, maintenance, flushing and disinfecting were being done this week in order to restore the water supply to customers in those areas.

"We know people are anxious to get back into their properties. It's a work in progress," stated Beth Cas-

tillo, manager of Water Supply District #1. "I sent cards out to each of our customers informing them not to drink the water yet. Precautionary measures need to be taken until such time as we inform them that the water is fine to drink."

Residents of Big Lake, Corning, Fortescue, Bigelow and rural customers in those areas should observe these precautions:

- Boil water vigorously for at least 3 minutes prior to use for cooking or drinking.
- Disinfect food contact surfaces (dishes) by immersing them for at least 1 minute in clean tap water that contains 1 tsp. of unscented household bleach per gallon of water.
- Dispose of ice cubes and remake with water that has been boiled.
- Continue boiling all water that is to be used for cooking and drinking until the cause of the contamination has been found and corrected.
- Water used for bathing does not need to be boiled.

## A ride to remember

### Mound City man is ran over by an 18-wheeler

Saturday night, September 10, started out like any other night for Donnie Smith of Mound City, MO. He was on his normal Swift trucking run to Aurora, NE, when a series of amazing events unfolded. Donnie was hit and ran over by an 18-wheeler.

It was about 9:30 p.m. at a Love's Truck Stop in Aurora. Donnie, and another truck driver coming from the west, were planning to make the swap of east/west trucks and return home, finishing their routes. Donnie was walking through the parking lot. He had noticed a truck pulling off the highway. Suddenly, the thought rushed through his mind that 'that truck sounds close'. Donnie turned around to look, and the truck driver, who had decided to make a sudden turn into the pump area, hadn't seen Donnie. Before Donnie could get away, the truck's front bumper caught him at the knees. He tried to get away, but the gas tank caught him next and pushed him under the turning truck. As Donnie was being tossed around under the truck he remembers praying, "God, I don't want to go like this. I don't want my wife and daughter to see me like this."

Donnie closed his eyes, because he knew the tires had to be coming. He remembers his head catching and being jerked downward on something that propelled him head over heels. He opened his eyes and saw the bottom of the trailer. He knew he had to get to the center to be able to get under the tire axles. When Donnie opened his eyes again, his head was just a foot away from the tire. The truck had finally come to a stop at the fuel pump. Donnie crawled out from under

the truck and started yelling for help.

Donnie recalls lying there and looking up at the stars and thanking God. "I knew I wasn't the author of that ride," stated Donnie. "I was thankful that God had saved my life."

The truck driver called 911 and, soon, Donnie was being transported to the hospital. Meanwhile, Karra, Donnie's wife, was enjoying the Holt County Autumn Festival in Oregon, MO, with their daughter, Katie. She saw the customary 'I'm headed home' call coming in from Donnie's phone and handed it to her friend to say hi. Instead of Donnie, it was the paramedics, who were in the ambulance. Karra's friend immediately responded by helping Karra drive what ended up taking 6 hours (with all the detours) to the hospital.

By the time Karra and her friend arrived at the hospital, Donnie was ready to be released! MRI's, x-rays and other testing had miraculously indicated no broken bones or other significant problems. Donnie had escaped being ran over by a truck with only scrapes and bruises! "I remember thinking, 'Are you sure I can go home? I've just been run over by a truck'," Donnie stated.

Donnie is staying around home these days, recuperating from the bumpy ride, and completing more tests to ensure no back problems, as well as just being thankful.

Donnie stated, "Every breath we take, every day we live, every moment we have with family and friends are gifts from God, and I know, firsthand, not to take those gifts for granted - no one should."

# Young food enthusiast published

James Wheeler, 12 year-old son of Gary and Joy Wheeler of Mound City, MO, had his recipe for Sappy Trees (Sticky Palms) published in the October, 2011, issue of *Today's Farmer*.

