

"Saddles." Do you remem- could saddle up a horse and

When Dad bought an Arasaved enough money (\$30) wanted. It had a double girth with square skirts, a 12" seat, small sturdy horn. Dad said a repair spot up near the horn where the fellow I bought it spur when he was bucked off. At least I believed it.

The saddle was heavy and I couldn't swing it up on the horse's back. I had to have Dad's saddle was a regular help. I figured out a way to be size without a horn, but with able to do it myself, I thought. stirrups and rigging much I rigged up a pulley and rope to pull the saddle up by the horn and lead Tony under it and let it down on his back. There was just one flaw in the plan, Tony. He wouldn't walk under it. I guess I must have seen too many movies, because I fixed my reins up like they did, I fastened the right rein to the horn and kept the left one loose. I would then go to a place to hitch him up, throw that rein around it and then Tony was ready for a quick takeoff.

Dad had told me to never ride a horse running over soft ground, like a plowed field. I did, however, and with Tony lurching, the girth broke, which put me on the

ground with Tony circling around and around over me with one rein holding to the saddle horn. It was a lesson I'd never forget, although it was a hard lesson to admit to my dad. That was the first and last time doing that.

My first saddle was a Fremont, made in Fremont, NE. The second one was one also, but it was a single girth with round skirts and was much easier to throw up on the horse's back and fasten up, or at least it seemed that way. I, like a lot of beginners, had to learn how to tighten the girth, so it wouldn't turn when you mounted up. Dad said to wait until the horse exhaled, then tighten it in a hurry. It was hard to outsmart a horse, most could evade you if they were inclined to do so, until you laid a hand on them. With Tony, after I could do that, he could be ridden bareback and later without a bridle, when he wanted to.

Back when most rode a horse, it was a common method to judge a man by how tall and straight he sat in the saddle. Probably, there were a few disappointments. There's a thought...let's let our polititians ride into town on a horse just before election day!

Anyway, keep the girth tight and sit tall and straight in the saddle, MAYBE THAT OLD SAYING MIGHT BE RIGHT.

Anthony L. "Phil" Close

Anthony Lewis "Phil" Close of Skidmore, MO, one of five children of Beatrice (Huggins) and Charles William Close, was born at his parents' home on the farm in Atchison County, MO, on December 9, 1917. Anthony Lewis preferred the nickname of "Phil". He grew up on the farm with his brothers and one sister. He attended Spring Valley school from first grade through the eighth grade and then attended the nearby Daleview High School. He met Edna Pearl Ray while they both were attending Daleview High School. They were classmates and graduated from high school in 1935. They were united in marriage on April 9, 1939, at the Methodist-Episcopal Church in Oregon, MO. To this union, two children were born, Peggy Jo Close and Philip Ray Close. G. Lloyd Martin

G. Lloyd Martin passed away on Saturday, April 7, 2012. Lloyd was born in Pennsylvania in 1919 and grew up in Trear, IA, then Tarkio, MO, as his father, a Presbyterian minister and biblical scholar, relocated for pastoral and teaching assignments. Lloyd was active in scouting and was an Eagle Scout before graduating from high school in Tarkio. He then attended Tarkio College where his father was a professor of religion. While in college, Lloyd was captain and center of the 1940 NAIB Basketball Championship team (the NAIB evolved to become the NAIA in 1952). Lloyd also became an accomplished tennis player in college, a sport he continued playing into his 80's. He won many club and regional tournaments, mostly in doubles.

Lloyd entered graduate studies in chemistry at Ohio State University in September, 1941. After the bombing of Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941, he was planning to enlist to fight in what became World War II, as did many of his generation. However, Lloyd was convinced by his professors that he could provide a greater service to his country with his skills in chemistry and he was eventually recruited into the Manhattan Project. He was assigned to Mallinckrodt Chemical Company in St. Louis, MO, where he assisted in refining uranium for the atomic bomb. He worked on this project for 2 1/2 years and then returned to Ohio State to complete his

Lloyd began his working career with Mallinckrodt Chemical after graduation and subsequently moved to a variety of supervisory and management positions, with several metallurgical processing companies in the eastern U.S. He ended his working career at 81 years of age, after owning and managing a small firm in Point Pleasant, NJ, that specialized in precision electronic components. Upon retirement in 2000, he and his wife, Mary, moved to Holland, MI.



