Honor Flight veterans enjoy lunch

Six of the Mound City World War II Veterans who participated in the Honor Flight joined Gary Swanson, Honor Flight Coordinator, for lunch on Wednesday, February 17, at the Squaw Creek Eagle Nest Plaza.

Gary Swanson, Leawood, KS, organized the Honor Flight for the local WWII veterans as well as for the many others across the state who have been able to participate in the trips.

Each trip takes a lot of work and coordination. Gary raised the funds needed for three such trips, with the cost at roughly \$25,000 per flight of 55 vets. Bus transportation, meals, doctors, and many other details have to be worked out prior to each trip. He has gleaned funding from nearly 150 different sources to help make the three trips he has coordinated thus far possible.

Gary became deeply interested in veterans after his retirement from IBM. He has been working on the Veterans' History Project of Congress since 1993, interviewing more than 1,000 WWII vets to glean information. In conjunction with that project, Gary has video interviewed each of the WWII veterans that made the Honor Flight trip this past fall. They have a copy

of the interview as well as one being housed at the Library of Congress.

Gary scheduled the dinner after being impressed with the men from these small local communities, very similar to one he grew up in.

Gary remarked as he spanned the group at the table, "It's all about these guys, they're the ones that are to be honored. They're stories are remarkable."

The veterans have been given a DVD of pictures taken during their trip to the Memorial in Washington, DC, including their flight where they received the special surprise of the 'mail call'.

The group was grateful for Gary's efforts that resulted in such a memorable trip, and appreciated the visit with him over lunch.

Holt County Historical Society apologizes

The Sportsman's Lodge opens

The Sportman's Lodge in Bigelow, MO, is now open. The lodge is located approximately 4 miles west of Mound City, MO on Hwy. 118.

The 1915 Bigelow School, whose walls have sat quietly for years, will once again tell stories to the many people who will pass through the doors. The old chalkboards, that were uncovered during the remodeling, still hold some of the signatures of past teachers. Both the chalkboards are backdrops for the banquet room at the lodge.

Bill Hutting, Shawnee Mission, KS, found this icon just over a year ago, became intrigued by its history and decided to make the purchase

and restore the building. Roberta Feist partnered with Bill in the endeavor.

"I started out looking for a man cave, and here I am," Bill stated as he gave a tour of the newly renovated spaces.

The tearing down and rebuilding was done by Bill himself, his son Cole, Floyd Compton and several others who assisted with the labor intensive work.

The main floor boasts a banquet room, a room with the bar and restaurant, restrooms and a room that will be converted to a pro shop.

The restaurant will be open for lunch from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. and for dinner from 4:30 to 9:00 p.m. Sunday through Saturday, with plans to extend hours during hunting season.

A hand selected diverse menu offers a variety of choices, including pasta, salads, steaks, chicken, the Bigelow Club and homemade pies. It will also feature barbeque from Quick's BBQ, a business established 60 years ago in Wyandotte County.

Jim Maxfield will be the chef at the lodge. Jim brings experience to the lodge, having been the kitchen manager at Terrible's Casino, worked at Bristol's on the Plaza, at Houlihan's and opened many Cheddar's Restaurants.

The third room on the main floor will soon be converted



into a pro shop. The shop will change slightly with the seasons (turkey, deer, duck, etc.), providing hunters with needed supplies such as shells, gloves, hand warmers, hunting apparel and other needed or forgotten items.

The old auditorium, in the upper floor of the school, had been converted into eight rooms, when Georgia Stone had the building open for a lodge. The area has been opened up again and will now offer a cigar room with a television.

Another prominent asset of the new business is the cabins that flank the old school

to the west. Eight cabins are available for rent at nightly rates. Each new log cabin-type-unit with a screened in porch, features a kitchenette and sleeps up to six people.

Bill had hoped to do a more formal grand opening, but with remodeling time restraints and hunting season around the corner, it just wasn't feasible.

The establishment offers satellite television and Wi-Fi internet.

Reservations can be made for the cabins and questions can be answered by calling The Sportsman's Lodge at 660-442-5165.

