## State Theater's 20th Anniversary Celebration draws huge crowd

The State Theater held a "Denim and Diamonds Reception" at the Klub Saturday evening prior to the Johnny Cash Show.

The reception was decorated beautifully for the event and a nice hors d'oeuve buffet was enjoyed. Approximately 90 people attended the anniversary event.

State Representative Mike Thomson presented a resolution on behalf of the Missouri State House of Representatives to the State Theater in honor of the 20 years of distinguished service to this community in the field of fine arts. State Senator Brad Lager could not attend the function, but also sent a resolution from the Missouri State Senate.

State Theater Arts Council President, Jon Miller, recognized Kris Bakko of Northwest Missouri State University, who has been responsible for giving a face-lift to promotional materials used for the theater's programs. She, in turn, presented a gift to the board and to Jon Miller. The gift, a framed and matted graphically enhanced print of the theater, created by Kris, will be hung in the theater lobby.

Jon Miller then recognized and presented plaques to the first theater board members. Several members of the board from 20 years ago were present, some are now deceased and some were unable to attend. Rick Miller, Jon's father, was recognized as the first board president. Although he was unable to attend, he sent his regards in a letter read by Jon.

Present board members were recognized, as well as Mayor David Duncan, because of the support the city gives as owner of the theater.

The reception crowd, as well as many others descended on the State Theater for the celebratory show.

The Johnny Cash Show was presented to a capacity crowd of 280. Local talent awed everyone with more than 25 Johnny Cash songs being performed. Hits such as "I Walk the Line" and "Folsom Prison Blues" were among the groups' repertoire. Johnny Cash (Jim Brown), Luther Perkins (Ray Neiderhouse-original guitar player), Marshall Grant (Curtis Stroud-bass player 'till the 70's) and W.S. Holland (David Cotton-drummer) played and sang many songs remembered by the attentive audience.

Curtis also doubled as Carl Perkins in "Blue Suede Shoes". Ray doubled as Webb Pierce on "He's in the Jailhouse Now".

Carolyn Hall joined Jim on a couple songs as June Carter. The "Smith Sisters" (Marci, Lori, and Toni) helped out on all the Carter Family songs. Lori (Smith) Miller also doubled as Rose- anne Cash.

Jim, Ray, Curtis and Dave performed as the Statler

Brothers singing their first big hit "Flowers on the Wall".

The evening also included special background information about Johnny Cash, his singing career and his life. Jim Brown included such information as "Johnny" was not Johnny's given name and many other fun and factual information from Johnny's career.

A great evening was enjoyed by everyone who attended.

## Two Mound City residents vying for county Sheriff

Q&A with the candidates for Holt County Sheriff

Tuesday, November 4, is election day. Holt County citizens will vote to fill the nation's highest positions as well as state and local positions.

Candidates for the Sheriff's position were offered a chance to answer a few final questions to help voters decide who would best fill the office.

**John Panning-** Democratic candidate.

1) What credentials will you bring to the sheriff's position.

I have been a resident of Holt County for 31 years and in law enforcement for over 12 years. During those years, I've worked for the Mound City Police Department for two years, and then went to work for the Holt County Sheriff's Department, and was there for nine and a half years (with rank of Deputy, Sergeant, and Chief Deputy) and now I am currently employed with the Mound City Police Department. During those years, I have taken training in a variety of courses and classes with the MWSC - Law Enforcement Academy, Missouri State Highway Patrol, Southern State University, Missouri Sheriff's Assoc., Missouri Deputy Sheriff's Assoc. and other agency. Along with being a member and Chairman of the Local Emergency Planning Committee, I am already certified to run the Mules terminal in the dispatch center.

2) What issues in law enforcement do you feel need addressing throughout Holt County?

While no one wants to think the county has drug problems, underage drinking and crime, we do have all of these problems that need to be addressed and we need to prevent as much of these as possible with programs, such as D.A.R.E., and have a proactive approach to law enforcement.

I think that we need to start working together with other agencies (including fire, EMS and law enforcement) and the citizens of Holt County to help resolve these problems and others to make Holt County a safer county to live, work and visit.

3) What changes do you feel are needed, particularly in the sheriff's department?

