Craig R-3 swings into action with new playground

Although stormy weather delayed installation, Craig R-3 now boasts a new playground.

"I am ecstatic," Laura Wooten, Craig R-3 teacher, said. "I am very happy, very pleased."

According to Principal Ken Grove and Superintendent Mike Leach, the playground is the culmination of seven years of effort on Wooten's part.

"The elementary teachers have been planning and dreaming of a new playground," Leach explained.

Wooten started campaigning and fundraising for the equipment shortly after becoming the elementary Student Council sponsor.

"Every year there's been a fall garage sale, and a couple of years there was a spring garage sale," Wooten said.

She added that there were citywide clean-ups, where community members pledged so many cents per block, two quilt raffles, rounds of Betsy Bingo, and she and the students collected pop cans to take to the recycling plant, where they were reimbursed.

"[It got the students] involved in community service," Wooten said.

After so many years of raising money — Leach estimated a few thousand dollars — the Craig R-3 school board and the superintendent decided it was time.

"Financially, we could afford it," Leach said. "This was the year to go ahead and do it."

The new equipment, which totaled \$37,660 plus a few miscellaneous costs, is from ATHCO, and Wooten and her fellow teachers had a hand in choosing the structures they wanted.

"We voted on the one we like best."

The playground features two slides instead of one, Wooten said, as well as a few climbing apparatuses and monkey bars for kids to "hang and climb across." The playground also has two baby swings to accommodate younger playground-goers.

"It's just new," Grove said, "not 30, 40, 50 years old. It's a standard playground."

Grove added that the playground is open to community members, many of whom played a role in ensuring Wooten and her students' fundraising efforts wouldn't be wasted.

"I appreciate everyone in the past seven years that donated to fundraisers...and I'm grateful to the school board," Wooten said. "[The playground] looks good."

When the going gets tough, the Squaw Creek YCC crew gets going

In the sweltering heat of Friday afternoon, June 20, the four high school boys of the Squaw Creek National Wildlife Refuge Youth Conservation Corps (YCC) kept busy, pulling weeds, raking rocks and preparing to update a structure at the refuge's Eagle Pool.

"They're sprucing up the tower," Corey Kudrna, Squaw Creek wildlife manager, said. He explained that safety regulations have changed to accommodate the risk of children sticking their heads through railing slats or climbing up the side.

The tower project is just one of many that YCC participants will tackle this sum-

mer. According to Kudrna and YCC crew leader Ben Olsen, a recent graduate of Missouri Western State University in St. Joseph, Mo., the boys assisted in shocking fish on the Missouri River and learned about wildflowers in Craig, Mo. They will also take part in a raccoon project that involves blood chemistry and radio telemetry, and they'll catch and examine insects at Missouri Western. When they're not participating in a goose roundup or learning about invasive plants on Loess Hills, they'll also go on educational field trips to other refuges and the

Wind farm still a hot topic for Holt County Commission

The Holt County Commission, which met Monday, June 9, and Monday, June 16, tackled several issues, chief of which was the development of Mill Creek Wind Farm.

During the June 16 meeting, commissioners took a conference call with Dan Hegeman and Chuck Caisley of Kansas City Power and Light (KCP&L). KCP&L has a contract to purchase wind power generated from the farm, and Caisley provided an update on the relationship between the company and Element Power.

According to Caisley, Element Power executives have several issues to overcome. For example, they must obtain three permits associated with endangered wildlife and the proximity of the farm to Squaw Creek National Wildlife Refuge. The permits are the responsibility of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and neither KCP&L nor the Holt County Commission have any jurisdiction. Additionally, bat and eagle studies are ongoing in the proposed development zone, and mitigation measures are being considered.

Caisley added that he does not anticipate any construction activities before the end of this year, and he noted that most of the Element Power staff has left the company and a new CEO is in place. The continuation of a federal tax credit for wind production will likely be needed to get the project moving again, but Caisley assured the Commission that KCP&L is committed to a wind project in northwest Missouri.

At the same meeting, commissioners spoke with three others. First, Brenda Nelson, R.N. and Health Department administrator, gave updates on her department and presented a contract renewal with Leslie Schulte for Emergency Planning Contract work; the Commission approved the renewal.

Second, Sheriff Scott Wedlock joined the meeting to discuss recent damage to a

2007 Crown Victoria patrol car related to law enforcement pursuit. The vehicle has been totaled by the insurance company. Wedlock presented an invoice for \$14,950 for a 2011 Crown Victoria from the Missouri State Highway Patrol's used patrol car fleet and added that equipment, such as radios and lights removed from the county's 2007 model, will fit into the 2011 model. After discussion, the Commission agreed to purchase the 2011 used patrol car and to use the insurance payment from the totaled 2007 vehicle as a down payment. County Clerk Kathy J. Kunkel will secure financing bids.