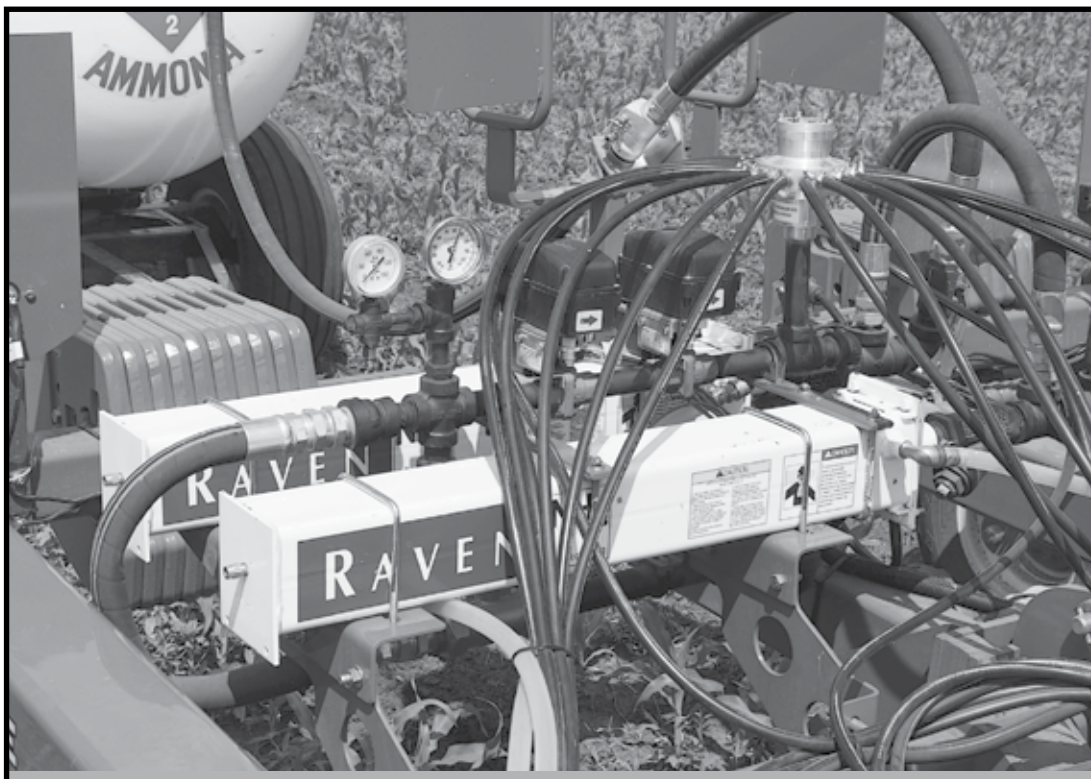

Graves-Chapple Farm 2009 annual report

Are you looking for possible ways to reduce your fertilizer needs? Are you curious about the effect doubling your point

rows has on your corn yield? Will long term no-till work in northwest Missouri? Answers to these and many other topics can be found in the Graves-Chapple Farm 2009 annual report.

This report is a compilation of results from many of the research and demonstration projects conducted at the Graves-Chapple Farm. Most trials encompass several years of data to assist producers in making decisions for their farming operations.

Established in 1988, the Graves-Chapple Farm is a research and demonstration site located in southwest Atchison County. Projects at this site are devoted to various agronomic practices, with a major emphasis on the production of corn and soybeans. Work with

forages, other row crops and alternative crops is also conducted. Soil conservation and water quality issues are also addressed.

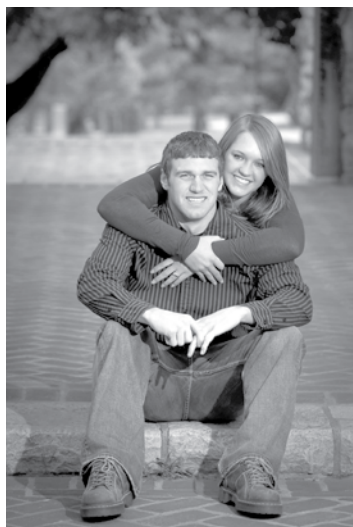

2010 Census forms are filling mailboxes across the U.S.

Mound City residents and others across the United States are receiving 2010 Census forms in the mail. The U.S. Census counts every resident in the United States, and is required by the U.S. Constitution to take place every 10 years.

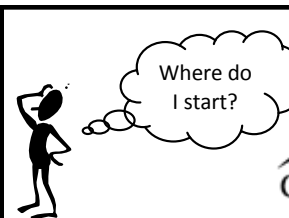
Census forms are being delivered to every residence in the United States and Puerto Rico. Once forms are received, just answer the 10 short questions and then mail the form back in the postage-paid envelope provided. If the form is not returned, you may receive a visit from a census taker, who will ask the questions from the form. Any personal data provided is protected under federal law.

