



selves during a rain event. ditions and dry soils, plants that have fallen over will die if a limited amount of roots move into soil. Rain is critical as roots need moist soil to grow into. However, with dry conditions, the permanent roots will stub off if exposed to dry soils or exposed to air.

There can be several causes of this problem. First, the crown of the plant sets about three fourths to one inch below the soil surface. This is where the nodal roots grow from. Floppy corn syndrome can be caused by a loose soil seedbed which is packed after germination exposing the nodal roots. Also, soil can be washed away from the plant during a rain event. Lastly, shallow planting of less than one inch can also contribute to this problem.

To correct this problem, watch for other dry weather problems.

Excessive drying of the upper soil profile is conducive for the development of what some of us affectionately call the "rootless corn" or "floppy corn" syndrome. The problem illustrates a classic example of the importance of the timing of stress and plant development.

The permanent (nodal) roots of a corn plant develop initially from near the crown area of the plant (Nielsen, 2010). They develop sequentially in sets or "whorls" from individual nodes of the lower

> If nodal roots begin their elongation in bone-dry surface soil and reach adequate soil moisture at deeper depths before the meristmatic root tip desiccates, then the root will survive and proliferate. If the root tip (and its accompanying meristem) desiccates prior to reaching soil moisture, the entire young nodal root will likely die. This is particularly true if the axillary meristems along the length of the root (that eventually produce the branch roots) have not yet differentiated or become active.

Because several sets of roots may not have formed below ground, the crown may "appear" to be at or above the surface. That appearance is an optical illusion except in a few cases (Nielsen, 2004).

In fact, it is amazing to me how the above ground appearance of a plant affected with the "rootless" syndrome can remain fairly normal up until the windy day when the mesocotyl simply can no longer support the plant and it flops over to the ground. "Floppy" corn plants are NOT technically root-lodged; they are simply broken over at the mesocotyl below the crown area of the plant. Obviously, the health of the mesocotyl and of heavy rains after planting the seminal roots determine whether an affected plant can "hang on" until a decent soaker occurs to replenish soil moisture levels.

What can be done to alleviate the problem? Unfortunately, very little can be done to prevent the situation from becoming worse. Row cultivation may encourage new nodal root development if moist soil is thrown around the base of the plants. 
"Rootless" corn develops more easily with extremely shallow seeding depths that result in nodal root initiation beginning nearer the soil surface than at the usual 3/4 inch depth. This is one of several reasons that growers should avoid choosing seeding depths shallower than about 1 to 1-1/2 inches.

Furrow erosion as a result can create "shallow planted" seed as a consequence of removing top soil.

Shallow soil compaction from shallow tillage of fields that are "just a little on the wet side" can restrict initial nodal root development in the shallow, and often dry, soil above the compacted layer.

Open seed slots resulting from no-till planting "on the wet side" can contribute to the desiccation and death of initial nodal root development if the initial nodal roots desiccate before they successfully penetrate through the furrow sidewalls.



Growth is number one goal of Missouri River Corridor

'Partnering across borders' was the recurring theme given and heard by those in attendance at the Missouri River Corridor meeting held at Squaw Creek Wildlife Refuge on Thursday, May 24. The theme of the meeting centered around the effects experienced by businesses in the four state area during the flood of 2011.

Mound City

A myriad of programs and multiple resources were shared by representatives from the Small Business Administration, U.S. Department of Agriculture's rural Development program and the Economic Development Administration. Speakers delivered a message of business promotion, entrepreneurship and tourism.

Missouri, Iowa, Nebraska, Kansas (MINK) is a corridor on the Missouri River that runs from Kansas City to Omaha, NE, and is approximately two counties deep on either side of the river. It's a grassroots effort to focus on the rural corridor- the local foods, attractions, small town businesses and historical attractions.

MINK began in 2010 marketing its assets but was interrupted by the flood, when businesses traded revenue due to rerouting of traffic. Representatives from MINK recounted personal stories of survival and their quest for normalcy in 2012.

Missouri representative, Bill Hutting, owner of Sportsman's Lodge in Bigelow, MO,

stated, "People ask how long I've been in business, and I say 2 floods. The neat thing about this area is there are people who are willing to help. Everyone works together, and people stay positive." Hutting referenced the many events and assets in the area that people should pull off the interstate to enjoy.

Bob Chitwood of Brownville, NE, noted the 50% drop in attendance at summer festivals and business customers. "People had to figure out a new way to live. The positive is that the community and businesses have come together and are moving forward."

Sapp Brothers of Fremont County, NE, used the closure to rebuild and remodel, maintaining employees throughout the 4 month flood. "We have faith in the area and the location. The state did a great job getting the roads opened in a timely manner," according to Bill Sapp. He hopes that lessons have been learned from the flood and everyone can move forward with confidence.

A Kansas representative noted that while the majority of his area escaped flooding, road closures increased traffic counts in areas like Elwood, KS, which saw increases from 8,000 to 40,000 per day.

The MINK group plans to hold quarterly meetings, rotating from state to state. The goal is to focus on common goals that help to promote the region's rural communities.







Street project begins for Mound City

One doesn't have to drive very far in Mound City to notice the newly asphalted streets that have been being resurfaced with 1" or 2" overlays by Keller Construction Company of St. Joseph, MO. The work began on Monday, May 14, but a report from one of the job site workers indicated that the company may stop work in Mound City to complete another contract commitment before finishing the work at a later date.

The street project was to be done through a \$750,000 Obligation Bond issue that was passed by voters in April. However, at the May 10 city council meeting, a report and review by a financial consultant recommended that the city not issue any new debt and consider options for paying off the old debts. The bonds that were approved can be issued at anytime as needed. The council agreed not to issue new bonds, but to borrow from existing funds for payment of the project and also for pre-payment of the outstanding water and sewer bonds.

In April, the city received three bids that were well

below the engineer's cost estimate of \$420,000. Keller Construction submitted the lowest bid of \$314,832.70, and was awarded the contract.

 \mathbf{Keller} Construction's contract with the city states that that work is to be completed within 60 working days from the start of construction. So, even though the company may move on momentarily to another job, Mound City residents can anxiously anticipate the much needed improvement to streets to be done by summer's end.


