

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

### November deer harvest tops last year's figure

Missouri's robust deer herd continues to pump millions into the state's economy annually and supports 11,000 jobs

checked 190,089 deer during Missouri's 11-day November firearms deer hunt, slightly surpassing last year's figure despite a slow start on opening weekend.

Extremely windy weather, combined with reduced deer populations in some areas, dropped the opening-weekend harvest 10,000 below the 2010 figure. Hunters persevered, however, and more than made up lost ground in the following nine days of the November hunt. In the end, they harvested 1,884 more than last year, a 1-percent

Top harvest counties were Howell with 3.483 deer checked. Macon with 3,393 and Texas with 3,284. The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) recorded six firearms-related deer last vear.

MDC Resource Scientist, Jason Sumners, said changes to hunting regulations over the past 20 years are responsible for producing more large-antlered deer. Sumners noted that in 2003, antlered deer made up 37 percent of the November firearms deer harvest. Last year, 40 percent of the harvest consisted of antlered deer. This year, the figure was 43 percent. This nar-

now in effect in all or parts of 69 counties, allows hunters to shoot an antlered buck only if it has at least four points measuring 1 inch or longer on at least one side. The antler-point restriction allows more bucks to grow trophy antlers while providing effective control of deer numbers.

Sumners said that before implementation of antler-point restrictions, 1.5 year-old bucks made up 40 to 50 percent of the total buck harvest. Today, in counties with the antler-point restriction, 1.5 year-old bucks make up 10 to 15 percent of the total buck harvest. After more than four years under antlerhunting accidents during the point restrictions, 30 to 40 per-November hunt, down from nine cent of the bucks harvested are 3.5 years and older. That means hunters are seeing and harvestbucks. "It's no wonder the fourpoint rule has become very popular with hunters," he said.

> MDC has been working for the better part of a decade to balance hunting opportunities against crop damage, deer-vehicle accidents and other problems associated with overabundant deer. The agency's current challenge is to maintain a healthy, stable deer herd while working with landowners and hunters to fine-tune harvest at the local

MDC Director Bob Ziehmer hailed this year's deer harvest numbers as good news for all Missourians. "A robust firearms deer harvest is proof of a healthy deer herd that benefits all Missourians, whether they hunt or not," said Ziehmer. "Resident deer hunters and a significant number of hunters from out of state spend approximately \$700 million on their sport. That spending generates more than \$1 billion in business activity. In all, deer hunting supports 11,000 Missouri jobs. In these economic times, that's a big boost to the state's economy."

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# This Week's History

From the Mound City News archives

### 50 Years Ago - 1961

- The Mound City Implement, Inc., Holt County's John Deere dealership, was sold to Dean and Audrey Heck. Don Hall, president of the corporation, made the decision to sell based on commitments to his father's estate.
- Pranksters dumped about a third of a load of corn that had been left in a wagon on the swimming pool parking lot, after owner, John Laukemper, had been harvesting late. The grain was strewn all over and driven over with a vehicle.
- A 1952 4-door Chevrolet was pictured on the front page of the paper, as it was being auctioned off at the rear of the Exchange Bank in Mound City. The car sold for \$332.50.
- Dr. Robert Earl Gibson, a graduate of Maitland High School, had returned from his duties as Director of Education of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands, with his wife, to visit his mother, Mrs. E. A. Gibson. The doctor's duties covered a sea area of three million square miles.
- Mound City Tournament results: Boys' championship - Bellevue over Mound City 54-50; Girls' championship - Fairfax over Mound City 32-20; Boys' 3rd - Oregon over Fairfax 54-36; Girls' 3rd - Craig over Westboro 28-21.

### 25 Years Ago - 1986

- Over 1,600 visitors took part in the Eagle Days event held at the Squaw Creek Wildlife Refuge. Omega, a bald eagle from the Dickerson Park Zoo in Springfield, MO, was a highlight of the day.
- Holt County students Anthony Geib, Amy Porter, Shelly Justus, Jolee McCurry and Lori Smith participated in the Missouri Western Honor Band. They performed in concert on the campus.
- Davis Furniture, owned by Avery Davis, relocated from 111 E. 7th Street to 501 State Street.
- The Holt County Historical Society presented a slate of officers to be voted on in March that included: President - Wayne Whipple; Vice President - LeeRoy Hinkle; Secretary - Isabel Schaeffer; Treasurer - Cheryl Miles; and Board Members - Carolyn Kent, Jay Cotton and Phyllis Morris.
- Wyeth Enterprises, Inc., owned by John Wyeth, remodeled his present space in the former office space of Dr. Humphrey at 611 State Street. Services included locksmithing, small appliance repair, Rug Doctor, UPS services, and selling wholesale barber and beauty supplies.