Corps to cut Gavins Point releases in response to heavy rain

Gavins Point Dam were reduced from 28,000 cubic feet per second (cfs) to 22,000 cfs during Sunday and Monday, April 15 and 16, in response over areas in eastern Nebraska and Western Iowa this on April 14.

The recent rains have increased flows on many of the tributary streams which enter the Missouri River below the main stem reservoir system, pushing some locations along the river to near flood stage. Releases from Gavins Point were reduced from 28,000 cfs to 26,000 cfs on Sunday, and then to 22,000 cfs on Monday. "As part of our normal flood risk reduction efforts, we reduced releases from Gavins Point Dam to help reduce stages on the lower river," said Jody Farhat, Chief of the Corps' Missouri River in Omaha, NE. "Similar release reductions are taking place at several of the upstream reservoirs including Fort Randall, Big Bend and Oahe.'

The six Corps' reservoirs on the Missouri River are operated as a system, so when-

Reservoir releases from ever release changes are made at one reservoir, those changes are reflected at some or all of the upstream projects, said Farhat.

The release reduction will to the heavy rain that fell cause the river in Sioux City, IA, to temporarily fall below the navigation target of 31,000 cfs, which is designed to provide a 300-foot wide by 9-foot deep navigation channel. The Master Manual allows navigation targets to be missed to reduce flood risk when there is no commercial navigation occurring in that reach of the river. Currently, one commercial tow boat is headed to the Nebraska City, NE, area. There are no tows in the reach between Sioux City and Nebraska City.

The Water Management office will continue to monitor the situation closely and make additional adjustments if needed. Releases will be gradually increased Water Management office as downstream tributaries recede.

conditions in the Missouri River Basin during the month of March resulted in below normal runoff into the main stem reservoir system for the first time since November, 2010.

As a result, the total volume of water stored in the reservoir system on April 1 was 56.9 million acre-feet (MAF), leaving 16.2 of the 16.3 MAF of flood control storage available.

Runoff above Sioux City, IA, was 78 percent of normal bringing in 2.2 MAF of water. Though March was dry in comparison to recent years, it was the 40th driest March in the last 114 years of detailed record-keeping by the U.S. Army Corps of

"The lack of plains snowpack and lower than normal mountain snowpack indicates that we are likely to see below normal runoff during the months of May, June and July," said Jody Farhat, Chief of the Missouri River Basin Water Management Division, "but it's still early. As we learned last year, conditions on the ground can change very quickly, so we will continue to monitor conditions in the basin and make any necessary release adjustments as the spring unfolds."

The current forecast for the 2012 calendar year calls for 23.4 MAF of runoff above Sioux City, 94 percent of normal. A normal runoff year typically brings in 24.8 MAF of water. Runoff for the 2011 calendar year totaled 61 MAF, 246 percent of normal, and the highest in 114 years.

On April 1, system storage was 56.9 million acre feet, just 0.1 MAF above the base of the annual flood control pool. The annual flood control pool is the desired operating zone for the reservoir system because it allows the Corps to serve all eight congressionally authorized purposes: flood control, navigation, water supply, irrigation, hydropower, recreation, water quality control and fish and wildlife.

In mid-March, the Corps began incrementally increasing releases out of Gavins Point Dam in South Dakota from 22,000 cubic feet per second (cfs) to 28,500 cfs in support of the 2012 navigation season which began April 1 near St. Louis, MO. "We expect to provide full-service flow support for navigation this year based on the current forecast," said Farhat. "However, the actual Public Meeting – 7 p.m. flow support for the second half of the navigation season and the season length will be based on the July 1 system storage

tion channel, 9 feet deep by 300 Louis. If drought conditions develop in the basin, flow support may be reduced to conserve water in the reservoirs.

