Eagle Days report from Squaw Creek National Wildlife Refuge

Squaw Creek National Wildlife Refuge completed the 30th Annual Eagle Days Celebration held on the weekend of December 6 and 7.

The Eagle Days festival is a cooperative venture with the Missouri Department of Conservation, World Bird Sanctuary–St. Louis, Friends of Squaw Creek, Ioway Tribe of Kansas and Nebraska and Midland Empire Audubon Society, St. Joseph.

Visitor attendance was the highest for the event since 1996. Attendance for the office this year was 3,484 compared to last year's 1,656. The eagle show saw 2,013, compared to last year's 1,235, the auto tour loop ran 7,154 with last year's numbers at 2,190, and the bus tour had 679 visitors compared to 337 last year. The World Bird Sanctuary's live eagle program highlighted the two-day event drawing a good crowd.

Tribe. There were excellent wildlife viewing opportunities during the entire Eagle Days festival.

Bald eagles numbered more than 260 birds and geese more than 250,000. Freezing temperatures at night developed ice in most open water pools causing duck numbers to drop to 22,000 more or less.

Squaw Creek Refuge staff members conducted bus tours on the auto tour route for visitors. Volunteers staffed interpretive stops along the tour route assisting travelers in viewing bald eagles using telescopes. Auto traffic enjoyed the spectacular wildlife observations from the comfort of their vehicle or from interpretive viewing pull-

partment of Conservation coordinated the event for the 17 schools totaling 930 students plus teachers and parents. Schools attended from the local area, Kansas City and surrounding Northwest Missouri school districts. The World Bird Sanctuary gave talks with captive birds to the schools attending on Friday's field trips.

Students were given a bus tour stopping along the auto tour route to visit outdoor classroom stations staffed by volunteers and state conservation officials. The station speakers discussed wildlife topics and provided hands-on items related to eagles, waterfowl and furbearers.

Refuge migration bird numbers are available at the website: www.fws.gov/ squawcreek/midwest/waterfowl_surveys. The Refuge Visitor Contact Station is open weekdays from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Refuge trails and the 10-mile auto tour route are open daily from sunrise to sunset. Elvin Ungles, retired Mound City track coach, was among five individuals inducted into the MTCCCA Hall of Fame, December 12, at the Missouri Track and Cross Country Coaches Association annual clinic in December in Columbia, MO.

Elvin began teaching math at Mound City High School in 1966. In addition to teaching, he became a basketball, football, track and volleyball coach of junior and senior high students.

In all, Elvin coached 175 teams through the years, each of which are pictured on his walls at home.

Elvin had a passion for track and field events and it started during his school days at Skidmore. When given a chance to speak at the Hall of Fame Banquet, Elvin told of digging a pit at the farm and filling it with saw dust so he could high jump

Elvin coached the boys' high school track team from 1973-1998 and the high school girls' track team from 1989-1998. During that span of time, his teams brought home eight state trophies at the 1A level.

During those 26 years, the boys' track teams placed second in 1975, second in 1981, third in 1990, second in 1991 and second in 1998 at state. His teams had six conference championships, eight district championships and 94 individual and 30 relay placers in the state meets.

During those 10 years, the girls' track teams placed second in 1989, third in 1990 and fourth in 1998 at state. His teams had four conference championships, three district championships and 33 individual and seven relay placers in state meets.

Over the years, athletes under his tutelage earned over 280 medals, a total exceeded overall by only three other Hall of Fame members throughout the state. These numbers include 25 state champions in relay and individual events at the class 1 level.

During Elvin's speech he said, "I accept this on behalf of all the Mound City track athletes that I had the privilege of coaching. Without them, I wouldn't be accepting this award."

His love for the sport and the enjoyment of working with the kids is what Elvin remembers most. "The most exciting times were winning the conference or district meet and placing at state in the top four," Elvin commented. In all of his years of track coaching, Elvin went to state with at least one participant every year in boys' and girls'.

The kinds of stats that merited him the Hall of Fame status that he received.

