In an effort to reclaim books, the Mound City Public Library Board decided at its monthly meeting on Monday, June 11, to discontinue the process of charging patrons fines for overdue books. The decision was made after the board viewed the long list of overdue accounts dating back to 2008. The board is hoping that patrons will be more apt to return the long list of overdue books if they know there isn't a costly penalty.

Patrons with overdue books will be sent a letter by library director, Carly Edwards, listing the overdue books and explaining the need to return them. Books that are deemed missing will, however, have a replacement cost. Patrons with missing books will be responsible for the replacement fees.



The home of Tom and Cathy Bullock- At the south end of Big Lake, MO, was successfully raised on Tuesday, June 12, by Mark and Melanie Brandon with Brandon House Movers and Excavating. The third generation house mover raised the Bullocks' home 5 feet and a cement contractor will add 4 feet to its foundation. The home, which already sits four feet higher than the ground around it, had about 17" of water in it during the flood of 2011. The home had only 3" of water in it during the flood of 2010, and the couple had just recovered and moved into their home the first of December, 2010. The Bullocks decided to fix up their home because it was still in good enough shape. "It's our home, we raised three children here," commented Tom on the decision to raise the home. "We never had a problem with water here until the last 6-7 years when the Corps changed the way it manages the river, so maybe if the Corps goes back to flood control being the main purpose, we'll be fine." Complicating the project was the fact that just three feet away from the foundation, that is shown in the forefront of the picture, was a 43 foot hole that had been eroded away by swift floodwaters. That hole, as well as nearly the entire expanse of what used to be the Bullocks' yard, will have to be filled in. "I was really afraid that we'd lose the house at one point," stated Tom. Tons of dirt has been hauled in and much more will be needed in order to replace the yard lost in the flood. The Bullocks are excited to be getting the rebuild underway. A crew is expected to begin extending the foundation next week and another crew will start on the inside shortly after.

Flood Elevation (BFE), their home would sit at 866 MSL. Should a railroad tressel clog, as it did in the 2011 flood, residents could still be in danger of floodwater engulfing their home.

The lake is also seeing an even greater influx of travel trailers. Property owners need only obtain a permit from the village to park a travel trailer on their lots. The only stipulation is that it needs to be moved off the premises every 6 months.

The village's biggest issue currently is the slow response of some property owners. Many are not taking any action, while some are still in deliberation with insurance and FEMA about their property. Another issue causing concern is that the weeds around the lake on these properties are becoming a nuisance.

The projected dredging pursued. After months of telephone calls, emails and letters, it appears that the right paperwork has been completed for permission. The only variable left is the means for acquiring the finances to operate the dredge. Currently, only \$2,000 exists for the project. Once all is in place, the dredge will presumably begin the work and, after a short dredge time, the numbers can be compiled to see what the process will cost and what it can accomplish.

Meanwhile, the village is very much at work to rebuild. Realtors note that the value of property there has plummetted. Only the future of the river will dictate the future success of the village that offers great recreation and summer fun for the many who have and will continue to vacation and live near the manmade oxbow lake in northwest Missouri.



U.S. House forges ahead to end wasteful spending, reduce recovery program funding and fund ongoing flood repairs

The U.S. House of Representatives reaffirmed its de-Missouri River Authorized Purposes Study (MRAPS) and the Missouri River Ecosystem Restoration Plan (MRERP) for yet another year on June 9. In addition, the House voted 242-168 to reduce funding for the Missouri River Recovery Program (MRRP) from its Fiscal Year (FY) 2012 level of \$71 million to a FY13 level of \$50 million.

"The House has again seen the need to eliminate wasteful, duplicative and largely ineffective spending," stated Randy Asbury, executive director of the Coalition to Protect the Missouri River

"It's encouraging when our Congressional representatives have the foresight and courage to lead the way toward fiscal responsibility.

"We are grateful to Congressman Blaine Luetkemever (MO) for leading the efforts regarding MRAPS and MRERP and to Congressman Sam Graves (MO) for his efforts to reduce the MRRP funding.

"In addition, our hat goes off to Congressman Emanuel Cleaver (MO) for his work to increase flood assistance funding by \$3 million to continue to address the aftermath of the 2011 flood event."