As of April 1, mountain snowpack was 97 percent of normal above Fort Peck, MT, and 86 percent of normal from Fort Peck to Garrison, ND. Normally, 96 percent of the peak accumulation occurs by April 1. Mountain snowpack normally peaks April 15. According to Natural Resource Service Conservation reports, mountain snowpack in leases are expected to aversouthern Montana and northern Wyoming has started melting with significant amounts of snowmelt at lower elevations. In northern Montana, some accumulation is still occurring.

At this time last year, mountain snowpack was 116 percent of normal above Fort Peck and 112 percent of normal from Fort Peck to Garrison and was still accumulating.

Following last year's record breaking runoff season, Beth Freeman, regional administrator for Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Region VII, reminds citizens within the basin to consider purchasing flood insurance. Localized flooding can occur anytime as a result of heavy rains, so citizens should not become complacent with regard to buying insurance just because recent conditions have been drier than normal.

"Regardless of whether you live in or out of a designated floodplain, flood insurance can mean the difference between a quick recovery with new possibilities, or the uncertainty that accompanies disaster recovery without it," Freeman said. Reservoir Forecasts

Gavins Point releases averaged 23,900 cubic feet per second in March. Releases are currently 28,500 and are expected to reach 29,000 by the end of April. The reservoir's elevation is currently 1,205.9 feet mean sea level, which is normal for this time of year. It is expected to remain near 1,206 throughout the month.

Fort Randall, SD, releases averaged 21,100 during March. Releases in April are expected to average 26,300 cfs. The reservoir ended the month near elevation 1.353. It is expected to increase by 2.2 feet to 1,355.2 by the end of the month.

Big Bend, SD, releases averaged 21,100 in March. They are expected to average 27,400 cfs during the month of April. The reservoir will remain near its normal elevation of 1,420 feet during the month.

Fort Peck releases averaged 6,800 cfs during March. Reage 8,500 during the month of April. The reservoir ended the month at elevation 2,234.9 feet,

The reservoir releases and elevations discussed above should not be assumed to be definitive. Additional heavy precipitation in the basin could cause adjustments to the reservoir release

The six main stem power plants generated 738 million kilowatt hours (kWh) of elec tricity in March. Typical power generation for the month of March is 554 million kilowatt hours. The power plants are projected to generate 10 billion kilowatt hours during calendar year 2012, which equates to the long-term average.







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Missouri FSA reminds producers of upcoming program deadlines

Farm Service Agency (FSA), reminds producers that signup for the Direct and Counter Cyclical Payment (DCP) and the Average Crop Revenue Election Program (ACRE) ends on June 1, 2012. In addition, producers have until June 1 to sign up for the Supplemental Revenue Assistance Payment Program (SURE) for the 2010 crop year.

"We understand planting has started and it is harder for producers to find time to come into the office to enroll in these programs," Redden said. "June is quickly approaching and we encourage producers to call the office to schedule an appointment so we can get you through the process and back in the field as soon as possible."

Eligible DCP participants receive a direct payment and/ or a counter-cyclical payment. Direct payment rates are established by statute regardless of market prices. Counter-cyclical payments vary depending on market prices and are issued only when the effective price for a commod-

Farms that are already enrolled in the Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program (DCP) for a crop year can elect to switch to ACRE before the end of sign-up.

Both DCP and ACRE participants must sign annual contracts to receive program benefits. All signatures of producers who will receive a share of DCP and ACRE payments must be on file by the June 1, 2012, deadline.

Redden said producers who suffered losses due to natural disasters during the 2010 crop year may be eligible to receive assistance through the SURE program. To be eligible for SURE, a farm must have:



Professionals will package the items for proper disposal or recycling."

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


Nodaway-Holt Trojans enjoy 2012 prom
