





United Methodist Church to celebrate sesquicentennial

To take a look back at its impressive history, the United Methodist Church found its roots beginning to grow in 1864 when the Methodist Episcopal Church of Mound City was organized. The church counted five members at the time (the congregation now numbers around 180, Blevins estimated). The church itself was built in 1879 and measured 30 feet by 40 feet; it cost \$1,400. In 1890 the church was moved from its original location on 4th Street to its current location at 7th and Nebraska Streets. Additions were gradually added to make the church what it is today, complete with copper steeple.

What was once a simple building has stretched and matured into a home that has also absorbed nearby congregations, such as those from Shiloh EUB Church and Fortescue United Methodist Church, and seen its flock tap into stores of generosity and creativity.

The women's group, SOS (Share on Saturday), described by member Heck as "the heartbeat of this church," has made a name for itself as the go-to caterers for the area by crafting meals for the Kiwanis Club, the Bellevue banquet, Market Square Day, and reunions and various fundraisers. The group also participates in PALS (Prayerful And Loving Snacks) with Mound City R-2 kindergarten and first graders; their compensation, Heck said, is "cards with pictures and thank you notes [telling us] that they love us."

The church routinely gives donations from its "Faith's Cupboard" to the Pantry of Plenty, and member Marie Wheeler turned to her needlework skills to craft 480 prayer mats for soldiers during Desert Storm in the 1990s.

To remember these efforts, anniversary committee members are compiling photographs, histories of member families and a history of the church to be included in a casebound annual, which will feature past ministers, updated member photographs and a memorial section dedicated to past members. Photos will be accepted until Oct. 1, and the book will be available for \$40, or \$50 for those who need to have the book mailed, at the beginning of 2015. T-shirts recognizing the anniversary are also for sale.

Such a restriction could affect teenagers in Holt County, many of whom prefer to tan regularly or before a special event. Hillary Russell, a sophomore at Mound City R-2, for example, routinely tans and did so before her high school's prom on April 5.

"I tan three times a week," she said, "usually with friends."

For Russell, however, tanning is something that should be done in moderation.

"It's not that bad a few days a week, but if you're going every day and becoming orange... [that's bad]," she said.

Russell uses the tanning bed at her mother's salon, "Lindsey's Shear Perfection," but After-Looks and The Attic in Mound City also have tanning beds for use. All three businesses and their owners take tanning seriously.

Debbie Sportsman of After-Looks explained that she does not allow anyone under the age of 15 to tan, and parents need to "say it's ok."

"Regulations are getting harder," Sportsman said. "We, as salon owners, give the same respect to tanning that we do to the salon."

AfterLooks also provides eye goggles and emphasizes sanitation and cleaning.

At The Attic, Terresa Showalter said that while there is a tanning bed, it is there for her customers' convenience. She also offers spray tanning and self-tanners for customers to apply at home.

As for the teens' perspective on the bill, Russell said, "I understand that parents need to make that decision." She, like the proprietors of tanning beds in Mound City, believe that everyone should avoid excessive tanning; a little goes a long way.

Crew members from J & E Concrete - Lay concrete over a repaired sinkhole on Thursday, April 10, at the intersection of Nebraska and 8th Streets in Mound City. According to Mayor Chris Krueger, a telephone company bored a hole through a storm drain pipe, most likely in 1996, and over the years, dirt, water and snow melt naturally collected at the low-lying area. "It's always been a bad spot, and now we know why," Krueger said. When the weather warmed, the telephone company moved the line and fixed the pipe and Hall Construction Co. excavated the hole and laid rock before J & E Concrete tackled the remaining work. As for payment, the city is hoping to work something out with the telephone company, Krueger said.

Chillicothe, on the other hand, actually had a surplus of 1.25 above normal for 2013. This surplus, however, was mostly due to above normal precipitation that fell during the first five months of 2013.