The MTCCCA honored four other new inductees into the Hall of Fame on that date: Harriet Bland Green, Gold Medalist in the 400 meter relay in the 1936 Berlin Olympics; Harry Lineberry, track and cross coach at Neosho High School; Jim Vaughn, a 52 year veteran track and cross country coach from Springfield Hillcrest High School; and retired cross country coach, Tom O'Brien of St. Joe Central High School.

Citizens of Southeast Nebraska, Northwest Missouri, & Northeast Kansas:

The public response was fantastic! An estimated 376 persons attended the December 2nd public hearing on replacement of the U.S. Highway 159 Bridge over the Missouri River at Rulo and all who spoke expressed support for the project!

This project demonstrates how much people living in a democratic society can accomplish when they work together. Just a short 12 months ago prospects for a new bridge in the near term looked dim. Plans now call for construction to begin on a new bridge in 2011 and for the span to open in 2013.

As was stated at Rulo, this new bridge will vastly improve access of the area to the interstate highway system and will become a bridge to a brighter future for Southeast Nebraska, Northwest Missouri, and Northeast Kansas. It is a 32-million dollar infrastructure investment that will aid in recruitment of business and industry, have a positive impact on retail trade, and help the area realize its recreational and tourism potential. Imagine, by contrast, the awful negative consequences should we not embrace the opportunity to build a new bridge and because of a structural deficiency it would need to be closed down.



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Squaw Creek National Wildlife Refuge closed for annual deer hunt Kansas State 2008-2009

Wildlife Refuge will be closed to the general public on Saturday, January 3, and Sunday, January 4, 2009, for the annual muzzle loader white-tailed deer hunt.

Only those drawn for the hunt will be permitted on the Refuge during these days. Bluff Trial and Callow Memorial Trail are located near the refuge headquarters and both trails will remain open during the deer hunt. The Refuge auto tour will be closed primarily for visitor safety and hunter success.

The refuge headquarters is currently closed on weekends for the winter, then reopens for the spring bird migration in mid-March. Current Visitor Contact Station open hours are weekdays from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

Deer hunts were initiated in January 1988 to reduce a Refuge at (660) 442-3187.

Squaw Creek National rapidly expanding deer herd that was causing considerable damage to refuge habitats. In addition, reduction of the deer herd will help reduce deer-vehicle collisions along State Highways 118, 159, and Interstate-29.

The annual firearm muzzle loading deer hunt is a continuing effort by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Missouri Department of Conservation to provide quality hunting opportunities through resource management programs.

The deer hunt has been a popular event and continues to generate an interest in primitive firearm deer hunting.

The Squaw Creek Refuge will close at sunset Friday, January 2, and reopen at sunrise on Monday, January 5. Information regarding the deer hunt can be obtained by calling the Squaw Creek

Keeping livestock and pets safe through this holiday season

By Dr. Roy Wilson, DVM special Animals have needs during the cold winter months

Appropriate shelter, feed, and water are critically important this time of year. Livestock, including cattle and horses, need shelter. Although a covering is nice, most animals need to at least be able to get out of the wind, especially when an animal is damp or wet, they have more trouble staying warm than when dry (because the hair loses its insulation ability). So during wet times, the ability to get to shelter is even more important.

Animals get their energy to produce heat for themselves from their food. High quality nutrition is essential during the winter. For horses and cows, this means high quality roughage (e.g. high quality grass hay) to feed the microbes in the gut. Grain is season. often good to add to help with

Be careful with electric water heaters. Make sure you follow the manufacturer's instructions on installation and use. 



Spiced Nuts

Ingr<u>edients</u>

2 tablespoons (1/4 stick) butter or margarine

- 1 cup pecan halves
- 1 cup whole almonds
- 1 cup dry-roasted unsalted peanuts
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1 teaspoon chili powder
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic salt
- 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper

<u>Step 1:</u>

Preheat the oven to 300°. In a 13- by 9-inch baking pan, place butter; set the pan in the oven to melt the butter. Remove the pan from the oven; add pecans, almonds, peanuts, and Worcestershire sauce to the melted butter. Stir until well mixed.

Step 2:

Bake the nut mixture until it is toasted, stirring occasionally, about 30 minutes. Remove the nuts from the oven and sprinkle the mixture evenly with chili powder, garlic salt, and cayenne pepper. Toss until well mixed.

