Governor holds round table with Holt County officials

Missouri Governor Jay Nixon visited Atchison and Holt counties on Saturday, June 26, to view the flooded farm ground as well as the many areas that have taken families from their flooded homes along the Missouri River. Governor Nixon flew to the Gould Peterson Memorial Airport in Tarkio around 11:45 a.m. on June 26 to meet with county officials as well as emergency responders from Atchison and Holt counties.

Governor Nixon has activated the Missouri National Guard to provide emergency assistance to communities and law enforcement agencies along the Missouri River who are being affected by the flooding. Homes in the Big Lake, MO, area are under as much as 12 feet of water after a series of levee breaks and breaches.

Many other homes along the Missouri River bottoms have been engulfed by flood waters as well. Thousands of acres of farm ground have been taken over by the flood waters with no hopes of a crop this year.

"Farmers may be the endangered species in our area," commented one county commissioner at the meeting on June 26.

Governor Nixon opened the discussion with comments on flood control and relief operations underway along the Missouri River. The governor commented that the Red Cross, as well as many faith based organizations, has been helping families that have been displaced because of the flooding.

County officials also commended Governor Nixon for providing correctional center inmates to help in sandbagging efforts.

"We are pleased with Gov. Nixon's reaction and

response time with SEMA and everyone involved," commented Holt County Presiding Commissioner Mark Sitherwood.

There was discussion from county officials concerning the water release from Gavins Point Dam in South Dakota. Although Governor Nixon was careful not to be critical of the water release from the dam upstream, he did say, "We don't want to sandbag the water they are releasing."

Governor Nixon was notified from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers on Wednesday, June 23, that more water would be released from the upper Missouri River at the Gavins Point reservoir from June 23 through 26. The corps said it would increase the release of water from 15,000

cubic feet per second to 20,000 cubic feet per second on June 23 and incrementally increase releases between Wednesday and Saturday until a target release rate of 35,000 cubic feet per second was achieved.

Governor Nixon expressed his understanding about the drain on the local economy because of the hundreds of homes and thousands of acres of farmland under water as well as the business and transportation routes being closed. The governor said that once the flood waters have receded, the state will start the process of helping rebuild roads and assisting farmers and homeowners devastated by the flood waters.

After the round table discussion, several county officials boarded a Blackhawk helicopter with the governor to view the flooded areas of Atchison and Holt counties.

Holt County Sheriff Scott Wedlock, State Highway Patrol Mike Quilty and Presiding Commissioner Mark Sitherwood were asked to ride with Gov. Nixon on Saturday in the Blackhawk to survey the flooded area.

Presiding Commissioner Mark Sitherwood stated, "It was a great way to see the flood firsthand and the extensiveness of the damage. With over 43,000 acres of cropland and numerous homes affected, it's tough to see. We're hoping a disaster declaration comes soon."

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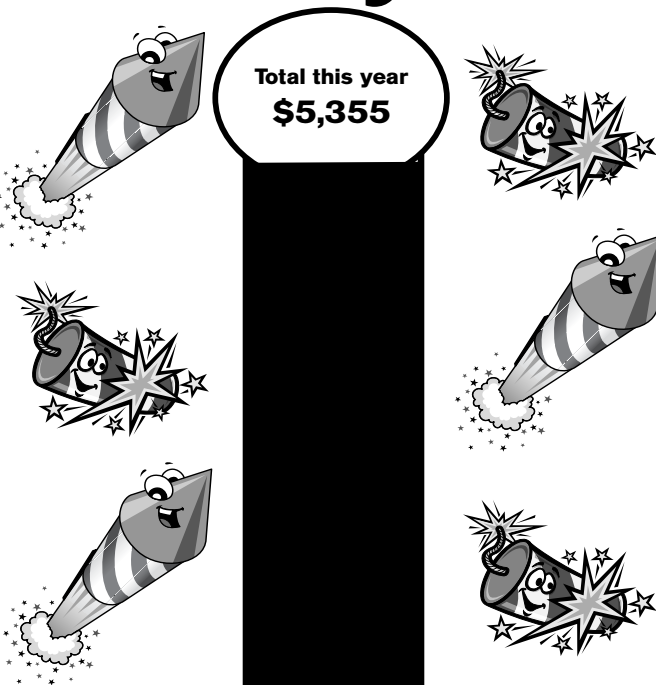

Remembering

Why didn't WWII veterans talk about their military experiences? I know the ones in other wars didn't much either, but since the number of us still around from WWII is growing smaller each day, I decided now is the time to explain why most of us didn't talk.

