### Country says four more years for President Obama

Governor Nixon to serve second term as well

A much too long campaign season came to an end Tuesday night as ballots were counted across the country from the November 6, 2012, Presidential Election.

Holt County, as much of the midwest, voted heavily for the Romney/Ryan ticket, but the incumbent, President Barack Obama, took the election. Many thought the race would be too close to call but, by the end of the night, it came to an end earlier than expected as the news media called the race around 10:18 p.m. As of press time, reports were showing an Obama/Biden victory over the Romney opposition by at least 3 million votes in the popular vote nation-

In the state of Missouri, Jay Nixon will serve a second term as governor, winning with 1,485,147 votes over Dave Spence's 1,157,475 votes.

Incumbent Claire McCaskill (54%) won the U.S. Senate seat over Todd Akin (39%) despite losing Holt

Sam Graves will keep his seat in the U.S. House winning by around 108,000 votes over Kyle Yarber. Mike Thomson will continue his tenure as Missouri State Representative for District 1. Rep. Thomson was running unopposed.

Peter Kinder won the Lieutenant Governor's office; Jason Kander will be the Secretary of State; Clint Zweifel will be the State Treasurer; and Chris Koster will be Attorney General in Missouri. Roger M. Prokes will be the Circuit 4 Circuit Judge.

Proposition A and Proposition E won statewide by large majorities. Proposition B, the cigarette tax, was turned down by just over 42,000 votes statewide. Constitutional Amendment 3 was voted against by large margins.

This election had 2,340 ballots cast in Holt County, which is just 65% of registered voters. Bill Gordon will serve as the 1st District Commissioner receiving 980 votes while running unopposed. David Carroll will be Holt County's 2nd District Commissioner receiving 1,064 votes while running unopposed. Scott Wedlock (Sheriff - 1,950 votes), LaDonna Jones (Assessor - 2,044 votes), Ed Meng (Public Administrator - 2,041 votes), and Susan Lentz (Coroner - 2,134 votes) were all elected to office and were also running unopposed.

The majority of Holt County's voters did vote Republican throughout the county's ballot, but only Republicans, Lt. Governor Peter Kinder and U.S. District 6 Representative Sam Graves, won statewide.



- More than 40 boys and girls participated in Community Hospital's Super Sitter training program. Students from Mound City and Craig participated.
- The South Holt Knights clinched a playoff berth with a 6-0 win over the Albany Warriors. Coach Craig Barker expected a tough opponent in their next game against the Maysville Wolverines.
- J.W. Stone, Superintendent of Craig I-III School District and Holt County Public Administrator, attended a training conference in Columbia, sponsored by the Missouri Association of Public Administrators.


### 10 Years Ago - 2002



### Tomb of the Unknowns

On March 4, 1921, Congress approved a resolution providing for the burial of an unidentified American soldier, following the custom adopted by other allied countries after World War I. The site was to be the plaza of Arlington National Cemetery's Memorial Amphitheater, which had been dedicated the previous year.

On Memorial Day, 1921, an unknown was exhumed from each of four cemeteries in France. The remains were placed in identical caskets and assembled at Chalon sur Marne.

On October 24, Army Sergeant Edward F. Younger, wounded in combat and highly decorated for valor, selected the unknown soldier for World War I by placing a spray of white roses on one of the caskets. Those remaining were interred in the Meuse Argonne Cemetery, France. The Unknown Soldier then returned home to the U.S. to lie in state in the Capitol Rotunda until Armistice Day. On November 11, 1921, President Warren G. Harding officiated at the interment ceremonies at the Amphitheater.

The monument, which rests on top of the Unknown grave, is a sarcophagus simple, but impressive, in its dimensions. Its austere, flat-faced form is relieved at the corners and along the sides by neo-classic pilasters, or columns, set unto the surface.

Sculpted into the panel, which faces Washington, are the three figures of Valor, Victory, and Peace. On the plaza face the words "Here Rests in Honored Glory An American Soldier Known But To God".

On August 3, 1956, President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed a bill to select and pay tribute to the Unknown Soldiers of World War II and Korea on Memorial Day, 1958. The World War II Unknown was selected from 19 remains exhumed from military cemeteries in Hawaii, Europe, and the Philippines.

Two Unknowns from World War II, one from the European Theatre and one from the Pacific Theatre, were placed in identical caskets and taken aboard the U.S.S. Canberra, a guided missile cruiser resting off the Virginia capes. Hospital Man First Class William R. Charette, then the Navy's only active duty Medal of Honor recipient, selected the Unknown Soldier of World War II. The remaining casket received a burial at sea.

Four unknown Americans who had lost their lives in Korea were disinterred from the National Cemetery of the Pacific in Hawaii. Master Sergeant Ned Lyle, U.S. Army, made the final selection. Both the caskets arrived in Washington on May 28, 1958, where they lay in the Capital Rotunda until May 30. That morning they were carried on caissons to Arlington National Cemetery. President Eisenhower awarded each the Medal of Honor and the Unknowns were interred in the Plaza beside their comrade of World War I.