Transfer the warm nuts to a bowl and serve immediately, or let cool and store them at room temperature in an airtight container until ready to serve. Serve with a cooling drink. Makes 3 cups.

Hot Chocolate Espresso

Ingredients

- 1/2 cup strong hot coffee
- 1 to 3 teaspoons sugar (optional)
- 1/2 cup cream, or 1/4 cup half-and-half and 1/4 cup milk
- 1 1/2 teaspoons unsweetened cocoa
- Whipped cream

1 tablespoon milk chocolate, grated cinnamon stick

In a large cup or mug, mix the coffee and sugar, if desired. In a small saucepan over low heat, warm the cream. Add the cocoa and mix well. Add the cream mixture to the coffee and top with a dollop of whipped cream and the grated chocolate. Serve with a cinnamon stick. Makes about 1 cup.

Sausage Bites

<u>Ingredients</u>

- Nonstick cooking spray
- 2 cups buttermilk biscuit mix
- 1 pound reduced-fat country pork sausage (thawed, if frozen, crumbled)

1 cup shredded Monterey Jack cheese with jalapeño peppers (4 ounces)

1/2 cup shredded reduced-fat cheddar cheese (2 ounces) 3 tablespoons low-fat (1% milkfat) milk

Preheat the oven to 375° and spray 2 baking sheets with the cooking spray. In a large bowl, using a fork or your hands, mix the biscuit mix, sausage, and cheeses until well blended. Add the milk and blend thoroughly, then roll the mixture into 72 balls, 1 inch in diameter. Arrange the balls on the baking sheets and bake for 20 minutes or just until golden brown. Serve hot with toothpicks. Makes about 72 appetizers.

Whiskey Eggnog

Ingredients

4 eggs 1/2 cup sugar 3 cups milk 1 teaspoon vanilla extract 1/2 cup whiskey 1/2 teaspoon freshly grated nutmeg 1 cup heavy cream


<u>Step 1</u>:

In a saucepan, beat the eggs and sugar until creamy. In a second saucepan over low heat, heat 2 cups of the milk until hot. Slowly add to the egg mixture, stirring continuously. Cook over low heat, stirring, for 15 to 20 minutes or until the mixture reaches 170°F and has thickened. Stir in the remaining milk, vanilla, whiskey, and half the nutmeg. or until golden. Chill 3 hours.

<u>Step 2</u>:

In a medium bowl, beat the cream until soft peaks form. Fold into the milk mixture. Ladle the eggnog into a punch bowl and sprinkle with the remaining grated nutmeg.

This traditional holiday drink is saved from raw-egg problems by cooking the custard. Brandy or rum can be substituted for whiskey. Makes 6 cups.



Orange Eggnog Punch

Ingredients

- 1 quart reduced-fat dairy eggnog
- or 1 can (1 quart) eggnog
- 1 can (12 oz.) frozen orange juice concentrate (thawed)
- 1 can (12 oz.) ginger ale (chilled)

In a pitcher, stir eggnog and orange juice concentrate until well mixed. Pour in ginger ale and stir gently. Makes eight 7-ounce servings.

Shirley Temple

Ingredients

- 8 teaspoons grenadine syrup
 - or frozen cranberry juice concentrate
- 2 cups (16 ounces) chilled ginger ale
- 4 maraschino cherries with stems
- 4 strips lemon zest
- 4 wedges fresh orange

In each of four 6-ounce cocktail or saucer-style champagne glasses, spoon 2 teaspoons of grenadine and fill to the rim with the ginger ale. Stir, then drop one cherry and one strip of lemon zest into each glass. Cut a small slit in the center of each orange wedge and place on the rim of each glass. Makes four 4-ounce servings. Button Ham Biscuits

<u>Ingredients</u>

- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1/4 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/4 teaspoon onion powder
- 1/2 cup reduced-fat sour cream
- 1/4 cup ground cooked lower-sodium ham
- 3 tablespoon low-fat (1% milkfat) milk

Step 1:

Preheat the oven to 450°F. In a medium-size bowl, stir together the flour, baking powder, dry mustard, baking soda, and onion powder until well mixed. Using a wooden spoon, stir in the sour cream, ham, and milk; mix just until a soft dough forms.

