Mustang suspected to have been killed by mountain lion

An adopted 800-900 pound mustang, owned by Justin Rother, was attacked and killed by what he believed to be a mountain lion on his father's farm northeast of Craig, MO, on Wednesday, May 12.

Greg, Justin's father, saw the mustang Wednesday morning around 9:30 a.m. as he was doing chores. Approximately two hours later. he noticed the mustang from a distance having obvious problems. Greg called Justin and told him that he needed to check on the mustang because he appeared to be having some trouble.

According to Justin, who later, the mustang was in a ravine in a pasture, dead. Noticing two or three mountain lions near the horse as he stated. "The way they move approached from a distance, however he headed back to the house for a rifle. When he returned, the mountain lions were out of range and the shots missed their mark.

Justin and his dad examined the horse, which lay dead in a muddy area, and found several sets of four deep claw marks along with puncture wounds at the mustang's jugular vein. Claw marks, both on the front neck area and two sets along the hind quarters, ranged from have also had a cow killed six to 12 inches in length and varied in depth.

This was not the first time that Justin has seen a mountain lion on their farm. He also ran across one approximately three years ago during deer season north of Craig. He and his father made a plaster cast of the track that was left in the snow from the mountain lion. Greg also spotted one this winter near their home.

Mountain lions require a lot of area, their home range is typically 50 to 75 square miles for females and 90 to several hundred square miles for males. A mountain lion's head and body range from three to five feet in length. with their tail measuring 23 to 33 inches. The cats can weigh upwards of 160 pounds.

Missouri Conservation Agent Russ Shifflett visited the Rother farm and after investigating stated, "This one is unique enough to send pictures to our Mountain Lion Response Team. It's unconfirmed as a mountain lion attack as of now, but it is out of the ordinary for a livestock

Shifflett indicated that there are numerous calls each year in Holt County about mountain lions, but none have yet to be confirmed here. The agency is interested in confirming sightings, but need of pictures, video or

tracks are necessary. An eyewitness account, compounded with the irrefutable marks left behind on the deceased mustang, sure does make it difficult for an amateur to say that there aren't any mountain lions in northwest Missouri. With keen awareness of the dangers that lurk in the area, the Rothers plan to be prepared should another mountain lion show up for another tasty meal.







However, as it looks forward to the future of 4G, Northwest Missouri Cellular, like many other RCA members, faces a major obstacle: it does not have access to 4G equipment or data roaming agreements for 3G. The majority of the most high-tech equipment is tied up in exclusivity agreements with the larger carriers, and companies like Northwest Missouri Cellular cannot get access to the equipment, while drawn-out negotiations delay the agreement and implementation of 3G roaming.

"We've been buying spectrum for 4G," said Bundridge, "but we cannot get access to the handsets. Today, there is