If possible, we need to get back to having four full-time deputies and working

toward 24-hour coverage to take the department from a reactive department to a proactive department. We need to get everyone working together. This way we can deter crime and make this a safer county for our children, grandchildren and visitors.

4) How do you feel you are prepared to deal with the administrative side of the sheriff's department, including budgetary requirements, county employees, and jail management?

While working at the Sheriff's Department, I got experience in running the department in the absence of the Sheriff and assisting with getting grants to deter expenses of the department and to the taxpayers. I will work to cut unnecessary spending, and work to stay within budget on all budgetary requirements. I would look at grants to also deter cost for equipment for the department. I will monitor all employees and make sure they are trained appropriately and continue receiving ongoing training. I will work to try to resolve issues with the jail.

5) How can you improve the sheriff's position by being elected?

I will improve the Sheriff's position by being a working Sheriff and not an 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Sheriff. I will work alongside my employees to make the department be more productive. By being a working Sheriff, it would be quite possible to have 24-hour coverage in the department this way to help deter crime.

I will be a Sheriff that will

know how to run equipment within my department including, Mules, which I am a certified operator, 9-1-1 computer, Vine Computer and being able to dispatch calls that come into the dispatch center.

**Scott Wedlock-** Republican candidate.

1) What credentials will you bring to the sheriff's position?

During my 25 years of Public Safety employment, my first Law Enforcement job was as a Deputy Sheriff in Nodaway County after graduating from the Missouri State Highway Patrol Basic Police Academy in 1986 with honors. I have continued my Law Enforcement education by attending courses on criminal investigation, crime scene management, traffic accident investigation, child abuse and neglect, and scores of hours in emergency management topics.

2) What issues in law enforcement do you feel need addressing throughout Holt County?

The timely response to calls from citizens is a big concern. Citizens call us when they need our assistance. A core part of law enforcement is responding to calls for service and then following through with the appropriate actions as the circumstances dictate. The age of our county jail is an issue that the County Commissioners, Sheriff and ultimately, the community, is going to be forced to evaluate and make some choices.

3) What changes do you

Dear Mr. Editor, Proposition A

I have been asked by at least twenty people about my opinion on Proposition A, the "Yes to Schools" amendment. I will not give my opinion; however, I will present facts that are not necessarily being touted by the group for the passing of Prop. A.

First of all, the amendment is supposed to endow money solely for the purpose of education. Experts in the gaming industry estimate this to be \$105 to \$130 million dollars. This would be a windfall of much needed education money. These funds would be directly inserted into the "State Adequacy Target" portion of the education foundation formula.

If I didn't do this job all day I would ask myself: "What is state adequacy target and foundation formula?" Here goes: the foundation formula is an extremely complex series of functions as to how schools across the state are funded. The important item to understand is the state adequacy target. This piece of the formula is what our legislators three years ago built into a new foundation formula as the drive mechanism for increasing the dollars per year for schools. In the old formula it was the Consumer Price Index. With the old formula, consumers in the state basically drove the amount of money schools would get to educate students. In a good economy schools receive more and vice versa. Currently, there are only two ways to get an increase in school formula money. Number one is for the legislators to increase the state adequacy with a vote in a legislative session. This has not happened in three years. The other way is to increase the number of students enrolled in school. This has not happened (in Mound City) to a great extent either.

With the invention of the new foundation formula in 2005-06 each school began its base year. Whatever the school enrollment was in the 2005-06 school year became the starting dollar amount for that school district. If enrollment decreases or stays the same, a district then becomes hold harmless-meaning that we will never see an increase in state money until we climbed above our 2005-06 base year. The odds of getting a hole in one.... two holes in a row are greater than our district getting away from the hold harmless label.

Why did we go through all that information? Proposition A, in its design, places that \$105-130 million in the state adequacy target. This means that the gaming money would supplant the only mechanism to adjust the formula. Remember the state adequacy target is the only way legislators can or will increase the dollars in the formula for education. The state adequacy target has not been increased in three years.

Several schools in Missouri and two of the districts in Holt County (Craig and Mound City) are "hold harmless" and would not receive any money based on the passage of Prop. A.

