Missouri Department of Conservation agents, Jade Wright and Anthony Maupin, both of Mound City, were among the guests of honor at a ceremony on Wednesday, Dec. 16, at the Missouri State Capitol in Jefferson City, MO. Nine public safety officers from across the state were awarded the Missouri Medal of Valor for their courageous and exceptional efforts to save lives and protect the public in 2014. The nine officers who responded to the deadly threats represent Missouri police and Emergency Medical Services (EMS) and fire departments, as well as the Missouri Department of Conservation, the Missouri Department of Corrections and the Missouri State Highway Patrol.

"These nine courageous individuals exemplify the bravery and commitment of Missouri's public safety officers to serving and protecting the public," Missouri Governor Jay Nixon said. "Each story is unique - from subduing an armed attacker to giving medical care while under gunfire to braving floodwaters and entering a burning building to pull trapped victims to safety - but the character of the individuals involved, their decisiveness of action and selfless commitment to protecting the public is the same."

Five county residents were in ternoon. attendance at the Holt County Commissioners' meeting on Monday, Dec. 21, to air their concerns to the commissioners. At 9:30 a.m., Bill Metzgar, Kyle Geib, Mike Heck, Bob Heck and John Long spoke to Commissioners Bill Gordon and David Carroll, and Presiding Commissioner Mark Sitherwood. Also in attendance were Alan Yocum and Sheri Wright, reporter for the Mound City News, with Holt County Clerk Kathy Holstine recording the minutes.

The main concern of the group is the condition of the county roads, more specifically the day to day maintenance of the roads. Metzgar passed pictures to the commissioners of roads in bad condition. He stressed that most of the damage is not weather related, rather poor maintenance by the Holt County road crew. Sitherwood noted that the county is doing the best it can due to heavy rains experienced during much of 2015.

Mike Heck stated that Holt 110 from Key Stone Drive to Route N has been in terrible shape for several years. "If things can't get done right, whether it is the grader operator, the Road and Bridge Supervisor or the commissioners' fault, changes need to be made," stated Heck. "These roads don't look anything like they did 20-30 years ago. They are not maintained properly."

EARLY COUNTRY SCHOOLS IN HOLT COUNTY



CULP COUNTRY SCHOOL - 1933

Holt County School Superintendent Stephen Blanchard published his planned schedule to visit Holt County Schools in a Holt County Sentinel, January 1, 1869. Culp School, that was located about one and one half miles south of Oregon, was included on the list.



ELM GROVE COUNTRY SCHOOL - 1907

In 1866, Robert Wilson transferred one acre, four miles southwest of Bigelow and adjoining the north edge of the Tarkio Chapel Cemetery, to be used for Elm Grove School. Burials are recorded in the cemetery as early as 1856. The school was located on the one acre plots until the early 1900s when it was destroyed by a storm. Henry Renick Stuart donated land about a mile to the east to build a second Elm Grove School building. Elm Grove, Corning and Hemme were the names of new post offices established in Holt County in October 23, 1868.

KCP&L has seen an increase in reports of phone scams involving customers' utility bills and other personal information. Most of those targeted have been restaurants and small businesses, but all customers should be aware of this important notice.

With the phone scam, the caller is often a live person posing as a KCP&L employee who notifies the customer of a past due bill and demands immediate payment to avoid service disconnection. In some instances, the caller requests that the customer purchase a money gram to pay their bill. If the customer is unable to make an immediate payment or does not answer, the caller gives out a return phone number for customers to call back. When calling, customers are prompted by a recording to press two to make their payment with a live person. This phone number is not associated

If customers ever have questions about the legitimacy of a bill, phone call or email regarding their utility bill, they should refrain from providing any personal or

MDC Agents Wright and Maupin receive Medals of Valor from Missouri Gov. Nixon

were on hand for the presentation of Missouri's highest public safety award during a ceremony in the Governor's office in the Capitol. Governor Nixon was joined at the ceremony by Department of Public Safety Director Lane Roberts and Highway Patrol Superintendent Colonel Bret Johnson.

The following transcript was read at the ceremony:

On Sept. 9, 2014, over nine inches of rain swept across northwest Missouri in a matter of hours, leading to widespread flash flooding, including along Squaw Creek in Holt County. A school bus with only the bus driver on board was swept off Highway N, becoming lodged against

a fence. With the swift water rising rapidly, a Department of Conservation (MDC) boat was launched into a flooded ditch. Agent Wright maneuvered the boat through the rolling water with Agent Maupin and a Missouri State Highway Patrol ser*geant* (Mike Quilty) *also aboard*.

Upon approaching the precariously positioned bus, Agent Wright used all his skill to hold the boat in a position so Agent Maupin and Sergeant Quilty could get close to the door of the bus. They had to fight the rushing water to open the bus door. They threw the driver a life vest. Then, with the boat positioned close to the door, Agent Maupin was able to reach the driver and pull her safely into the boat. Once back

on land, EMS personnel tended to the bus driver.

