Majority of Holt County ignores Preference Election

When Holt County polls closed on Tuesday, February 7, it was evident that only a small percentage of Holt County voters felt the need to cast their vote in the Presidential Primary Preference Election. Only 9.38% of Holt County voters showed at the polls, that's 339 of the 3,614 registered voters.

Those that did travel to the polls mirrored the rest of the state and chose Rick Santorum on the Republican ballot with 186 votes. Other 'top' vote getters were Mitt Romney with 51 votes, Ron Paul with 36 and Uncommitted with 21. Total Republican votes tallied 307.

On the Democratic ticket, Barack Obama received 26 votes, Randall Terry 4 and John Wolfe 2. Total Democratic votes reached 32.

No votes were cast on either the Libertarian Party or Constitutional Party ballots.

The 57th quadrennial United States Presidential Election will be held on Tuesday, November 6, 2012, and it is expected to feature the incumbent, President Barack Obama, for the Democrats, against a yet to be decided Republican candidate, and the increasingly obligatory third-party nominee. The five-month

caucus process that began January 3 and will end June 5, will culminate with the Republican Party Convention on August 27-30 in Tampa, FL, and the Democratic Party Convention, which will be held September 3-6 in Charlotte, NC.

Council agrees to contract out street maintenance instead of purchasing equipment

The regular meeting of the out the area and put in a new Board of Aldermen for the city of Mound City, MO, was held on Thursday, February 9, 2012. Mayor Larry Russell called the meeting to order at 5:30 p.m. and led the Pledge of Allegiance. Those present were Larry Russell, Robert Heck, Jim Krueger, Kristine Gibson, Jason Biermann, City Clerk Patsy Smith, City Collector Kelly Miller, Water Superintendent Randy Crowley, Police Chief John Panning, Rick Bradley, Mr. and Mrs. Bob Burnett, Larry Knapp, Chris Krueger and City Attorney Brian

Alderman Heck stated he is withdrawing his vote and abstaining from the motion to approve payment of bills at the January 10, 2012, meeting. Alderman Krueger moved to approve this revision of the minutes and approve the bills as paid, Gibson seconded. Unanimously approved. There being no other additions, deletions or corrections, Alderman Heck moved to waive the reading of the minutes from the January 10, 2012, regular meeting and the January 19, 2012, special meeting and approve them as corrected, Gibson seconded. Approved unanimously.

Presentations/Guests

Rock Port Cablevision: Acquisition of Superior Cable - Rick Bradley, Rock Port Cablevision, presented information pertaining to the acquisition of Superior Cable, effective March 1, 2012. Rock Port Cablevision has submitted a franchise application to the Public Service Commission to provide video service in Mound City, which can take up to 30 days for approval. Bradley reported that, initially, Rock Port Cable will not increase prices and some of the Superior customers who had a rate increase the first of February will have their rate adjusted back down to the previous rate. Rock Port Cable intends to bring fiber optics down outer roads from Rock Port to provide a digital platform with DVR and faster internet service. Bradley noted Rock Port Cable has more than one technician that will be working in the area in case of outages and the local office will receive payments, questions, etc. Council members asked about setting up a local channel. Bradley said that is something that Rock Port Cable can definitely do, but it

Larry Knapp, White Rose Restaurant & Gift: Parking Lot Entrance and Handicap Ramp on Sidewalk - Larry Knapp was present to answer questions from the January council meeting regarding the parking lot entrance on 6th Street. Knapp indicated that he intends to put a concrete driveway onto 6th Street this spring when the weather is warmer. He doesn't want to go to the expense of putting it in and have it crack because of the temperature/weather. Knapp said that he and his insurance agent are also concerned with other sections of the sidewalk on 6th Street that are trip hazards. He intends to cut out and replace some sections and will also ramp or slope the sidewalk at the front door for handicap accessibility.

Street Conditions: Bob Burnett, Snyder & Associates, was present to discuss the condition of the streets and the new street overlay project. Burnett presented a map detailing which streets are included and whether they will get a 1" or 2" overlay. The overlay is only on the traveled roadway, not up to the curb/sidewalk. Burnett was asked about the best way to seal the new streets and if it would be better to purchase equipment for this or hire a contractor to do it. Burnett said, in all reality, it would probably be cheaper to have somebody else do it because the equipment needed is expensive for no more often than it would be used. Burnett said an oil seal requires some type of aggregate on top to keep it from being slick until it cures. The Missouri Department of Transportation (MoDOT) is now using emulsified oil, which is thinned with water. It applies the oil, drags across it to fill the cracks and then puts black slag on top. The water evaporates quickly and leaves a thicker oil-coated road. Burnett says if the streets are cracking, they just need to be sealed, but if they are warping and breaking up, a seal doesn't help much and the street needs to be resurfaced. As for potholes, Burnett says there is no simple fix. He said the best way is to cut

base, but that is probably not cost effective. The common way to repair potholes is to put patch material in the hole and pack it in and repair as much as possible with the money available. Alderman Heck pointed out that most of the streets asphalted in 2008 have a concrete base, so they should last a long time while most of the streets in the current project have a dirt or gravel base. Mr. Burnett said MoDOT will have a lot of asphalt work in the area this summer and he will keep in contact with them so that the city is ready to advertise and bid at the same time. Crowley reported that the city has already patched most of the bad areas. Burnett will include about 915 square yards of milling in the contract, for around \$4,000, to remove bumps.