### 10 Years Ago - 2001

- A live nativity scene, complete with a braying donkey, was one of the highlights of the Forest City Riverbend Christmas celebration. Attendees also enjoyed the singing of Christmas carols, the reading of the Christmas story, gifts for sale and horse/sleigh rides. A talent show at City Hall featured several vocalists and pianist, Sally Kirchhoff, and drew a crowd of nearly 100 people.
- A dozen cases of chicken pox were reported at the Mound City School.
- The planning group decided to ask the Holt County Commission to appoint a Holt County Resource Development Committee to put together a grant application that would pay up to \$30,000/year for an economic developer for the county.
- A new 15' Christmas star was erected on the hill as one enters Mound City. The idea was Skip Laukemper's, president of the Chamber of Commerce. It was built by Bob Smith.
- •The Mound City boys and the Fairfax girls were champions of the Mound City Tournament.

### Refuge holds economic value as well as natural value

Southwick Associates published a document on October 11, 2011, called The Economics Associated with Outdoor Recreation, Natural Resources Conservation and Historic Preservation in the United States. The document was commissioned by the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation to serve two purposes. The first purpose is to identify the level of impacts that natural resource conservation, outdoor recreation and historic preservation have on the U.S. economy, what data currently exists and key data gaps that must be filled. The second purpose is to serve as the basis for the development of an assessment tool that can be used by the foundation.

"We are fortunate to have Squaw Creek National Wildlife Refuge in northwest Missouri," stated Ron Bell, Squaw Creek Wildlife Refuge manager. "We hope that visitors have a greater appreciation, not only for all of the wildlife, but also for its value to the region."

Some selected facts from the report are highlighted below:

#### Combined Value of Outdoor Recreation, Nature Conservation & Historic Preservation

- Jobs = 9.4 million.
- · Federal, state and local tax revenues = \$107 billion.
- Total economic activity (equivalent to GDP) = \$1.06 trillion.

#### **Outdoor Recreation**

• In 2006, the total contribution from outdoor recreation in the United States was over

\$730 billion a year, generating acre/year. 6,435,000 U.S. jobs and \$88 billion in federal and state tax revenues. This includes hunting, fishing, wildlife viewing and the "human-powered" recreations such as hiking, camping, skiing, paddle sports and bicycling.

- In 2008, 28.3% of U.S. adults went boating at least once. Recreational marine manufacturers employed more than 135,900 people and retail boating/service businesses employed another 217,718 people.
- The combined spending effect protected areas are repeatedly of hunting, fishing and wildlife watching associated with National Forest Service land totaled \$9.5 billion in annual retail sales, supported 189,400 jobs and provided \$1.01 billion in annual federal tax revenues.
- Visitors to Army Corps of Engineers land generated \$34.0 billion in sales, contributing \$17.1 billion in direct income, and supported 420,000 jobs at the national level in 1996.
- Outdoor recreation sales (gear and trips combined) of \$325 billion per year are greater than annual returns from pharmaceutical and medicine manufacturing (\$162 billion), legal services (\$253 billion), and power generation and supply (\$283 billion).

#### **Natural Resource** Conservation

• The total value of ecosystem services provided by the acreage of natural habitats in National Wildlife Refuges in the United States totaled \$32.3 billion/year, or \$2,900 thousand/

- The value of ecosystem services provided by natural habitat in the 48 contiguous United States amount to about \$1.6 trillion annually, which is equivalent to more
- than 10% of the U.S. GDP. • The loss of about 9.9 million
- acres of wetlands in the U.S. since the 1950s has resulted in an economic loss of more than \$81 billion in all wetlands-related ecosystem services.
- Home owners near parks and reported to have property values more than 20% higher than similar properties elsewhere.

#### Historic **Preservation**

- Nationally, the federal tax credits returned more than \$22.3 billion in federal tax dollars since 1978 on \$17.5 billion in tax credits - a return of 27.4% from every dollar invested.
- Economic activity resulting from federal historic preservation tax credits supports 61,200 jobs, \$6.6 billion in economic activity and generated \$935 million in tax revenues.
- On the statewide level, Philadelphia historic rehabilitation efforts resulted in average annual impacts of \$1.1 billion in total expenditures that supported 9,560 jobs and \$353 million in earnings within the state of Pennsylvania. Tax revenues from this work included \$6.6 million local taxes for the city and an additional \$24.3 million in tax revenues for the state.
- In Texas in 1997, rehabilitation efforts created more than 4,200 jobs and overall historic preservation activities created more than 40,000 jobs in the state that year (Center for Urban Policy et al, 1999).
- In Nebraska, an average of \$46 million spent on statewide historic rehabilitation per year thousands of smaller natural from 2001 to 2005 resulted in areas in the United States.

- 1,004 jobs, and additional \$31 million in income and \$45 million in GDP at the national.
- Every million dollars invested in residential historic rehabilitation generates approximately 36 jobs, \$1.24 million in income and nearly \$200,000 in state and local taxes.
- Heritage tourism in Philadelphia supports over 45,000 jobs and \$3.5 billion in economic activity annually.
- In 2010, 15 million visitors to Civil War battlefields managed by the National Park Service in just five states (MO, PA, SC, TN, and VA) generated 7,700 jobs.
- Properties in historic districts have increased values, generally around 20% higher than other similar properties elsewhere.

County committees are responsible for making decisions on issues including commodity

Redden encourages minority and female producers to serve as county committee members in the future. It is important that the county committee is comprised of members who reflect the demographics of the local agriculture community.