James, who loves to be in the kitchen, developed the recipe for a healthy snack last year, after his grandmother had him make 'ants on a log'. Sappy Trees are not only what he calls healthy snacks, but they also serve as eye appealing treats. Once prepared, the dish looks like a palm tree that can be eaten.

In May, James' grandmother, Marie Wheeler, who also lives in Mound City, saw that snacks were the topics for recipes to be published in the October issue of *Today's Farmer*. She sent in James' recipe. The recipe had to be tested by a panel before being published. James and his grandmother were elated when they saw the recipe published in the October issue. James will be receiving a \$10 prize for getting published.

Marie commented on James' enthusiasm, "He loves to be in the kitchen and make and design food. He creates a dish and gives it a name."

James' cooking started when he had an idea for a restaurant. He has created three original recipes thus far. One of the recipes took three months to develop.

Thinking and trial and error were important in perfecting his "Sunrise-sundown Platter", the perfect blend of breakfast and dinner foods. "The hardest part is getting them to taste good," remarked James. "It's convenient when it tastes good the first time."

Here's how to make your own Sappy Tree. Ingredients for the healthy snack include: 1 small apple, 1 stalk of celery, 1/4 c. peanut butter, honey and toothpicks.

Step 1: Make a small platform of peanut butter (about 2 tablespoons), flatten out to 1/4" thick and put in freezer to harden some.

Step 2: Core apple and slice thinly (about 1/4" thick).

Step 3: Take 1 slice of apple and stick 3 toothpicks through it horizontally to make a crisscross shape.

Step 4: Cut 3 more apple slices in half and slide each half piece carefully onto the end of each toothpick sticking through the first apple slice to make the top of the palm tree.

Step 5: Turn the apple top upside-down and insert another toothpick carefully into the middle of the first apple slice.

Step 6: Wash 1 stalk of celery and cut into two 4" long pieces. Drizzle a tiny amount of honey down the center of each pice.

Step 7: Fill each celery stalk to the brim with peanut butter, but do not over-

flow.

Step 8: Join the 2 stalks of celery together, peanut butter sides touching. Wipe off any excess peanut butter.

Step 9: Stick the joined celery stalks into the chilled peanut butter platform from step 1 and top with 1 teaspoon of peanut butter.

Step 10: Insert the apple top from step 5 into the peanut butter on top of the celery stalks, toothpick side down.

Step 11: Eat your Sappy Tree. Then wash your sticky palms.

## National Fire Prevention Week 2011 focuses on protecting families

*Stresses steps that can be taken to prevent fires in the home along with planning how families would escape home fires*

With Fire Prevention Week 2011 and the home heating season approaching, State Fire Marshal Randy Cole urges Missourians to remember the importance of preventing fires in the home and practicing a fire escape plan with their families.

"Taking proactive steps to prevent a fire in advance and developing and practicing a fire escape plan are two critical steps that you can take to protect your family," said State Fire Marshal Cole. "Smoke and fires can spread very quickly. Practicing an evacuation plan with your family can save critical seconds and could save your loved ones from injury or death."

Fire Prevention Week, Sunday through Saturday, October 9-15, 2011, is recognized annually by the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) and fire departments and safety agencies across the country. This year's campaign, "Protect Your Family from Fire", encourages everyone to not only plan an effective fire escape route for their families, but also to practice these routes at least twice a year.

According to the NFPA, in 2009, across the U.S., one home structure fire was reported every 87 seconds and on average seven people died in home fires every day. An NFPA survey also revealed that only one in three American households have developed and practiced a fire evacuation plan.