While 2013 was not as bad as 2012, when you look at the situation over two years, 2012-2013, the total deficits really add up. Downtown Kansas City, for example, was short 17.34 inches from January 1, 2012, to December 31, 2013. Kirksville was short a bit over 11 inches. St. Joseph was 12.33 below normal. And Chillicothe was 8.15 inches behind normal.

My own CoCoRaHS observations reflect a similar trend here in Gallatin. Using the new climate normals (1981-2010), my shortfall was 12.73 in 2012 and 2.09 for 2013. That gives a twoyear deficit of 14.82 inches below normal.

So how does the situation look currently? North Missouri remains abnormally dry at present, except for the extreme northwest corner, which is classed as D-1 drought. While abnormally dry is not considered drought, I still believe we have major problems in our sub-surface root zone water supply. Most of the rain and snow we received this winter was not able to penetrate the frozen ground. We're still short.

Craig R-3 Board of Education increases salaries for staff members

The Craig R-3 Board of Education met on Monday, March 17, to review school activities and approve spending.

The primary financial issue was a proposed increase of 4.2 to 4.7 percent in the base salary of certified staff; the new salaries will be \$30,350 per year. As part of the 2014-2015 Salary Schedule, Superintendent Mike Leach also proposed that administrative and non-certified staff receive raises of 4.5 percent. The increases were all approved.

In other new business, the Board voted to accept First Choice Heating & Cooling's bid of \$12,200 to replace the furnaces that serve the history room, teachers' lounge and cafeteria. Leach also read a letter of resignation from nurse Susan Lentz, who will be retiring at the end of the school year.

The Board also announced that health insurance rates for the 2014-2015 year will remain the same, but Leach will get quotes from other companies for comparison.

Principal Ken Grove reported on several school activities; they are:

- Kelly Dougherty qualified for state in all three of her FBLA events, and Kathy Howard qualified for state as well. Jocelyn Clayton was elected the 2014-2015 District 1 Vice-President of Relations for FBLA. The hunt is on for mushrooms

Spring mushroom hunting season is now open on Squaw Creek National Wildlife Refuge near Mound City until Tuesday, May 20. Permits are not required for visitors to enter the authorized areas of Loess Hills east of Highway 159 for mushroom hunting, but hunters must stay in the authorized areas; those who trespass into unauthorized refuge property, particularly the bottomland, which is home to state endangered species like the western massasauga rattlesnake, will be subject to citations and penalties. Additionally, disturbances to any unauthorized locations can be detrimental to floral, fauna and wildlife habitats. Refuge boundaries are identified by Blue Goose signs, and detailed maps showing the designated mushroom hunting zones are available at refuge headquarters and may be seen on signs in refuge parking lots.

The most common mushrooms collected by visitors on the refuge are "morels," which are

easily recognized by the trained hunter and are delicious to eat; they are one of the most popular edible wild mushrooms in Missouri. Luckily for hunters, recent rains and warm temperature have created spring time conditions that encourage morel mushroom fruiting.

Caution is necessary when collecting wild mushrooms as a few species are mildly poisonous to deadly. All edible mushrooms, however, are distinctive in some obvious way. The publication "Edible and Poisonous Mushrooms," by Barbara Bassett, is an excellent reference to help identify mushrooms. A copy may be obtained from the Squaw Creek Refuge headquarters or from the Missouri Department of Conservation in St. Joseph.



A main area of concern is most severe flooding. flooding, which affects safety on both the waterways and roadways. Due to recent heavy rains, flooding could be extremely dangerous and potentially fatal. Boaters and motorists should be aware of many of the following conditions.

First, the Patrol is also asking boaters across the state to take extra precautions when boating in flooded areas. Large amounts of rainfall cause rivers and lakes to become swollen, and the right decision is to stay off the water. In areas where lakes or rivers spill over the banks, erosion and damage can occur to flooded structures, docks or water-laden levees by boat wakes; boaters should avoid operating in these areas. If operation in these areas is necessary, boaters should operate at idle speed so as to avoid causing a wake.

Second, flooded rivers and streams with moving currents present some of the most dangerous situations a boater can encounter. Fast-moving water can easily capsize or flip a boat or personal watercraft, especially when combined with fixed objects such as trees and buildings. Boaters should avoid any operations in these swift flowing waters.