This amendment would also remove the loss limits on individual gamblers. As of right now, there are restrictions on how much money one gambler can lose. This ballot issue, if passed, would prohibit any future loss limits from being established. Furthermore, this amendment restricts the number of casinos to those already built or being built and increases the casino gambling tax from 20% to 21%.



# Walk of Honor dedication set for Veterans Day

The Atchison County Walk of Honor will be dedicated at a public ceremony on November 11, at 1:00 p.m. The Walk of Honor is a tribute to those who served their country as members of the U.S. armed forces. It is located adjacent to the Atchison County Memorial Building at 417 South Main Street in Rock Port, MO. Bleachers will be brought to the site, but to ensure a seat, members of the public may wish to bring their lawn chairs. In case of inclement weather, the ceremonies will be held inside the Memorial Building.

The Walk of Honor is the culmination of the efforts of many people and organizations. It all started when a handful of people had a dream of saving the Atchison County Memorial Building from years of deterioration at the hands of time and the elements. To this end, the Atchison County Memorial Building Foundation was formed in 2003.

The Walk of Honor was conceived by Hardin Cox, a current member of the board of directors of the Memorial Building Foundation, as a means to raise funds for the renovation of the building. His idea was quite simple: sell bricks on the proposed Walk. The idea evolved

and took on a life of its own when the Foundation received some large donations whose use was restricted to the construction of the proposed Walk of Honor. These donations, along with the purchase of bricks by family and friends wishing to honor veterans and other friends and loved ones, enabled the Foundation to erect this wonderful memorial to the veterans of Atchison County and veterans with ties to the County. A secondary purpose of the Walk is to draw attention to the Atchison County Memorial Building and the Foundation's renovation goals.

Credit for the Walk of Honor design cannot be given to any one individual. Several designs were submitted to the Foundation, but no one design fit all the require-

ments. As a result, several Foundation board members and county citizens were chosen as a committee to design the Walk and coordinate the details of its construction. The members of the Walk of Honor Committee are: Dan Fries, Linda Fries, Elaine Eilers, Duane Smith, Bill Farmer, Hardin Cox, Scott Deatz, Mike Green, and Sherry Adams. Initial drawings and architectural renderings were done by Jack Fries, formerly of Fairfax. Ellison-Auxier Architects of St. Joseph completed the final drawings and material specifications. The Walk was built on lots adjacent to the Atchison County Memorial Building donated to the Foundation by Merle and Ruth Fox of Rock Port. The lots were cleared by Sandy Lisle Construction, Rock

Port, who was assisted by Mr. Fox and several volunteers.

The Walk of Honor contains 2,686 bricks of varying sizes. Duane Smith and his Smith Brothers Construction crew, Rock Port, mounted all the bricks into the walls and installed the black granite trim border on each panel of bricks.

# Remembering.....

Dear Editor,  
After Dad had the logs cut and the sawmill had come and gone, the field we were clearing was still cluttered with brush and numerous left-over small logs. These were too small to cut lumber out of and too large to use a "buzz saw" to make them into firewood. We could just set the brush piles on fire, but the rest of the clutter was different. To split the small logs by hand with a maul, wedges and an axe proved to be a job that would take a lot of time to do, so other means were looked for. Dad wanted some split for posts and the rest for firewood.

Somewhere Dad came up with using a potash and sugar mixture, making an explosive similar to dynamite, but on a smaller scale. A brother of our hired man claimed to be handy with this, so Dad hired him. It was a simple way to do this. First use a T-handle hand drill with a bit of approximately one inch in diameter and drill a hole from four to six inches deep in the selected spot on the log. Pour the potash and sugar mixture into the hole, stick a fuse of a length long enough we could get to a safe place before it went off, then tamp a little mud around the fuse, light it and run. If done right it would be a neat split, otherwise it would be a pile of splintered wood.

Being younger and inexperienced, I got to be the one to drill the holes in the logs. He told me that was the most important job of it all, after a few days of that, I didn't care if it was. Later on he let me do most of it, while he stood off and watched....that's life, I guess. The guy I worked with was real safety-minded and was always cautioning me about not getting in too big a hurry, to go back to a log if the charge didn't go off right at first. So we would stand and wait in a safe place until we could go back, that is until this one time.