Cole offered these fire prevention tips:

- cooking. Turn off the stove if you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time.
  - Keep anything that can burn at least three feet away from heating equipment, like the furnace, fireplace, wood stove, or portable space heater.
  - Have a three-foot "kid-free zone" around fireplaces, wood stoves and space heaters.
  - Replace or repair damaged or loose electrical cords.
  - If you smoke, smoke outside.
  - Blow out all candles when you leave the room or go to bed. Avoid the use of candles in the bedroom and other areas where people may fall asleep.
- The following tips will help keep your family safe if there is a fire in your home:
- Install smoke alarms inside each bedroom, outside each sleeping area, and on every level of the home (including the basement).
  - Interconnect all smoke alarms in the home so when one sounds, they all sound.
  - Test smoke alarms at least monthly and replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old or sooner if they do not respond when tested.
  - Make sure everyone in your home knows how to respond if the smoke alarm sounds.
  - Pull together everyone in your household and make a plan. Walk through your home and inspect all possible ways out. Households with children should consider drawing a floor plan of your home, marking two ways out of each room, including windows and doors.

## Home fires: are you prepared?

Everyone expects to feel safe and secure inside their homes, and that includes fire safety. Every year, everyone should take a few minutes to make their homes safer from fires.

#### Home Fire Causes: Cooking and Home Heating

Cooking is the biggest single cause, accounting for almost a quarter of all residential fires. Heating-related fires came in second and, if the fires that were set deliberately are excluded, then electricity comes in third.

House fires happen most frequently in the dead of winter - December and January - which goes along with cooking and heating being the most common causes. Decorating for the holidays also contributes.

A Christmas tree that catches fire can engulf a small living room in flames in less than a minute. Menorahs are also dangerous because of the candles. Candles are to blame for 1 in 20 home fires and cause nearly twice as many fires in December than any other month. Nearly 20% of candle fires are from unattended candles.

#### Home Fire Safety Tips

Protecting your home and family from fire requires planning and prudence. Here are five easy steps to make your home safer:

Install smoke alarms in hallways and in each bedroom. Many states require smoke alarms before you can sell a home, so it is quite likely you already have them. Push the test button and make sure your smoke alarms still work.

Change the batteries at least once a year. A good rule of thumb is to change the batteries when you change your clocks back to standard time from daylight savings.

Keep clutter away from clothes dryers, heaters, water heaters, furnaces, radiators, boilers, stoves and ovens. Clean lint regularly from around clothes dryers -- don't forget the inside of the vent hose.

Draw up an escape plan in case of fire. Make sure there are two exits from every room. If you have a multi-story home, put fire ladders in each room above ground level.

Practice evacuating with the family at least twice a year. A perfect time to practice evacuating is when you're changing the batteries and testing the smoke alarms. Pick a spot outside where the entire family should meet. That way, if someone is missing, you can tell the fire department when they respond.

Put a fire extinguisher in the kitchen and the laundry room. Make sure the extinguisher is capable of putting out all three types of fires. Learn how to use the fire extinguisher before you need it.

Some fires can be easily extinguished even without an extinguisher if you know how. Grease fires, for example, can often be put out by simply covering them.


Use caution when burning candles. Better yet, toss out all your candles. For emergency light during power failures, use flashlights or battery-powered lanterns.

Besides these steps, clean your fireplace chimney at least once a year if you have one. Use caution and common sense when decorating for the holidays. Avoid using real Christmas trees or candles in Christmas decorating, and never use the two together. Don't burn wrapping paper in the fireplace and skip the fireworks on New Year's Eve.

#### **NOTICE OF BOIL WATER ORDER (ISSUANCE)** **VILLAGE OF BIG LAKE - HOLT COUNTY, MO**

The Missouri Department of Natural Resources has issued a boil water order for the VILLAGE OF BIG LAKE, Public Water System ID # MO 1011182. The water system is located in Holt County, Missouri. Department officials declared the boil order on October 7, 2011. The Village of Big Lake was evacuated due to flooding, and water service had to be shut down to the area on June 19, 2011, due to a water main break. Because there was a complete loss of water pressure in the drinking water lines, floodwaters have a high potential to enter the drinking water lines.

The boil order will remain in effect for all of the Village of Big Lake until water distribution lines can be repaired, flushed, disinfected, and two consecutive days of water samples indicate that contamination is not present. Anyone served by the Village of Big Lake's drinking water system should observe the following precautions:

- Boil water vigorously for at least three minutes prior to use for cooking or drinking.