<u>Step 2</u>:

Knead for 30 seconds on a floured surface, then pat into a 7-inch circle, using a well-floured 1-inch scalloped or round cutter, cut into biscuits; reroll and cut scraps. Place biscuits 1 inch apart on a lightly greased baking sheet; brush the tops with additional milk if you like. Bake for 10 minutes

Cranberry Punch

- <u>Ingredients</u>
- 2 cups cranberry juice
- 2 cups pineapple juice
- 1 cup orange juice
- 3/4 cup triple sec (optional) 1 pint strawberries, hulled and sliced
- 1 lime, thinly sliced
- 4 cups ginger ale, chilled

In a large glass container, combine ingredients and chill

thoroughly. Just before serving, slowly stir in the ginger ale. Pour into a punch bowl or large jug and add ice cubes. For a less sweet punch, substitute seltzer or club soda for the ginger ale. Makes about 1 1/2 quarts.

Herbed Cheese Spread

Ingredients

1 cup plain low-fat yogurt

1 tablespoon minced (or dried) fresh basil or thyme

1/4 teaspoon garlic powder

1/4 teaspoon grated lemon rind

1/4 teaspoon black pepper

Line a sieve with 100 percent cotton cheesecloth, coffee filter, or a white paper towel and place over a bowl. Spoon in the yogurt. Cover and refrigerate for at least 6 hours or until it is cream-cheese consistency. Discard the liquid in bowl.

<u>Step 2</u>:

Transfer the yogurt to a small bowl. Stir in the basil, garlic powder, lemon rind, and pepper until well mixed. Serve the spread with an assortment of crackers or party rye or pumpernickel bread. Makes 2/3 cup.

I remember when I was nine or ten; we always decorated the New Point Presbyterian Church. We made paper chains and strung popcorn. In those days all the decorations were handmade as no one had extra money.

Our Sunday school teacher was Grace Kunkel. I really loved her. We had a Christmas program every year. This was held during the evening on Christmas Eve. We had an open carriage that we took to the program.





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Ask the Ag Team

Baker, Horticulture Specialist, University of Missouri Extension, Daviess County

One of the premier conferences for vegetable growers is found right here in northwest Missouri. Held in St. Joseph, MO, the Great Plains Vegetable Conference is put together every year by Extension educators from five states: Missouri, Kansas, Iowa, Nebraska, and South Dakota. The conference will be held next month on January 8-10, 2009.

This conference is open to everyone, from backyard gardeners to commercial vegetable growers. Topics cover not only vegetables, but also small fruits and flowers. There are also presentations targeted toward organic growers.

The event begins with two pre-conference workshops on Thursday. The first explores the use of high tunnels in vegetable and fruit production. High tunnels, sometimes called hoop houses, are similar to traditional plastic greenhouses, except that they are normally not heated. Their main use is season extension. Typically, crops will be several weeks earlier in the spring, and will remain viable several weeks later in the fall, compared to field crops.

The second pre-conference workshop looks at a popular method of marketing known as Community Supported Agriculture (CSA). CSA's allow the farmer to make sales before the growing season even starts, by selling subscriptions. A family, for example, may sign up to receive a bag or two of fresh produce during the growing season. Typically, they pay in advance for the produce. Then, the farmer delivers the agreed-upon amount of produce every week to his customers. The main conference begins on Friday. There are four concurrent tracks to choose from, so there is usually something of interest for everyone. Some of the tracks include organics, hydroponics, general vegetable production, bees, small fruit, cut flowers, greenhouse production, farm business, farmers' markets, ethnic vegetables, conserving farm energy usage and more. Many of the talks are given by university researchers, and discuss the latest studies on vegetable management, diseases, cultivar selection, and similar topics. Other talks are presented by successful farmers, who share their stories in the hopes

Great Plains Vegeta- that they can benefit an*ble Conference-* by *Tim* other grower. They usually do. These talks are always followed by many questions from farmers who are looking for practical advice, and experienced farmers such as these will have a lot to share.