The Census Bureau does not send out any confirmations that your form was received. Any request for census information from the Census Bureau will be clearly identified as coming from the U.S. Census Bureau and as OFFICIAL BUSINESS of the United States. It is a federal offense for anyone to pretend they represent the Census Bureau. Before your household receives a mailed form, a phone call or a visit from the Census Bureau, you will be given a few days notice with a letter from the Census Bureau Director.

All responses are important. Results from the 2010 Census will be used to help communities receive more than \$400 billion in federal funds each year for highways; schools; health facilities; job training centers; senior centers; bridges, tunnels, and other public works projects; emergency services; and many other programs needed. The data collected by the census also helps determine the number of seats Missouri and other states have in the U.S. House of Representatives.

Without a complete, accurate census, communities may not receive their fair share. For those who need assistance in filling out the form, go to 2010.census.gov.

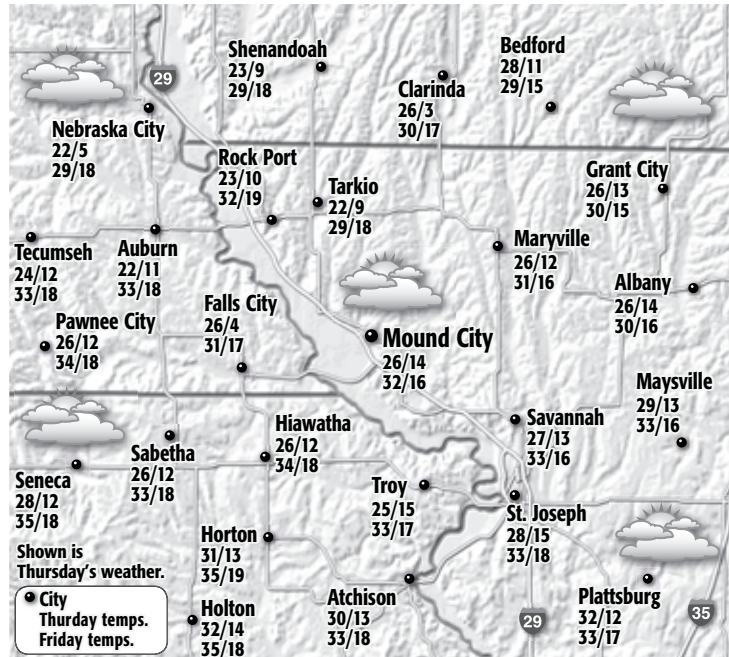

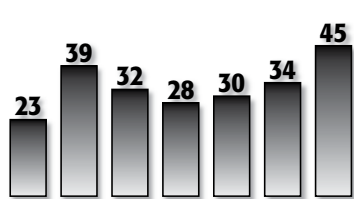

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Red Cross disaster drills throughout eight Counties

On Friday, February 19, eight disaster shelters were activated to test the readiness and practice the response of 207 volunteers to open shelters and care for their neighbors.

This was the first time Red Cross had conducted eight drills simultaneously. The American Red Cross is working with its community shelter volunteers, churches, County Emergency Management and its partners in sheltering the Missouri Family Support Division to simulate response to a crisis.

The drill in Mound City was to begin at the Mound City Methodist Church at 9:00 a.m. and conclude by about 12:00 p.m., but the weather kept those who were trained from attending.

Kevin Connell, exercise monitor for the event, reported that with the bad weather, the drill changed. Twelve high school students had been solicited to help, acting as disaster victims, but with no school, that became impossible.

Presiding Commissioner Mark Sitherwood, County Clerk Kathy Kunkel, Dana Thompson and Jane Moyer-representatives from the Division of Family Services; Rhonda Hunzinger, Holt County Emergency Management Director; and Crystal

Karr did attend the program. The program became a two-hour mini version of a two-day course.

Connell addressed what to do if a shelter needed to be opened in Mound City should there be a disaster. A wide variety of scenarios were covered with the class. Procedures for how to physically set up a shelter, who to contact, how to close a shelter, as well as many other elements were shared with the group. The group used equipment and supplies from the county's Disaster Supply Trailer.

With the day's events, it became evident that Mound City is in need of more hands-on training. There is a great need to have several local volunteers who can be called upon to set up a shelter in the event of a disaster. If there are those who would like to be able to assist with this much needed preparedness, the County Clerk's office can be contacted for further information.

"Successful disaster response happens because of great planning and preparedness. Preparedness means having the right people at the right places with right training at right times," stated Karla Long, Emergency Services Director of the Midland Empire Chapter.

Grant dollars available for recycling projects

The Northwest Missouri Regional Solid Waste Management District has received grant funds from the Missouri Department of Natural Resources to disseminate to public, private and not-for-profit sectors throughout Atchison, Gentry, Holt, Nodaway and Worth counties.