- Continue boiling all water that is to be used for cooking and drinking until the cause of the contamination has been found and corrected.
- Water used for bathing does not need to be boiled.



# Board of Aldermen minutes

The regular meeting of the Board of Aldermen for the city of Mound City was held on Thursday, October 6, 2011, at the Mound City City Hall. Mayor Russell called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. and led the Pledge of Allegiance. Those present were Larry Russell, Jim Krueger, Jason Biermann, Kristine Gibson, Robert Heck, City Clerk Patsy Smith, City Collector Kelly Miller, Sewer Superintendent Kelly Graves, Police Chief John Panning, City Attorney Brian Tubbs, Building Inspector Chris Krueger, Danny and Beverly Diggs, Richard Frederick, Jeff Arp and Ray Lentz.

**Minutes**  
There being no additions, deletions or corrections, Alderman Krueger moved to waive the reading of the minutes from the Tuesday, September 20, 2011, regular meeting and approve them as presented, Gibson seconded. Approved unanimously.

**Presentations/Guests**  
Danny Diggs: Request No Parking on Parts of 8th and Railroad Streets – Mr. Diggs reported problems with rock trucks and 18-wheelers parking along 8th Street and Railroad Street close to the Super 8. They park in front of the exit drive at the new car wash on Railroad St., drive over a shallow tube on the south side of 8th Street and, at times, there is only one-lane traffic. Danny requested the city designate the streets as No Truck Parking. Truck parking is already prohibited on 8th Street between Railroad and Nebraska Streets, but there is only one sign posted between State and Railroad streets. Council members agreed to place additional signs along 8th Street and to draft an ordinance prohibiting truck parking on Railroad between 7th and 8th streets.

Richard Frederick: Dangerous Building @ 1012 Mill Street – Mr. Frederick addressed the council with concerns about plans to demolish his vacant house at 1012 Mill. He presented a contractor's quote for repair/replacement of the roof, which was only one of the items cited as a violation of the dangerous building code, and would like to be given until December 1 to get the roof repaired. He feels he has made adequate repairs to the porch. The structure was first inspected in December, 2010, and the deadline for compliance with the Board of Code Appeals order to repair or demolish was August 28, 2011. The council was concerned that just replacing the roof does not negate other problems that make the structure dangerous. After much discussion, council members asked Building Inspector Chris Krueger to reexamine the house within the next 10 days and report what deficiencies would need to be corrected so that it is no longer dangerous.

Jeff Arp & Ray Lentz, MIRMA: Claims/Coverage and Award of Grant – Jeff Arp presented a plaque to Police Chief John Panning awarding a grant of \$901 to the police department for purchase of two wearable cameras.

Ray Lentz discussed a recent sewer backup claim. Mr. Lentz stated MIRMA denied the homeowner's claim, but didn't deny coverage for the city. There is a distinction between denying liability versus not at fault and therefore not legally liable for damages. If the homeowner had filed a lawsuit, MIRMA would have provided coverage and stood behind the city and if a court said the damages had to be paid then MIRMA would have paid.

Mayor Russell discussed MIRMA recommendations

and the points system used during evaluations that can affect premiums. He questioned whether it costs the city more to meet the recommendations than the savings realized in premiums. Russell feels city officials have become paranoid with trying to meet all the recommendations in order to gather points. Mr. Lentz stated the inspections and recommendations are a service MIRMA provides for loss control, but even if the city doesn't do them it still has coverage. The city's evaluation would have to drop to 60% for two years before MIRMA would drop coverage. The premium is based on payroll and debits/credits are given for loss (claims) experience and loss prevention score. Mr. Arp agreed the city can choose what loss prevention recommendations and practices it wants to do.

Council members felt the information provided helps them better understand MIRMA's position and city liability for sewer backup claims. Mayor Russell again stressed that the council's recent decision to pay for damages is a one-time thing and the city will not pay any other such claims.