Alderman Gibson questioned if any consideration has been given to resurfacing the parking lot at the pool. Council members agreed the parking lot is in bad condition, but it is not included in this project.

Davis Creek Bridge: Mr. Burnett said there are no special federal funds for city bridges, but the bridge over Davis Creek is included in the overall umbrella of the county inventory for BRO funds and Holt County could fund replacement of this bridge if it wanted. Alderman Heck will try to meet with county commissioners next week for further discussion.

Old Business

M.C. Community Center-Property Survey & Purchase: Attorney Tubbs reported that he has received the legal description from the survey of property adjacent to the Mound City Community Center that the city has agreed to sell. He will send that information to the title company and then the sale can be closed. **Department Reports**

Police – The monthly report was reviewed and discussed. Panning reported that the new 2012 Chevy Impala is almost done and he should receive notification of a ship date shortly. Panning also noted that there have been two recent instances where impounded dogs were illegally removed from the kennel during the night.

Sewer Department - Alderman Biermann reviewed a proposal from Hall Construction for placement of rock at various locawon't be ready when the system tions around the lagoon cells. Alderman Biermann motioned to accept the proposal from Hall Construction totaling \$4,140 for 150 tons of rip rap, hauling and placement of the rock at the lagoon, Heck seconded. Approved unanimously.

Biermann questioned the status of the walnut trees sold from the lagoon property. Smith reported that the trees were paid for the day after the January meeting and Crowley reported that the trees have been taken

Water Department - System Upgrades & Improvements: Randy Crowley was hoping to have information from Bartlett and West engineers regarding water system upgrades, but instead, reviewed his list which includes: Replace sink and cabinets in the lab room, doors and door jams need replaced, the pump room needs a heater wired in, a new auger-type lime feeder to feed to the center of the basin for better consistency, new drains in the lime room, replacement of the filter media and expansion of the clear well. Crowley said when the plant was built in 1998, it could go a week before having to backwash the filters, but now it has to backwash daily. which wastes a lot of water. Also, there is a new media that can be put on top of the filters that might help remove some of the MTBE from the water. Crowley feels expansion of the clear well would enable it to run the plant and store enough water during regular work hours so it would not kick on at night. If not, the city may have to hire someone to run tests at night. DNR requires someone to be at the water plant doing testing anytime it is running. Other issues include: the meter system at the plant needs updated, the computer panel board needs replaced because parts are no longer being made for it, there is a water hammer problem when the electricity goes out, the roof is starting to peel, and a new chlorine analyzer, generator and clear well

floats are needed. Crowley said

without engineering and DNR approval, but expanding the clear well definitely has to be engineered. The council reviewed a letter from Bartlett & West concerning the low level of MTBE in the water and agreed to leave the MTBE funds invested in an interest bearing account at Nodaway Valley Bank for now.

In other discussion, Crowley said that the Rural Water District is looking into additional connections to the city's system.

Street Department - Street Overlay Project: Council members agreed to have a public hearing at the March meeting concerning the G.O. bond issue to finance the street project and will also try to give short presentations at some of the local club/ organization meetings before the April election. Smith was to check into costs to put an insert in the Mound City News to explain the bond proposal. Russell suggested putting flyers up in business windows.

Aldermen also felt that the city needs to enforce weight limits on city streets, especially after the resurfacing is done.

Maintenance Equipment: The council felt it would be more economical to hire contractors for street maintenance/sealing than to purchase equipment and have it sit around most of the year; and agreed to not look any further at purchasing state surplus

Park /Pool Department - Bids for Electrical Improvements: The clerk reported no bids were received. Council members felt these improvements are needed, as it is a dangerous situation, and agreed to advertise again for bids. The council will also contact some local contractors to see if they are interested. Bids will be reviewed at the March meeting.

Griffith Park BBQ Pit: Alderman Gibson reported the Mound City Lions Club is sponsoring a project to rebuild the barbeque pit at the shelter house in Griffith Park and the Lions have a quote of \$6,997 for work including: Replacing the stone on the front, replacing the fire bricks and tearing out and replacing the concrete between the pit and the shelter house. Gibson has spoken with several organizations in town about donating Gibson motioned to donate to the Lions Club the balance remaining after other donations have been made for repairs to the BBQ pit at Griffith Park, Biermann seconded. Approved unanimously.

Request Bids for Mowing Parks: Council members agreed to advertise for bids for mowing of city parks this summer.

Play Equipment: Alderman Gibson discussed a schedule for installing the new swing set at City Hall Park. 