The grant funds are intended to reduce the amount of waste entering the local waste stream and/or to facilitate recycling. Any individual or organization with an idea for a project to recycle, reduce, or reuse such items as: paper, organic waste, resin plastics, or electronics can submit an application and may be awarded funds to support their project.

Previous grants approved have included the purchase of wood chippers, recycling bins and refurbished equipment that assist in recycling or waste reduction activities. District grant dollars have also helped establish outdoor classrooms for schools.

Preference shall be given to projects that reduce, reuse, recycle or strengthen consumer demand for the following post-consumer

wastes, including paper, glass, metal, plastics, demolition waste, organic waste, yard waste, waste oil, lead acid batteries and electronics. Applications will be evaluated according to several criteria. Some of those criteria are:

- How well the project contributes to community-based economic development.
- If the project promotes waste reduction or recycling.
- Project feasibility.
- If the project has an effective marketing strategy.
- If the project can be implemented in a timely manner.
- How well the project complies with federal, state and local requirements.

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Health department offers web-based calculator to weigh risks of high blood pressure

A new online tool is available to assist Missourians in reducing their risk of heart disease and other conditions associated with high blood pressure.

The High Blood Pressure Health Risk Calculator uses height, weight, blood pressure and other factors to determine the user's risk from uncontrolled high blood pressure. It then evaluates the potential for developing heart attack, stroke, heart failure and kidney disease. The calculator also estimates how lifestyle changes can lower blood pressure and other health risks.

The calculator is a joint effort by the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services and the American Heart Association.

"If your blood pressure is high, you need to take steps to get it under control," said Anita Berwanger, manager of the state health department's

Heart Disease and Stroke Prevention Program. "The online calculator provides a visual depiction of the individual's risks based on their own data, and offers alternatives that can literally save their lives."

High blood pressure is one of the major risk factors for heart disease – the leading cause of death in the United States and in Missouri. High blood pressure is also the number one risk factor for stroke – the third most common cause of death nationwide and the leading cause of disability in the state.

High blood pressure is sometimes called a "silent killer", because it usually has no symptoms until serious problems develop. It can afflict people of all ages. Experts estimate that one in three adults suffers from high blood pressure, though many do not know they have it.

A normal blood pressure

reading is 120/80, while a blood pressure level greater than 140/90 is high. A person who has a blood pressure reading higher than 120/80, but less than 140/90, is considered to have pre-hypertension and is at risk for developing high blood pressure.

"The online risk calculator helps users identify lifestyle changes that can reduce their risk for developing many health problems," Berwanger said.

A person is at greater risk for developing high blood pressure if they:

- Are overweight or obese
- Have high blood cholesterol
- Have diabetes
- Consume too much salt and not enough potassium
- Drink too much alcohol
- Smoke tobacco

Missourians can take several steps to keep their blood pressure at a healthy level:

- Monitor your cholesterol levels
- Control diabetes
- Be physically active
- Eat a healthy diet to promote a healthy weight
- Avoid smoking and excessive alcohol use
- Have your blood pressure checked regularly. If it is high, be sure to follow your doctor's recommendations for treating it
- Take medications as prescribed

Protect your home - Act now to reduce ice dams

This winter has provided many weather extremes. Snow, ice, rain as well as very cold weather followed immediately by warm, sunny days. All this moisture and the fluctuating temperatures have resulted in ice dams being a major problem. The formation of ice dams on your roof can cause serious damage to your house.

Ice dams are caused by non-uniform roof surface temperatures. In the winter, when warm air inside the house leaks into the unheated attic, it creates warm areas on the roof, which, in turn, causes the snow on the exterior of the roof to melt. The melting snow moves down the roof slope until it reaches the cold overhang, where it refreezes. The process continues, causing ice to build up along the eaves and form a dam. Eventually this dam forces the water to back up under the shingles and sometimes into the ceiling or wall inside the home.

Besides dislodged roof shingles, sagging gutters, damaged insulation and water stains on interior ceilings and walls, water from ice dams may cause structural framing members to decay, metal fasteners to corrode, and mold and mildew to form in attics and on wall surfaces.

Ice dams can be prevented by controlling the heat loss from the home. Increase the ceiling/roof insulation to at least R-38 (R-43 is better) to cut down on heat loss. Make sure the ceiling is airtight, so no warm air can flow from the house into the attic space. Do this by plugging gaps around plumbing vents, wiring, recessed lights, and chimneys. Before you insulate over or around recessed lights, make sure they are rated for contact with insulation. Some

of them are not and covering them with insulation can result in a fire.