**Old Business**  
M.C. Community Building: Contract to Transfer Property for New Front Entrance – City Attorney Brian Tubbs reviewed a draft contract for conveyance of city property adjacent to the Community Building and stated the council needs to determine a fair market value for the property. The buyer, Mound City Community Center Inc., will be responsible for the land survey and other costs. After discussion of value, Alderman Gibson moved to sell a 5-12 foot wide strip of land adjacent to the west side of the Community Building property to Mound City Community Center Inc. for \$300 for the good of the public health and welfare, Biermann seconded. Approved unanimously. An ordinance will be drafted for the November meeting authorizing the mayor to execute the contract.

Sandbag Removal & Repair of Damaged Concrete – After discussion of whether to rebid repair of the concrete parking lot south of Staples Auto Bath at 417 State Street, Alderman Krueger motioned to let Mr. Staples have the damaged concrete repaired and submit a bill to the city for reimbursement, Biermann seconded. Approved unanimously. City staff and community service workers will remove sandbags surrounding the building at 403 State Street.

**Miscellaneous**  
Chris Krueger reported that Justin Courtney would like to place large concrete blocks on the east side of Paxton Street north of Hickory Street, where he recently concreted, so there isn't such a steep bank on the adjoining property. He felt it would make it easier for the neighbor to mow. Alderman Krueger moved to permit Mr. Courtney to construct a removable wall of concrete blocks along the east side of Paxton Street just north of Hickory, Biermann seconded. Approved unanimously.

**New Business**  
Davis Creek: Dead Tree East of Bridge – It has been brought to the city's attention that there is a dead tree along the creek bank just east of the Davis Creek bridge on State Street. The tree could be a hazard to the bridge if it falls. Alderman Heck pointed out that MIRMA provides no coverage for bridges. The tree is on private property, but Mayor Russell will talk with Renick Stuart about removing it.

Public Hearing: Water and Sewer Rates

Council members discussed the proposed water and sewer rates. No public comments were heard. The proposal is to keep the water rates the same with the exception of the second tier rate for the PWSD. The base rate, for the first 1.2M gallons, will remain the same, but the amount of the second tier rate will increase slightly from \$4.29/1,000 gallons to \$4.74/1,000 gallons. The average monthly bill for the PWSD would increase 1.5% or around \$100 per month.

The council then reviewed the sewer rate analysis, which indicated an increase is needed to support the costs of operation, debt and repair/replacement reserves. The base charge of \$5.40 per month does not change, but there is an increase from \$3.62 to \$3.84 per 1,000 gallons, which results in a 5% increase for the average user of 5,000 gallons/month or \$1.10/month. Council members agreed to the proposed rates and ordinances will be prepared to implement the changes.

**Department Reports**  
Police – The monthly report was reviewed and discussed. Chief Panning reported that the officers had MILO simulation training at City Hall. Panning also reported that he has received the Watchguard in-car camera, which was mostly funded by a grant from TransCanada. The council agreed to the offer from Laukemper Chevrolet of \$1,000 for trade-in of both of the old police cars towards the purchase of the new patrol car.

Sewer Department – Sewer Superintendent Kelly Graves reported he has approval from Alderman Biermann to rewire floats at the lift station. He also reported he is still waiting on repairs to the damaged lagoon liner.

Water Department – Holt County PWSD Connection to Bigelow: Mayor Russell reported there is still interest from MO DNR and FEMA to connect the city water main west of I-29 to Bigelow, but any action would be up to the Rural Water District.

Street Department – Salt Dome Roof Contract: Clerk Smith reported that the low bidder, American Restoration, was unable to meet all terms of the contract. Council members discussed the only other bid received, which was from Nauman Construction. Mr. Nauman has stated that his bid is for either a sloped roof, as specified, or a trussed roof. Alderman Krueger motioned to accept the bid of \$16,500 from Nauman Construction to construct a trussed roof over the salt dome, Biermann seconded. Approved unanimously.

