H1N1 virus still at large

Flu season is not over yet, and the H1N1 virus is still causing illness, especially among children. Parents are urged to make sure young children get a second shot.

The H1N1 flu that sickened thousands of Missourians last fall still presents a potentially serious health threat, despite the public perception that the flu pandemic is over.

While hospital emergency rooms are no longer being overwhelmed with flu patients, people are still becoming ill with the flu. So far this flu season, 28,461 Missourians have had the flu, about 42 times as many as last year. Nearly 66 percent of children younger than 14 vears old.

Because young children are among those hardest hit by the H1N1 flu, state health officials are urging parents to make sure their young children have received the H1N1 vaccine. Children under 10 years old require two doses of the H1N1 vaccine given about 30 days apart.

Margaret Donnelly, director of the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services, said the number of flu cases is still running above normal.

Though people may have the impression that the H1N1 flu has run its course, it is just too early to say the threat has passed," said Mar-

garet Donnelly. "People are still getting sick with the flu and we certainly are still keeping watch on the H1N1 situation. We urge people to protect their families against the flu, especially children who need that second dose to be fully protected."

Nationally, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reports that as many as 80 million Americans have been infected with H1N1 flu and an estimated 11,000 people have died. More than 1,000 of those deaths involved children and the toll continues to rise, with nine more children succumbing to the H1N1 virus last week.

Children younger than five this year's flu patients were years old have higher rates of hospitalization caused by H1N1 than any other age group and school-age children have the highest rates of infection, the CDC says.

The H1N1 vaccine is now widely available and free of charge if obtained from a local health agency. The vaccine is made the same way seasonal flu vaccines produced every year and has been found equally safe and effective based on evidence from some 65 million Americans who have received it.

HEART DISEASE February is American Heart Month

A growing number of Missourians have high blood pressure, one of the major risk factors for heart disease. More than 29 percent of adults in Missouri reported having high blood pressure in 2007 compared to just over 27 percent a decade earlier, according to the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services.

February is American Heart Month, and Holt County residents are urged to get their blood pressure checked on a regular basis to help prevent heart disease – Missouri's leading cause of death.

One of the most important things you can do to help keep your heart healthy is get your blood pressure checked. You can have this done for free, at Holt County Health Department. If your blood pressure is high, you need to take steps to control it and reduce your risk for developing heart disease.

High blood pressure is sometimes called the "silent killer" because it often has no symptoms until serious problems develop. In addition to damaging the heart, high blood pressure can damage other major organs including the kidneys and eyes.

A normal blood pressure reading is 120/80, while a blood pressure level greater than 140/90 is high. A person whose blood pressure falls in between those levels is considered to have prehypertension and is at serious risk of developing high blood pres-

People of all ages can have high blood pressure, but a person is at a greater risk for developing high blood pressure if they:

• Are overweight or obese • Have high blood cholesterol or diabetes

• Consume too much salt and not enough potassium • Consume too much alcohol



- Davis Fertilizer and Feed in Graham, MO, held its Grand Opening on Saturday, February 27. Specials included free coffee, donuts, and balloons for kids, as well as special pricing on feed, bulk fertilizer and feed.
- •Ten pounds of beet sugar cost \$.89 and a 2 lb. package of bacon cost \$.73.

25 Years Ago - 1985

- About four miles south of Mound City on I-29, a severe accident during icy road conditions occurred. A semi trailer lost control, struck a parked vehicle, then jackknifed over the top of another car, pinning the four occupants. With the timely, excellent care given by many individuals and units in the area, all victims were saved.