The flash flooding grew worse and shortly before midnight, in a matter of minutes, over three feet of water rushed across a onehalf mile stretch of Interstate 29 near Mound City. Four vehicles were swept off the interstate, trapping seven motorists. Agents Wright and Maupin improvised and used a MoDOT (Missouri Department of Transportation) front end loader to reach a total of six trapped motorists, whose vehicles had been swept down an embankment. Riding in the front end loader's bucket with life jackets and rescue equipment, they and a Highway Patrol sergeant (Mike Quilty), maneuvered through the swirling water

and loaded the victims from their flooded vehicles into the bucket, and then safely back to land, in two separate trips.

Agents Wright and Maupin are honored by the recognition from the state of Missouri, but stress that their mission could not have been completed without the aid from others. Missouri State Highway Patrol Sergeant Mike Quilty was beside them all the time. MoDOT employees at both scenes were instrumental in the rescues. At the Highway N rescue, MoDOT employee, J.R. Rother, manned the end loader that held the boat in place while rescuing the bus driver, who was later treated by Atchison-Holt Ambulance District EMTs. Mound City Rural Fire District volunteer, Chris Russell, also assisted with the rescue boat.

At the scene on Interstate 29, more rescue personnel became involved. As Agents Wright and Maupin were rescuing stranded motorists from the south side of the flooded area, MDC Agent Eric Abbott of Atchison County and MoDOT employee, Rob Kish of Rock Port, MO, were using a MoDOT road grader to rescue a motorist clinging to the luggage rack of his submerged car in the median.

On the south side of the flooding, J.R. Rother was joined by MoDOT employee, Ed Hunziger of Oregon, MO. Hunziger's road grader was used as a water break for the floodwaters as Rother's front end loader was used to

transport Wright and Maupin to the motorists and to move the victims to safety after the agents placed life vests on each one. Once again, Atchison-Holt Ambulance District was on hand to treat several at the scene for hypothermia.

The deluge of rain that fell that night sent many streams over their banks. "That is the worst I have seen Squaw Creek in all my life growing up in the area," remarked Agent Wright. He noted that the creek covered the interstate again several months later, but with less intensity. Mother Nature sometimes rears her ugly head and Holt County is pleased that people are out there to protect its citizens.

Holt County Commissioners release minutes for weekly meetings in November; 90% of FEMA projects complete

The Holt County Commission did not have a quorum on Monday, Nov. 16, 2015, with Presiding Commissioner Mark Sitherwood and Second District Commissioner David Carroll attending the annual Missouri Association of Counties' conference.

First District Commissioner Bill Gordon was in attendance at the courthouse in Oregon, MO, to review accounts payable.

The Holt County Commission met Monday, Nov. 23, 2015, at 9 a.m., at the Holt County Courthouse in Oregon. Presiding Commissioner Mark Sitherwood, First District Commissioner Bill Gordon and Second District Commissioner David Carroll were in attendance.

David Dudeck, rural Oregon, joined the commission to request application of 100 yards of gravel on Omaha Road between Holt 160 and 170. After discussion, Commissioner Gordon made a motion to add the gravel as requested. Commissioner Carroll seconded the motion. A unanimous vote passed

The commissioners met with Road and Bridge Supervisor Daryl Biermann to discuss the County Aid Road Trust (CART) road program and consider modifications to the road rock application by district in the coming year. Mr. Biermann also provided a quote of \$10,900 for a utility bed for an existing flatbed pickup truck in the Road and Bridge fleet. The commissioners took the matter under review. The commissioners discussed design elements of a bridge replacement project (BRO-32). Mr. Biermann will continue to work with engineer, Phil Schrick, on the project located on Holt Road 110. In other matters, Mr. Biermann reported there is an engine oil leak with one of the graders and he would be hauling rock on Holt Road 120 soon, weather permitting. The rock has been purchased by Kenny Construction and Tally Farms.

Sheriff Scott Wedlock joined the commission to report on a project to upgrade the 911 system to Phase 2 wireless capabilities. He has scheduled a meeting in coming weeks to get further details.

Commissioners reviewed a rightof-way contract with Tradewinds Energy for access on county roadways related to a transmission line and substation. Commissioner Carroll made a motion to approve the agreement, which requires a \$10,000 bond from the company prior to the start of any work. Commissioner Gordon seconded the motion with a unanimous approval.

Jackie Spainhower, Director of the Northwest Missouri Regional Council of Governments, met with the commission to discuss Certified Work Ready Communities. Spainhower is pursuing a grant for a regional program to enhance workforce development. The commissioners agreed to participate and selected Commissioner Sitherwood as the representative to an upcoming planning meeting.

County Clerk Kathy J. Holstine and Deputy Angie Gamache discussed Great Northwest Days at the Capitol with the commission. Plans are underway to attend the annual event in Jefferson City, MO. The commissioners reviewed booth ideas and issues from the re-

Being no further business, the commission adjourned until Monday, Nov. 30, 2015.

Bids were opened by the Levee #15 Board on Tuesday, Nov. 24. Three bids were obtained, of which Tri-Smith Construction, Carrollton, MO, was selected by the board as the winning bid. Commissioners approved the contract at the recommendation of the Levee #15 Board for \$296,959.

Frank Blakemore, PE, Garver, Kansas City, MO, joined the commission to ask for its consideration when next selecting an engineering firm for bridge work.

Road and Bridge Supervisor Daryl Biermann joined the commission to discuss the purchase of a tractor and flail mower for rightof-way management. 


Students deliver holiday food baskets to residents in the community


Winner claims prize at Mound City Lumber