Third, Allen Andrews, a Republican candidate for the First District State Representative seat, a position currently held by Mike Thomson, approached the Commission to speak about sales tax, fuel tax and economic development efforts in Holt County.

At the June 9 meeting, commissioners welcomed two guests. The first, Road and Bridge Supervisor Daryl Biermann, reported on road damage from recent heavy rains; most of the damage is in the northern part of Holt County. He anticipated extra road grader work and is planning to limit application of patch rock. County Aid Road Trust (CART) rock will continue when grading is completed. He noted that three roads were temporarily closed due to high water that flooded areas on Holt 130, Whispering Oaks and Ironwood Road. The second, Lynn Anderson from the Missouri Department of Transportation (MoDOT), joined the Commission to give a bridge inspection report. Anderson and his colleagues noted that the county has 37 fracture critical bridges that have some grade changes, but tonnage changes were not necessary. Three bridges remain in need of an underwater inspection, which MoDOT will complete at a later date.

This Week's History

From the *Mound City News* archives

50 Years Ago - 1964

- A \$13,500 bond issue was approved with only 216 Mound City residents voting for improved fire-fighting equipment.

- The North Bethel Church of Brethren near Mound City observed its 100th anniversary and homecoming.

- Miss Mary McQueen, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank McQueen of Craig, was struck by lightning while she was talking on the telephone. The impact threw her across the hall and into a closet. Mrs. McQueen applied artificial respiration to revive her, and Miss McQueen was later taken to a physician for examination.

- Although the Kiwanis Club of Mound City was organized and had met several times, it had not been officially chartered. The impressive ceremony would take place in the school auditorium. The Mound City band mothers were to serve the banquet, and it appeared that approximately 250 would attend the first large affair of the new Mound City club. The Mound City club would be chartered with a membership of 40.

25 Years Ago - 1989

- Wayne Cole was chosen by the board of directors of Community Hospital, Fairfax, to succeed Lew Alley as hospital administrator. Alley left to accept a position with a West Virginia hospital.

- Work began on a resurfacing project in the city of Craig. Resurfacing on Main Street began at the intersection with Third Street and would go to the 111 Spur. Third Street would be redone from Highway 59 to Highway 111. Approximately nine blocks would receive the new look with the cost of \$25,000 coming from general revenue funds appropriated for streets.

- The Mound City Golf Association held its first open tournament on the new golf course with a good turnout. The ladies opened play in the morning with seven teams playing in the best-shot format. Betty Jo Bird and Sharen Lockridge took top honors. Thirty-eight men's teams swarmed over the course in the afternoon and early evening. Todd Sipes and Reynold Weber took top honors in "A" flight. Brothers Chris and Kevin Staples were second. Bill Neff and Todd Neff came in third.

10 Years Ago - 2004

- An expanded Bredeaux Pizza reopened in the old Schoonover Cafe building that had been extensively renovated to create an attractive new restaurant at the main Mound City entrance. The old Bredeaux building was among those cited by the city for building code violations.

- Verlene Karsten had helped prepare meals for area senior citizens for more than 20 years. At 80, she decided to retire as assistant food service manager at the Mound City Senior Center.

- Marguerite Brandon, administrator of the Mound City Senior Center for the past 26 years, was stepping down from her position. At the age of 85, Brandon was retiring.

- Genevieve Thompson's "I remember" column that began running in the *Mound City News* in 1998 had come to an end. "I don't feel like I have anymore to write," she said in an interview. A resident at Tiffany Heights nursing home, she turned 99 in April.

Later Eva Herbert, Etta Cain and Marie Holbrook joined the group to replace a death and those who had moved away. On October 31, 1989, a reunion of members gathered at the home of Alice French. Present were Mrs. French, Eva Herbert, Fern Cain, Norma Williams, Wilma Planalp, Etta Cain and Wanda Killin.

June is Dairy Month

June is Dairy Month, and there is a lot to know about dairy foods.

Most people know that milk, yogurt and cheeses are a great source of calcium. Many dairy options also have Vitamin D. Did you know that they have many other nutrients we need in a healthy eating plan as well? Milk and milk products also have potassium, phosphorus, magnesium, Vitamin A, protein, Vitamin B12, riboflavin and niacin. Of course, the healthier options are those lower in fat and added sugars.