USDA to help livestock producers affected by drought

The 2014 Farm Bill includes livestock disaster aid going back to 2011, so farmers who suffered forage or livestock loss in the drought of 2012 should prepare to document those losses.

According to Scott Brown, University of Missouri (MU)agricultural economist, the Congressional Budget Office is estimating that nearly \$1 billion in disaster aid will be spent.

"Many Missouri livestock producers will be eligible for payments," Brown said. "Some payouts may be big... Regulations have not been released, [so] while the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) prepares rules, farmers can prepare to make their cases."

Brown added: "There are few details in the disaster section of the farm bill. Those details must be spelled out before farmers can file claims at their FSA office."

To help producers navigate the requirements and the language of the new bill, MU Extension is planning to provide educational support to producers.

"Livestock disaster aid is our first priority," said Dave Baker, assistant dean for Extension, College of Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources.

MU Extension specialists will also assist FSA staff in their educational efforts over the next year. USDA also reported that livestock farmers can sign a local list at FSA offices to schedule enrollment. In many cases, farmers who have not received federal crop assistance may not be on local office rolls.

"We're trying to reach producers not normally involved in government programs," said Brent Carpenter, MU Extension agricultural business specialist in Sedalia, MO. "They may not be familiar with their local USDA office."

Signing the list and providing contact information, including an email address, will speed up the process, which FSA will begin on Tuesday, April 15.

"Being prepared will speed the process," Brown said.

Those first in line are not likely to deplete available funds, he added.

"From reading the farm bill, it appears there is no cap on funding."

Farmers, however, need not rush to their FSA offices to sign up for 2014 crop programs.

"I don't expect to see FSA rules on those until late fall," Brown explained.

After providing disaster aid, the next priority to help producers will be a new dairy margin protection program. For the interim, the Milk Income Loss Contract (MILC) was extended by Congress.

To summarize, the long-delayed passage of a farm bill in Congress slowed down rule-making. When the previous farm bill expired in 2011, disaster aid was lost. The new law, however, makes disaster help retroactive.

"There are many stories, and rumors, out there," Brown said, "but we can't give real help until USDA has the detailed regulations."

A team of state and regional MU Extension specialists will study the farm bill and rules to translate legal wording into farmer-friendly terms.



Farm Bill ensures more opportunities for producers

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack announced on Monday, March 24, that there are increased opportunities for producers as a result of the 2014 Farm Bill.

"Our nation's farmers and ranchers are the engine of the rural economy. These improvements to our Farm Loan Programs will help a new generation begin farming and grow existing farm operations," said Secretary Vilsack. "[This] announcement represents just one part of a series of investments the new Farm Bill makes in the next generation of agriculture, which is critical to economic growth in communities across the country."

The Farm Bill expands lending opportunities for thousands of farmers and ranchers to begin and continue operations, including greater flexibility in determining eligibility, raising loan limits and emphasizing beginning and socially disadvantaged producers.

Changes that will take effect immediately include:

- A modification of the Joint Financing Direct Farm Ownership Interest Rate to 2 percent less than the regular Direct Farm Ownership rate, with a floor of 2.5 percent. Previously, the rate was established at 5 percent.
- An increase of the maximum loan amount for Direct Farm Ownership down payments from \$225,000 to \$300,000.
- An elimination of the rural residency requirement for Youth Loans, allowing urban youth to benefit.
- Debt forgiveness on Youth Loans, which will not prevent borrowers from obtaining additional loans from the federal government.
- An increase of the guarantee amount on Conser-

Green Sales Tax Holiday coming up

Missouri's sixth annual Show-Me Green Sales Tax holiday, which provides shoppers in Missouri with the opportunity to save on energyefficient appliances, begins Saturday, April 19, and runs through Friday, April 25.

Shoppers who purchase new Energy Star-qualified appliances during the holiday will not have to pay the 4.225-percent state sales tax.