Twenty-six years later, on Memorial Day, May 28, 1984, after a search made difficult because of advances in technologies used to identify the remains of unknown soldiers, President Ronald Reagan presided over the interment ceremony for the Vietnam Unknown service member. Like his predecessors, he was laid to rest in the plaza of the Tomb during a ceremony that received

#### The Sentinels of the Tomb

Originally, a civilian watchman was responsible for the security of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. Then, on March 24, 1926, a military guard from the Washington Provisional Brigade (forerunner of the U.S. Army Military District of Washington) was established during the daylight hours. In 1948, the 3rd U.S. Infantry, "The Old Guard", assumed the post following the unit's reactivation in the nation's capital. Members of the 3rd Infantry's Honor Guard continue to serve in this distinguished duty today.

A soldier seeking the honor of serving as a sentinel at the Tomb must possess exemplary qualities, to include American citizenship, a spotless record, and impeccable military bearing.

While on duty, the sentinel crosses a 63-foot rubber surfaced walkway in exactly 21 steps. He then faces the Tomb for 21 seconds, turns again, and pauses an additional 21 seconds before retracing his steps. The 21 is symbolic of the highest salute accorded to dignitaries in military and state ceremonies

As a gesture against intrusion on their post, the sentinel always bears his weapon away from

Only under exceptional circumstances may the guard speak or alter his silent, measured tour of duty. He will issue a warning if anyone attempts to enter the restricted area around the Tomb, but first will halt and bring his rifle to port arms.

The Guard wears the Army Dress Blue Uniform, reminiscent of the color and style worn by soldiers during the late 1800's. Tomb Guards are privileged to wear the Tomb Identification Badge on the right breast pocket. The design is an inverted open laurel wreath surrounding a representation of the front elevation of the Tomb. The words "Honor Guard" are engraved at the base of the badge. A guard leaving after at least nine months of service is entitled to wear the badge as a permanent part of the uniform.

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

### Mound City Vietnam veteran writes book about service to our country

Mound City native and veter- know that then." an, Ronnie Tenney, spent many of his early years after the war struggling with the conflicting thoughts about the time he spent serving in the United States of America Army as an infantry soldier in Vietnam. He wrote, "What I saw there would be forever etched in my mind. several stories of survival. One story Ronnie tells, was when his division made a line along the bottom of the hill, soldiers just six feet apart, and began advancing up the hill. Ronnie ended up at the far end of the line, and not too far into the advance, was all of a sudden looking eye to eye with a 'gook'. Instead of firing, which action was said to bring 'imminent death', he yelled, "Gook, Gook", and several soldiers assisted in the atsoldiers who were transporting artillary to another location.

The stories of the time Ronnie served still seem fresh in his

his first team leader, James W. Cartwright. Ronnie was following Cartwright who was point. He remembers seeing the enemy raise its weapons, and just as Cartwright was signalling that there were two or three enemy soldiers nearby, shots rang out and Cartwright went down. Ronnie and three others began carrying Cartwright up a hill so he could be medivaced out, but along the way, as life drained out of him, Ronnie stated, "...at that moment, something in me died. It was not just a bad moment, it was a place in time that changed me forever."

The Battle of Dak To holds some of Ronnie's strongest, most lasting memories of his year in Vietnam. The events of the engagement there are a series of fragmented recollections. The Battle of Dak To began on November 7, when heavy enemy fire forced Alpha and Delta Companies to dig in and clear an LZ for choppers and aerial re-supply. Ronnie's infantry division would be to determine if North Vietnamese soldiers were present on the adjoining ridge, and if so, how many. During one patrol, Ronnie's M16 jammed. Seeking refuge behind a nearby tree, Ronnie worked on his gun, and coming to his senses, began to look at where he was headed. Not 30 yards away, the NVA was hunkered down in a trench, and he would have been their main target. Ronnie remembers the instruction to take good care of vour M16, because 'if it ever jams in combat, you're dead'. In opposition to that, Ronnie found that his jammed gun saved his life.

In another battle later, Ronnie was hit in his neck with shrapnel from a grenade. Although he couldn't hold his head upright, he wanted to go back into battle. Instead, the medic convinced him to stay in the clearing and help with the wounded. He witnessed the death of two of his good friends during that battle, Lt. Terrell and Terry Enriquez. As Ronnie walked aimlessly among the wounded, he wound to his arm. Ronnie redressed it. Much later that day, Ronnie and the others heard the announcement that they had taken Hill 1338. The infantry walked over the battlefield to the top of the hill. Ronnie was filled with horror at the scene that had no words to describe it or words to express the impact it had on him. Later, when Ronnie found out that Green-nose had not been medivaced out, he became furious and his rage ignited a series of actions that would eventually save 'Green-nose's' life. Five months later, Ronnie would see Green-nose, who still had his arm, and told Ronnie, "You saved my life".Later, Ronnie learned that he himself had again been spared, as the shrapnel had been lodged against his

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