Did you know that the one time when the "lower fat options are healthier" recommendation does not apply is when talking about babies? The fat in milk helps in brain development, which is especially important to children under 2 years old. Whole milk provides the usual nutrients as well as the essential amino acids needed for growth.

Did you know that when there is mold on food it should be thrown out? And did you know that an exception is when the food in question is hard cheese? Moldy foods generally are spoiled because visible mold spores form on the end of their stalks while at the same time sending roots down deeply into the soft food. Hard cheeses are solid enough, though, to prevent these roots from getting very far into the hunk of cheese. To

safely use such a contaminated product, remove the mold that can be seen along with another inch into the block around it.

Did you know that although foods like butter, sour cream and cream cheese are sold in the dairy section of most grocery stores, they are primarily made from milk fat and so have little or none of those healthy nutrients found in other milk-based foods? Choose these options less often or in smaller quantities as part of a healthy eating plan.

Did you know there are lots of ways to use dairy foods? For example, low- or non-fat yogurt can be substituted for some or all of the sour cream in many recipes, including ranch dip or dressing, baked goods and sauces. It maintains the creamy texture but adds the calcium and other nutrients found in yogurt and not in sour cream.

Be creative and find other ways to make healthy dairy choices for meals and snacks this June - Dairy Month.

Holt County Soil and Water Conservation District looking for project partners

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack recently announced the launch of a new era in American conservation efforts that will focus on public-private partnerships.

"This is an entirely new approach to conservation," Vilsack said. "We're giving private com-

panies, local communities and other non-government partners a way to invest in what are essentially clean water start-up operations."

The new conservation program, called the Regional Conservation Partnership Program (RCPP), was authorized in the

2014 Farm Bill and will benefit areas across the nation. RCPP streamlines conservation efforts by combining four programs (the Agricultural Water Enhancement Program, Cooperative Conservation Partnership Initiative, the Chesapeake Bay Watershed Initiative and the Great Lakes Basin Program for Soil Erosion) into one.

The RCPP will competitively award funds to conservation projects designed by local partners specifically for their region. Eligible partners include private companies, universities, non-profit organizations, local and tribal governments and others joining with agricultural and conservation organizations and producers to invest money, manpower and materials to their proposed initiatives.

"Local decision making is empowered through this program - bringing together conservation groups, cities and townships, sportsmen groups, universities, agricultural associations and others - to design conservation projects that are tailored to our needs here in Missouri," said J.R. Flores, NRCS state conservationist.

The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) has \$1.2 billion for the five-year program, but with partners investing along with USDA, the program will leverage \$2.4 billion for conservation. Through RCPP, partners propose conservation projects to improve soil health, water quality and water use efficiency, wildlife habitat and other related natural resources on private lands.

"This is an example of government at its best - streamlining multiple programs into one more effective effort, providing flexible tools and connecting local citizens and organizations with resources that best address their priorities, protect and improve their quality of life and propel economic growth," Vilsack said.

The RCPP has three funding pools: 35 percent of total program funding directed to critical conservation areas chosen by Vilsack; 40 percent directed to regional or multi-state projects through a national competitive process; and 25 percent directed to state-level projects through a competitive process established by NRCS state leaders.

Missouri is included in the critical conservation areas selected by Vilsack. The Mississippi River Basin area includes the whole state, and the Prairie Grasslands area covers about half of the state (a map showing the boundary is included on the NRCS website).

Flores said that Missouri NRCS has established five natural-resources priorities that proposals should address: water quality, soil health, at-risk and declining wildlife species, water quantity and forest health.

"This program is a prime example of how government can serve as a catalyst for private investment in rural America," Flores said.

The Holt County Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) is seeking partners who would be interested in pledging technical and/or financial assistance for participation in an RCPP project for Holt County geared towards drainage water management, cover crops, no-till and flood prevention.

"[The YCC program] is really great for kids looking to go into natural resources," Kudrna said. "They're doing meaningful work, getting paid and getting time to explore things in the conservation world."

According to Kudrna, the program began in the late 1970s. At least 20 students participated in the program every year, well into the 1980s. Eventually, YCC tapered off, but it was resurrected in 2001. In recent years there have been crews of eight, Kudrna said, but this year's has four: Dakota Leeper, Blayne Collins, Ethan Miller and Colton Sisk.

"We get to do a lot of interesting stuff," Leeper, 15, said.

Each boy makes minimum wage, and he works 40 hours per week, starting Monday, June 2, through Friday, July 25. The YCC crew must also take a minimum of 40 hours of environmental education classes throughout the summer.