Keep the attic cold by providing at least two square feet of attic vent for each 150 square feet of attic area. Where the roof rafters meet the walls at the eaves, provide a 1½-inch clearance between the roof sheathing and the ceiling insulation to allow proper ventilation. Also, make sure the gutters are clean. This will help let any rain or melting snow drain away before it freezes.

If an ice dam does form, remove snow from the roof using a "roof rake" or push broom, but take care not to damage the roofing materials. However, performing this work on or below the roof can be very dangerous, and is a job best left to the professionals.

If you find that you do have an ice dam, do not attempt to break up the ice with a hammer. This will damage the roofing materials which will probably only make the situation worse – and more expensive. To stop water from continuing to flow into the house structure, make channels through the ice dam. Hosing with warm tap water will do this job. Work up from the lower edge of the dam. The channel will become ineffective within days, however, and is only a temporary solution. The best solution is to prevent them from occurring by properly insulating your attic.

Regardless of how well you insulate, there are always some roof areas that can be a problem. These generally involve dormers on the east side of a building or a shed roof extension. Snow will fall on the shady side of the roof and form a drift. The sun will melt the snow above and below the drift

allowing water to run under the drift and refreeze. These areas can cause a real headache. If you have an area similar to this, you may want to consider an electric heat cable. These attach to the shingles and help prevent ice from forming in these areas. While they are not cheap, they are a lot less expensive than repairing the damage caused by an ice dam. Always

read the manufacturer's instructions when installing such a device.

New credit card laws now in effect

Credit card users can expect the most dramatic changes in credit terms, interest rates, and fees in decades once a new federal credit card law fully went into effect on Monday, February 22, 2010.

Millions of credit card users will avoid retroactive interest rate increases on existing card balances and have more time to pay their monthly bills, greater advance notice of changes in credit card terms, and the right to opt out of significant changes in terms on their accounts. That will take the surprise out of the fine print and give consumers time to shop around for better deals if they don't like the new terms.

The requirements were being phased in. The first batch took effect August 20, 2009, and the majority of provisions started February 22, 2010. The new law will also fundamentally change the way credit card issuers market, bill, and advertise credit cards. Here are some of the bullet points of the new laws:

- Credit card rates can't be increased on outstanding balances - except for the increase that happens when a 0% or other low interest introductory

rate expires on newly issued cards or when a customer is 60 days late on a payment.

- If a customer is 60 days late on a payment and an interest rate is increased, the issuer must dial the rate back to the original level if the customer pays the past-due payments and makes six straight months of on-time minimum payments.

• Card rates can't be increased in the first year of a card agreement (unless there is a limited time, low-interest introductory rate as part of the original card offer).

• Low-interest introductory rate offers must last at least six months.

• Customer payments must be applied to higher-interest balances first.

• If a card is marketed as "fixed rate", the card issuer must reveal exactly how long the rate is guaranteed to remain the same.

• Credit card issuers can not use "double cycle billing", a practice that allowed issuers to charge interest based on the average balance from the past two months, even if the last month's balance was paid.

Missouri's 36th annual state tornado drill set for March 9

March is Severe Spring Weather Preparedness Month in Missouri because the weather transitions from snow to rain, tornadoes and flooding. The National Weather Service, the State Emergency Management Agency, and local emergency management offices will conduct the 36th annual state tornado drill at 1:30 p.m., Tuesday, March 9, 2010. The weather service will initiate the drill. If Missouri is experiencing statewide severe weather conditions, the drill will be moved to Thursday, March 11, at 1:30 p.m.

"The state tornado drill reminds citizens, schools and businesses to practice taking shelter when a tornado warning is issued. Last May, 38 Missouri counties were included in a federal disaster declaration for severe weather and tornadoes. Those storms were responsible for seven fatalities and 21 serious injuries," said State Emergency Management Agency Director Paul D. Parmenter. He noted that a May, 2008, tornado was respon-

sible for 16 fatalities and more than 200 injuries in Newton, Jasper and Barry counties. An April, 2006, tornado destroyed and heavily damaged structures in Caruthersville, Braggadocio and Deering in Pemiscot County.

The entire drill can be completed in 15 minutes. Once Missourians hear broadcast drill messages or outdoor warning sirens, they should practice seeking shelter. The safest shelter location is an interior room without windows in the lowest level of the building. Other school or business safe locations are basements, hallways, under staircases and designated tornado safe rooms. Once everyone is accounted for, the drill is over.
