Grain bin site partially destroyed by apparent tornado

This grain bin site- Located northwest of Mound City and owned by Kirby Rosier, looked to have been hit by a tornado during the storms that passed through northwest Missouri late Sunday, June 26, and early Monday, June 27. Two 35,000 bushel grain bins were torn from their cement pads at the right of the picture and thrown toward the east, on top of a 50,000 bushel grain bin. The grain bin next to the two remaining pads, was partially lifted off its foundation and suffered great damage to both the side and the roof of the bin. Of the three remaining 50,000 bushel bins on the left, two of the roofs were partially collapsed from suction. Cement slabs for bin fans were stacked nearby and one of those was hurled 15 feet from its original location.

periencing the worst flooding in the region since 1952. The Missouri River has caused an increase in water levels in nearby creeks such as the Little Tarkio, Davis Creek and Squaw Creek. Additionally, levees have breached in multiple areas. Heavy rainfall has compounded the issue causing flash flooding.

The water levels in the managed marsh pools at Squaw Creek Wildlife Refuge near Mound City are beyond draining or pumping capabilities and water is making the auto tour route impassable and unsafe for traffic. The refuge auto tour route is closed at both entrances at Missouri Highway 118 and Missouri Highway 159 and all sections of the refuge, including access areas in the bottomlands surroundclosed.

The Loess Bluff and Callow Memorial Trails, located near the refuge headquarters, will remain open to visitors unless conditions change to warrant a closure. The at http://www.fws.gov.

Northwest Missouri is ex- headquarters are open from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. Visitors can still reach the headquarters from Highway 159 driving south three miles from I-29 at Exit 79. Floodwaters are expected to reach and possibly exceed the mean sea level of 863.5 feet. This will cause critical habitat damage to Squaw Creek's management areas including the moist soil units, wet prairie, and other priceless wildlife habitats and; most habitats will be submerged.







Holt County Historical Society makes move to Mound City


The Holt County Historical Society was forced from its buildings in Fortescue, MO, due to fear of the floodwaters that threaten to spill over the Squaw Creek levee, which lay just beyond the society buildings. Precautions were taken to ensure that the valuable history acquired by the society would continue to be preserved.

Board members and some volunteers began working the last week of May to move artifacts and historical documents from each of the three properties: the old Methodist Church, the old schoolhouse, and the old Hinkle farmstead.

Many items at both the old schoolhouse and the old Hinkle farmstead were moved out, but many items were simply moved to the upper floor.

Items from the society's headquarters at the old Methodist Church were relocated. Space was acquired at Renick Stuart's storage units, the old Fairfax Hospital, and several farm outbuildings to store the legacy artifacts. Local residents might have noticed the society's outhouse come through Mound City, as it was being moved to a temporary location.

The society is pleased to have obtained a storefront area in Mound City, which enables members to reopen for research and geneology



School lunches in Holt County to get a makeover this fall

School meals across the nation will receive a back-to-school makeover this fall. The new Healthy, Hunger-Free Kids' Act of 2010 will improve the nutrition of children across America and make for stronger, healthier students in Holt County.

While the old school lunch could feature, day after day, French fries, the new guidelines aim to improve the quality of food served. More fruits, vegetables and whole grains are called for in order to help reduce the country's growing obesity epidemic. The new regulations also feature a maximum calorie limit based on meals and students' grade levels. Fat-free and low-fat milk will replace whole and reduced-fat milk. Finally, schools will be required to gradually reduce the sodium content in the meals they serve by 2020.

Some food service directors might worry about the increased costs associated with these new menu changes. However, the new legislation does provide for increased reimbursements for schools to serve these more nutritious meals. Health advocates point to even greater savings by making these changes now. U.S. Department of Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack warns that this country will not be able to contain health care costs attributed to the rising obesity epidemic if drastic action is not taken. Paying slightly more up front in school meals will pay dividends over the course of a child's lifetime. To put those costs into context, one study based on 2006 data from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and RTI International found that obesity costs public and private payers as much as \$147 billion each year.

Pediatricians and health practitioners agree that these meal changes can't come too early. Says Michelle Roach, a registered nurse with the Lexington School District and a pediatric

nurse practitioner at Children's Mercy Hospital in Kansas City, health care providers have seen more children challenged by weight, in part because of diet choices. "We've found that some of the biggest culprits are sweet juices and drinks being consumed instead of milk and water," says Roach. Along with the changes to school lunches, Roach advocates that children be taught good eating habits. She explains, "It's important to talk to children about nutrition, balanced diets, and portion sizes.'

To help your student or school get started with these changes, the Missouri Food to School project recommends that parents and school food service staff make the transition easier by:

· Piloting a few menu items and marketing them first. Putting something very new on a menu can be a big change for small taste buds.


· Engaging everyone. Parents, students and other teachers can get involved with the changes through surveys, taste tests and recipe contests.

· Look at the menu at home. At home, serve many of the same items and set children up for a lifetime of healthy eating.

· Get trained. New food menus and preparation require training. There are many opportunities over the summer and on the Internet to help food service staff. Also, University of Missouri Extension has a new cookbook for large volume cooking that can help with new recipes.