We were standing by a brush pile and behind a tree when we decided it was a dud. We almost got up to the log when it went off, part of it went over our heads and lit almost where we had been standing. We quit for the day. I gained a lot of respect for potash and sugar.

Later in the service, I would always volunteer for schooling on demolitions, booby traps, etc. I guess I was thinking I already was an expert, but I soon found out, I wasn't. While coming down off a mountain on Luzon looking forward to a few hours of rest, we went by one of the many caves the Japanese had set up with machine guns and artillery. They started firing on us, even the wounded on stretchers. This cave had been cleared out, supposedly, but had been one that had other sections built back in the mountain. They had just hidden out and waited, not unusual.

Somebody hollered for Poynter to pick up some explosives, also for manpower to help me seal the cave. We took some composition "C" about the size of an old milk bucket, tied it in a long sleeved shirt, stuck a fuse on it and tried to get close enough to use it, but couldn't. We had to go on top of the cave and I hung on to a small tree and swung the activated charge back as far as I could into the cave and we started crawling away when it went off. It threw all three of us around and shook us up quite a bit, but the cave was sealed.

Forty years later, while at a division reunion in Scottsdale, AZ, one of the soldiers who helped me asked me if I remembered the other soldier who helped out, I didn't. He told everyone how high we were blown up when the explosions went off. He lives in South Carolina and came to visit Betty and me three years ago.

Afterwards, in thinking about it, I wouldn't have been in that situation, if I hadn't had all that experience with potash and sugar and thought I knew it all. Well, I guess somebody had to do it.

We need to put four deputies back out on the road and in our communities. These deputies need to be dispatched to respond to calls from citizens in a timely manner.

The budget and its limitations are going to affect the operations and activities of Holt County and specifically the Sheriff's Department. 

# Proposition A Fact Sheet

Prepared by the Missouri Association of School Administration

## Who is behind Proposition A?

The gaming industry wrote the proposal, paid for the signatures to be collected to put this on the ballot, and has spent over \$11 million to campaign in support of the issue. Not one Missouri educational organization or association has endorsed the proposal including MSTa, MNEA, AFT, MASA, MAESP, MASSP, MSBA or PTA.

## If Proposition A is approved, Missouri law would be amended to:

- repeal the current individual maximum loss limit for gambling;
- prohibit any future loss limits;
- restrict the number of casinos to those already built or being built;
- increase the casino gambling tax from 20% to 21%; and
- create a new specific education fund from gambling tax proceeds generated as a result of this measure called the "Schools First Elementary and Secondary Education Improvement Fund".

## How much revenue would be generated for my school district?

There are no guarantees. The money would be added to the state adequacy target. This is a point of concern as the state adequacy target is currently being phased in and will not distribute all of the money in the "Schools First Elementary and Secondary Education Improvement Fund". Second, when the formula is fully implemented, there may not be enough money in the "Schools First Elementary and Secondary Education Improvement Fund" to finance the calculation because of the additional funds that are distributed through the formula for special education, free and reduced students and LEP. Third, many hold harmless districts will not receive any funds from this source. The Department of Elementary and Secondary Education has a simulation of how funds would be distributed. A copy of this simulation is available on the MASA website at [www.masaonline.org](http://www.masaonline.org) by clicking on a link at the bottom of the Schools First Initiative article. Again, there are no guarantees that this amount of money will be available for distribution.

## What do I tell someone who asks about the proposal?

Proposition A is a gaming issue, not a school issue. If an individual supports removing the \$500 loss limits and supports the casinos in their efforts to limit competition, they should vote for Proposition A. Individuals should not vote for the proposal because of the claims that it will provide additional money for education. That may or may not happen, depending on the school district and the amount of money people lose as a result of removing the loss limits.

## Why would someone who supports additional funding for public education be opposed to this issue?

Again, this is not an education issue, it is a gaming issue. Changing the rules for Missouri casinos as listed above is the issue before voters, not the funding needs of Missouri public schools.

## Who will hold the casinos accountable for the claims they are making?

The casinos have no obligation to meet the education funding levels they are predicting if this issue is successful. The funding levels are only speculation.

## How much will the casinos make if this issue is approved?

If the 21% gaming tax generates \$118 million for schools, it could be assumed that the proposal would generate over \$442 million annually for casino owners in the state of Nevada.