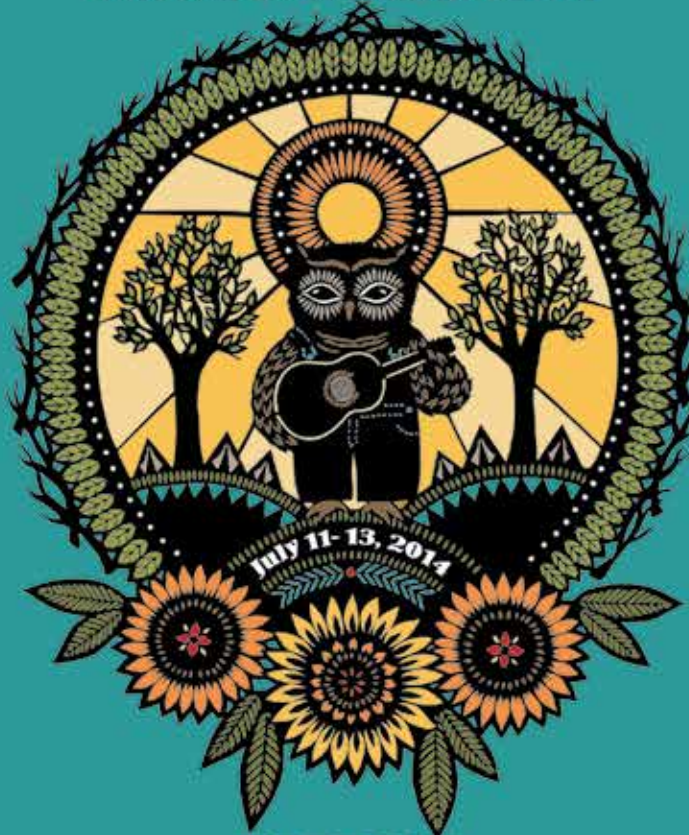
"We're teaching a little bit of everything," Olsen said.

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Highway Patrol encourages a safe Fourth of July

Whether Fourth of July plans take place on land or on the water, Colonel Ron Replogle, superintendent of the Missouri State Highway Patrol, is reminding Missouri's travelers of the importance of safety during the upcoming July Fourth holiday.

In 2013 troopers worked 358 crashes in which 13 people died and 157 were injured during the Fourth of July holiday. Troopers also arrested 199 people for driving while intoxicated during last year's 102-hour holiday counting period.

The 2014 counting period for July Fourth will be 78 hours, from 6 p.m. on Thursday, July 3, to 11:59 p.m. on Sunday, July 6.

The July Fourth weekend is also one of the quarterly DWI enforcement mobilization dates. Many of the troops have checkpoints and saturations scheduled for this period. Troopers have a zero tolerance for drinking and driving, whether on the road or on the water; drinking and driving don't mix.

The Highway Patrol will be participating in Operation C.A.R.E. (Combined Accident Reduction Effort) over the holiday weekend, as well. All available officers will be patrolling Missouri's roadways to enforce speed limit, seat belt and alcohol laws, and they will be avail-

able to assist motorists.

Troopers throughout the state will participate in a 20-mile Trooper operation on Thursday, July 3, and Sunday, July 6, 2014. This operation will include Interstates 35, 44, 55 and 70 and U.S. Highways 60 and 63. Troopers will be highly visible while targeting all traffic violations, and they will be especially vigilant of aggressive driving violations.

Motorists who need assistance or who witness criminal activity while traveling on Missouri's roadways can contact the nearest Highway Patrol troop headquarters by calling the Patrol Emergency Report Line at 1-800-525-5555 or *55 on a cellular phone. Motorists may call 1-888-275-6636 to check for road construction or possible flooding along their travel route.

The Highway Patrol reminds the public that the Fourth of July holiday is also one of the busiest boating holidays of the year. In 2013 there were 19 boating crashes, which included 13 injuries and one fatality. Three people drowned during last year's July Fourth holiday; two at Smithville Lake in Clay County and another at New Towne Lake in St. Charles County.

Troopers will be working on the state's waters to ensure safety. Missouri's boaters are asked to do their part by remaining alert for other boats and swimmers and being courteous on the water. With more boats on the water, it is important to pay attention when operating a vessel.

Remember:

- Distractions and alcohol consumption slow reaction time.
- Appoint a passenger to help monitor other boats in the area.
- Make evasive maneuvers

early and deliberately.

The many firework displays after dark attract more boaters at night. Remember to:

- Check the vessel's navigation lights before heading out, and be sure to have spare bulbs on board.
- Avoid overloading a boat with too many passengers. Doing so can cause the boat to become swamped and can affect the handling of the boat.
- Observe Missouri's nighttime speed limit of 30 miles per hour on the water.
- Slow down. Nighttime crashes tend to involve more serious injuries and damage due to the lack of visibility.
- Finally, it is illegal to discharge fireworks from a vessel, so leave them in a safe place on shore.