· Look for purchasing opportunities. Partner with local farmers and food providers to provide more fresh foods that are locally grown and competitively priced.

· Share your success. Other parents, schools and health advocates want to learn what's working and will often incorporate those successes into their own menu planning.

Partner proposals were selected competitively based on previously identified criteria.

Included with the proposal from Holt SWCD were letters of support from the University of Missouri Holt County Extension Center, US Fish and Wildlife Service Squaw Creek National Wildlife Refuge, Missouri Land Improvement Contractors' Association, and Missouri Department of Conservation.

Interested landowners may now contact the SWCD/NRCS office. Sign-ups will be accepted until Thursday, July 7, 2011, at which time all eligible applications will undergo the ranking process. Applications for 2011 funding must be finalized by August 15.

Gutter helps oversee two key agencies that can assist with the recovery: the Farm Service Agency (FSA) and the Risk Management Agency (RMA). The FSA administers several important programs that help producers recover from disaster damage and livestock deaths. Jay Waechter, from the FSA Regional Service Office in Topeka, KS, assured farmers that, regardless of whether the levees are fixed at planting time next spring, crops will be insurable.

questions, concerns and ideas on how to better streamline the process of recovery. Several attendees asked questions and gave input.

Jay Johnson, Farmers Mutual Insurance Company in Mound City, indicated the efficiency of having matching dates for both the insurance and FSA side of reporting crops. He also asked for leniency for farmers who are busy fighting the floods and find it difficult to get in to report, and for consideration of some type of standard to address measures to help sustain current yields.


Holt County Presiding Commissioner Mark Sitherwood reiterated the reoccurrence of flooding here and the problem it causes with rebuilding levees, stating funding has to be made available promptly to be able to rebuild levees as soon as possible.

Holt/Atchison farmer Rvan Meyerkorth asked the Acting Deputy Under Secretary Gutter to voice in Washington, the fact that the dam and reservoir systems need to be operated according to the original intent of the dam system---- flood control and navigation.

Gutter stated, "We need to put the right tweaks in place right now to expedite the process and know all the variables that will impact farmers getting their money. It's a way of doing business better and we need to keep talking."

Secretary Vilsack announced recently that \$3 million has been allocated to the Emergency Watershed Protect Program administered by NRCS to carry out emergency restoration projects in five western states experiencing flooding or are at risk for flooding.

Pallets of sandbags now stand at the ready to be used to complete the project and potentially ward off flash flood rainwater at Evans Circle. More sandbags and levee work will take place today, Thursday, June 30.

Mound City prepares for potential flooding

Russell had spoken with Creek, west of the bridge, and Emergency about potential for flooding go. The Red Cross furnished in Mound City and had determined that if floodwaters reached the edge of Bigelow, MO, this would constitute a Thursday, June 30, to assist request for support and action to be taken. That happened on Thursday, June 23.

A meeting was held at Mound City City Hall on Monday, June 27, to discuss action that would help ensure the protection of the town. Concern was heard from residents over waters that encroached potentially engulfed and property during the four inch rain on Sunday, June 26, that created a flash flood. The city council discussed solutions for the problem, but because blocking tubes on Davis Creek escape, no action was taken to remedy the problem. Mayor Russell visited Evans Circle that same morning to assure residents that a plan was in place by the city for potential flooding. Russell told them about events that would trigger action by the city to safely evacuate. His two-fold 'trigger' system includes: 1. If water reaches the 118 intersection on the south side, city employees will notify the residents of a voluntary evacuation. 2. If water reaches the east side of Squaw Creek, it would constitute a mandatory evacuation and National Guardsmen would be knocking on doors for the mandatory move. When asked about the likelihood that Mound City will flood, Mayor Russell stated, "From people that I've talked to about the past, water did reach the lower end of Evans Circle one other year. As I look around at other communities, you have to be looking five days out and plan for worst case scenarios. A Corps of Engineers representative said that there would be one foot of water on the MoDOT parking lot, but that's on the other side of the interstate." At 7:00 p.m. on Monday, June 27, six semi trucks were lined up on Seventh Street to unload sand for the sandbagging operation that began at 9:00 a.m. Tuesday morning, June 28. Over 30 volunteers surfaced to begin sandbagging at the Mound City water plant. Nearly 8,000 bags were filled and a large portion was placed by other volunteers on the top of the Davis Creek levee on McIntire Lumber's property. The initial plan for the levee behind the Staples and Martin properties was to have Greg Hall haul in dirt for Garrett Burge to build up

Golden Triangle Energy plant finished shipping its (GTE) in Craig, MO, began inventory by Tuesday, June 28. GTE has outsourced alcohol from competitors to fill contractural obligations.

Employees at GTE have been working for the past two weeks to ready the plant for floodwaters that may potentially get into GTE buildings, should the levees that surround Craig breach. Motors were removed, equipment hauled off and grain bins sealed.

GTE will maintain security and maintenance staff at the site, but the GTE office moved to a temporary location at 805 State Street in Mound City, next to Mc-Donald's, on Monday, June 27. The office staff will re-