There will be approximately 30 exhibitors available to provide information about seeds, irrigation, horticulture equipment, chemicals, and other topics. Meals, break refreshments, and handouts will be included in the \$35 per day registration fee for the main conference. If you wish to attend the special pre-conference high tunnel workshop on Thursday, the cost is \$50, and the CSA workshop is \$60. Registrations made after December 26 will cost an additional \$5 per day.

The conference is being held at a new location this year, on the campus of Missouri Western State University. For more information about the conference and a registration form, call the Buchanan County Extension office at (816) 279-1691. Washing house plantsby Tim Baker, Horticulture Specialist, University of Missouri Extension, Daviess County

Generallyhorticulturists don't like to see wet leaves on plants since this often leads to disease, but house plants with large, smooth leaves, like the rubber tree plant, actually benefit from periodic washing from time to time. Wash them with clear, clean water periodically to remove dust and grime. This will keep the leaf pores open, and generally improve

MoDOT ready to go forward with 34 transportation projects

The Missouri Department of Transportation (Mo- projects can be found at www.modot.org. DOT) is ready to go forward with 34 transportation projects that could be awarded within 180 days of passage of an economic stimulus package that contains at least \$25 billion for transportation infrastructure investments nationwide. The projects, which would total about \$510 million, would create about 14,000 jobs and have a \$2.4 billion impact on the state's economy. Given additional funding beyond \$510 million, significant portions of four additional highway projects totaling roughly \$290 million could be underway in 2009.

MoDOT outlined the road, bridge, air, rail, transit, waterway and pedestrian projects it could readily accomplish at a meeting of the Missouri Highways and Transportation Commission held recently.

"We stand ready to quickly deliver 34 transportation improvements that would mean jobs, increased safety and a better quality of life for Missourians," MoDOT Director Pete Rahn said. "These are muchneeded projects that will benefit Missouri citizens, and we urge Congress to act positively on an economic stimulus package that includes a minimum of \$25 billion for transportation infrastructure projects."

Rahn said federal funding for infrastructure projects would have a vital ripple effect. It would create jobs for road builders and designers and demand for related supplies and services, as well as further economic development around the improvements.

"The job creation will go beyond just those building the projects," Rahn said. "Suppliers, retailers, restaurants, hotels and other businesses will benefit."

MoDOT would be ready to go with about \$137 million of work on Interstates 70, 44, 55, 35 and 29. Approximately \$60 million would go toward fixing the state's lettered routes in rural Missouri. The rest would be used on a variety of transportation projects throughout the state. A complete list of the proposed

"Under our proposed plan, all forms of travel would benefit, not just highways, and projects would be spread throughout the state to ensure all regions reap some of the economic gain," Rahn said.

Seventeen of the proposed projects are already included in the state's five-year construction program, but would be sped up, some by up to four years. Projects would then be added to the statewide construction program to replace those that were accelerated. Seventeen are new projects that have been identified as regional priorities and on which environmental work and preliminary design are already underway.

Rahn said Congress should not be concerned road and bridge improvements couldn't be put into place fast enough to provide the desired economic relief.

"We know we can award \$510 million worth of work or more within 180 days of the stimulus bill's passage, with a considerable amount in less time," Rahn said. "Investing in our infrastructure is the best course of action Congress could take. Not only would it provide an immediate economic shot in the arm, but it would yield the long-term benefits of safer highways and enhanced quality of life."

Rahn said any stimulus package couldn't come too soon. He noted many states have had to delay projects because of the decline in revenue generated by fuel use and motor vehicle sales. While MoDOT has not yet had to postpone or cancel projects, state revenues are down almost five percent for the first four months of the fiscal year - about an \$18 million decline. If the trend continues, the state could face a \$73 million shortfall by the end of the fiscal year.

MoDOT's Ready-to-Go Transportation Projects include Atchison County, Hwy. 136 – Painting, new deck and bridge repairs on Missouri River bridge at Brownville, NE - \$9 million; Statewide Minor Routes - Provide 700 to 1,400 miles of pavement improvements to statewide lettered rural routes - \$30-\$60 million; and Statewide Transit - Purchase 200 public transit vehicles statewide - \$10-\$20 million.