Alderman Krueger presented a listing of streets in town in the worst condition. The council discussed and reviewed the list. Graves reported that the city has approximately 25 tons of salt left from last season and he has ordered another 25 tons.

Park/Pool Department – Park & Recreation Board Meeting Minutes/Plans: Alderman Gibson reported that the park board met on August 31 and has come up with a long range plan for improvements to the parks and pool including:

- Redo barbeque pit by shelter house, including concrete slab, estimated at \$6,900. Park board members are hoping to have a service organization such as the Lions Club sponsor the project.
- Major redo to pool basket house, instead of trying to patch the leaking roof, to include making it more handi-

cap accessible and a better use of the space. Jordan Krueger is putting a plan together.

- Donnie Ireland is going to talk to Todd Fogg about some new playground equipment for Griffith Park.
- Repairs to the pool parking lot.
- Check on a grant that would pay 65% to put a walking path at Chautauqua Park.

Alderman Gibson would like to see funds from the capital improvement tax put back into the parks.

Park Signs: Alderman Gibson has spoken with Larry Knapp about replacing the sign at Griffith Park and installing a sign at Chautauqua Park. The cost would be \$750 per sign. Gibson can authorize each sign separately. Pool Lease-Savings from Prepayment of Balance Due: The clerk reported a savings of around \$128,600 in interest and fees due to early payoff of the pool lease. The original payment schedule was for 20 years, but the lease was paid off in 12 years.

**Ordinances**  
Bill No. 10-6-2011: Repeal Ordinance #1181 and Award New Contract for Salt Dome Roof was placed on its first reading being for an ordinance entitled as follows:

An ordinance repealing ordinance number 1181 and adopting a new ordinance accepting the bid and awarding the contract for the salt storage facility roof project for the terms and payments as therein provided; and authorizing the mayor to execute the contract on behalf of the city.

Alderman Krueger moved to adopt the bill, Biermann seconded. After further discussion, the bill was placed on its second reading and final passage and was read by title, considered and discussed. Approved unanimously. The bill was duly numbered Ordinance #1183.

**Nuisance Violations/Dangerous Building**

1012 Mill: Bids for Demolition – Bid opening was postponed pending another inspection. Building Inspector Chris Krueger, Alderman

Gibson, and Police Chief Panning will inspect the house on Friday, October 7, at 10:00 a.m. Council members agreed that the homeowner needs very specific details on what needs to be done to remove the house from the dangerous building status.

310 Spring Street: Inspection – The house at 310 Spring Street was inspected on September 28 and found to be a dangerous building. The homeowner was present at the inspection and indicated to Building Inspector Krueger that they intend to demolish the home. Krueger sent notification to them that they have 30 days to start the process of demolition and 90 days to complete.

**Administration**  
Approve Special Tax Bills for Nuisance Abatement: Alderman Heck moved to approve special tax bills for nuisance abatement at 508 Mound, 1601 Nebraska, 601 Railroad and 801 Savannah, Gibson seconded. Approved unanimously.

Nuisance Violation Notices: The clerk reported a state statute permits larger cities to send only one violation notice per growing season, but it does not apply to more rural areas.

Monthly Financial Re-

ports/TIF Quarterly Report: The monthly financial reports were reviewed and discussed. The clerk reviewed the quarterly TIF report and the annual TIF report to be sent to the state.

Meeting Date- The council set the next regular meeting for Thursday, November 10, 2011, at 5:30 p.m.

**Accounts Payable**  
Alderman Krueger moved to approve the bills paid subsequent to the September 20, 2011, meeting and to approve and pay the current month's bills as presented, Heck seconded. Approved unanimously.

Legal – At 10:10 p.m. Alderman Heck moved to close the meeting pursuant to RSMo 610.021.1 - Legal, Gibson seconded the motion. Ayes: Heck, Gibson, Krueger and Biermann. Approved unanimously.

Votes taken in closed session: Alderman Krueger moved to come out of closed session at 10:30 p.m., Gibson seconded. Approved unanimously.