"I encourage every motorist and every watercraft operator to make safety a priority every time they are behind the wheel or at the helm," Replogle said. "Insist that everyone in your vehicle is properly restrained in a seat belt or child restraint. Or, when you're boating, ensure that everyone in the vessel is wearing an approved life jacket. Please be courteous whether operating a vehicle or a vessel. If your celebration includes alcohol, designate someone else to act as your sober chauffeur."

Use container gardens to supply salads

It's easy to grow lettuce in container gardens, says Kim Martin, manager of Tiger Garden, the student-run floral shop on the University of Missouri campus.

Martin said four lettuce or spinach plants in a 10-inch container provide enough greens for two people to have a large salad weekly.

Choose a pot with good drainage, she added. Do not put rocks in the bottom of the pot, as they may cause water to pool above the rocks and allow for root damage.

"A plant sitting in water is one of the fastest ways to kill a plant," she said. "You want your water to

be able to escape and flow free."

Use a good soilless potting mix. Do not use soil, as it compacts around the root of the plant and may contain root-damaging bacteria. Soil also does not drain well.

Fill the pot halfway with a soilless medium containing perlite. Do not pack the soil. Mix crystals of a silica-based wetting agent with water and place a thin layer on top of the medium. This kind of layering holds the water and keeps the plants moist.

"One of the biggest downfalls of container plants is that they don't get enough water," Martin said.

Fill the pot with medium within an inch of the top of the container.

Choose four plants for a 10-inch pot. She recommends red leaf lettuce, buttercrunch lettuce, arugula and spinach. Spinach works best by itself but also pairs with arugula. Lettuce grows more quickly than spinach and can take over the container. Because arugula and buttercrunch lettuce are tall, plant them toward the center of the pot. They pair well together.

Loosen the plants by squeezing the plastic cell of the planter pack from the bottom. Do not fluff the delicate roots.

"The soilless media in your container is loose and airy, and roots will go out and explore on their own," Martin said.

Make a hole in the center of the pot and three holes around the edge. If using a rectangular or square pot, place plants at least 6 inches apart. Put the plants in and gently add medium just to the soil line of the plant. Put two teaspoons of slow-release fertilizer over the top of the medium, keeping it away from the plant. Keep the medium moist.

When harvesting lettuce, pinch off leaves near the base from the outer edges of the plant. Leave the inner leaves to grow.

When choosing plants, ask the garden center if the plants have been "hardened," which involves a gradual exposure of the plants to outside temperatures and sun. If the plants have not been hardened, gradually expose them to the outside for a week.

Frost kills lettuce and spinach, so bring plants inside if there is a danger of frost.

Cared-for plants should produce lettuce until mid-June, when flowers, called bolts, and seeds appear and the leaves become bitter-tasting.

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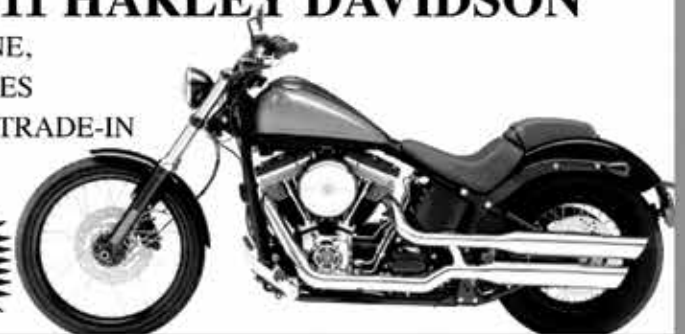

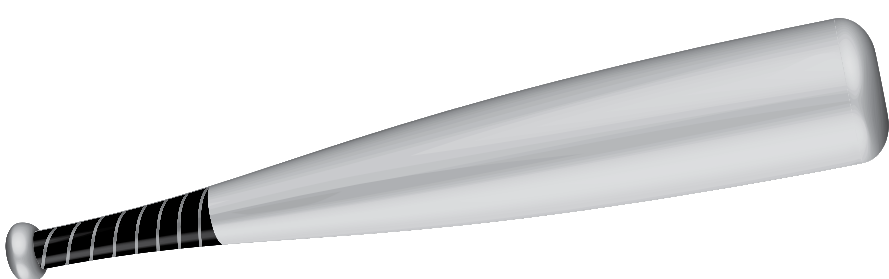