**Adjournment**  
Alderman Krueger moved to adjourn the meeting at 10:30 p.m., Biermann seconded. Motion approved.

## Prepare to manage frogeye soybean disease using resistant varieties

Frogeye leaf spot has been found to be resistant to azoxystrobin fungicide in several counties in Illinois, Kentucky, Tennessee and now Missouri. Azoxystrobin is in the strobilurin family of fungicides.

When ordering soybean seed this year, choose soybean varieties with genetic resistance to frogeye leaf spot. Resistant varieties should be used rather than fungicide applications.

If growers have fields that seem to have a high risk of frogeye and are planting a susceptible variety, they should choose a fungicide from a different class of fungicides with different modes of action. For example, choose a triazole or other class.

Lastly, only apply a fungicide when needed. Scout fields and look at the disease risk before making a fungicide application decision.

When fungicides are applied, selection pressure is applied. This means that any genetic mutation of the fungi that allows them to survive may escape. If sprays are used repeatedly, each time selection pressure is exerted to find those organisms which have resistance, they will produce off-spring. Finally resistance develops.

## FEMA registration deadline extended to November 10

At the request of Missouri Gov. Jay Nixon, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has extended the deadline for renters, homeowners and business owners who suffered damage from flooding to register for state and federal disaster assistance. Residents of the following six Missouri counties are eligible to register for disaster assistance: Andrew, Atchison, Buchanan, Holt, Lafayette, and Platte.

The new deadline is Thursday, November 10, 2011.

"Please use the extended deadline to settle any outstanding insurance claims and get that information to FEMA," FEMA Federal Coordinating Officer Mike Karl said. "We also request that those who have registered please contact FEMA with address changes if they have relocated since registration."

Registration may be completed online at [www.DisasterAssistance.gov](http://www.DisasterAssistance.gov), by Smartphone through [m.FEMA.gov](http://m.FEMA.gov), or by calling FEMA's toll-free registration line at 1-800-621-FEMA (3362). If the applicant has a speech disability or hearing loss and uses a TTY, call 1-800-462-7585 directly; if the applicant uses 711 or Video Relay Service (VRS), call 1-800-621-3362. Multi-language assistance is available. Telephone registration is available daily from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m., until further notice. Assistance to individuals can include grants to help pay for temporary housing needs, essential home repairs and other serious disaster-related expenses not covered by insurance or other sources.

Applicants are reminded to keep their FEMA information updated, but not to register twice. Duplicate registrations will delay processing an application.

The U. S. Small Business Administration (SBA) also ex-

tended the deadline to submit disaster loan applications to November 10, 2011. SBA offers low-interest federal disaster loans to homeowners, renters, businesses of all sizes and private, nonprofit organizations to help pay for, repair or replace disaster damaged property. Loan amounts for disaster damaged property may be up to \$200,000 for a primary residence, \$40,000 for personal property and \$2 million for business assets. Interest rates may be as low as 2.688 percent for homeowners and renters, 3 percent for nonprofit organizations and 4 percent for businesses.

Homeowners and renters should submit their SBA disaster loan application, even if they are not sure if they will need or want a loan. If SBA cannot approve an application, in most cases the applicant is referred to FEMA's Other Needs Assistance (ONA) program for possible additional assistance. Small businesses and most private, nonprofit organizations may apply for SBA loans of up to \$2 million to help meet disaster caused working capital needs. These working capital loans are available regardless of whether the business suffered any property damage.

SBA representatives are at the Disaster Recovery Centers to issue loan applications, answer questions about SBA's disaster loan program, explain the application process, and help each individual complete their application. Applicants may apply online via SBA's secure Web site at <https://disasterloan.sba.gov/ela>. SBA information and assistance are also available by calling SBA at (800) 659-2955, emailing [disastercustomerservice@sba.gov](mailto:disastercustomerservice@sba.gov), or on SBA's Web site [www.sba.gov/services/disasterassistance](http://www.sba.gov/services/disasterassistance).