I don't think there was just a single reason, but probably a lot of common ones. I had my own reasons that I kept quiet for so many years and have in the past few years had my thinking revised due to visitation and meeting with so many veterans talking for the first time and from descendants that wished they had been told what their fathers, spouses, grandfathers and brothers had been through.

I got interested first in 1985, when something told me to get started with veterans, so I started a book on "Gene's Army Life", then got busy, moved two times and quit it. Then in 1991, the same thing happened again and I started out attending our 33rd Infantry Division Reunions. The first one we went to was in Scottsdale, AZ. I was so thrilled I couldn't hardly wait for the day to come and to be there. On the way out, I didn't realize what I was doing until Betty says, "Why are you driving slower and slower?" I guess I was, because I was getting worried about seeing the guys again and how it would affect me. When I walked into the lobby of the hotel, someone hollered, "There's Poynter," and I spent five days of renewed friendship and reliving some of the good and bad memories. Betty said she had never seen so many men cry and hug each other. We're still meeting, I think this year it will be in Kalamazoo, MI, and I hope to go.

Here are some of the reasons that no one talked about it, as was told to me from veterans in a variety of places and states.

1. What you had seen happen during the war that you had no control over or could have prevented.
2. Things you had to do, per military orders, that at the time seemed unreal.
3. Loss of a fellow comrade and being unable to help them.
4. What you may have had to do to stay alive.
5. How we were handled at discharge and later.
6. Negative attitudes of some Americans after coming home.
7. The difference between how the enemy treated prisoners and the way the USA pampered their POWs.

Probably the main reason not much was said about WWII, both in the military and on the home front, was we were all tired of war, with one in Europe and one in the Pacific and were just glad to be able to get home and start over. Our parents and friends were tired of all the different items they were rationed on such as gas, tires, sugar, coffee and a lot more and doing without others; having to do without or make do with personal things or just forget it. So we all tried to get back to normal life as we remembered it, but in a lot of cases, that didn't happen.

There wasn't all honor and respect for returners. There was some resentment, I guess because we were the ones who made it home, and their son was either a casualty or missing in action. For example, one family we were close to had a son missing. I'll never forget how the father greeted me.

"Where have you been and how come you made it home."

I wasn't too happy about that and he never was normal toward me again. The mother hugged me and said how happy she was that I had made it home. That was a terrible thing to not know what hap-

pened to a son.

By the way, from my research, there are still 73,291 soldiers missing in action from WWII.

Just a few years ago, churches, civic organizations, schools and others started asking veterans to tell their stories. They still do, depending on the personal feelings of the pastor, chairman, president or leader of the organization. I have been to several schools, along with other veterans, and been interviewed numerous times for various reasons. I have had TV, newspaper and radio coverage on the "jeep trip". Before then, I had never been asked as to what I was involved in during the war. In 1982, while at Monroe, LA, the visiting International President of the Jaycees was the first individual to ask me about WWII. He was Japanese and was curious as to what Pearl Harbor was about because he had been taught that the U.S. was the aggressor and had invaded their country. He found out differently and he even asked if I had killed any Japanese, how many, how and under what circumstances. I had told him when we started that he would only hear the truth. He spent a week sticking with me and thanked me for helping to clear up that part of history.

In spite of the above reasons I listed, I think the main reason we didn't tell our stories, is **because no one asked**. In the U.S., people have as a whole become complacent and want to just be left alone and may be tired of veterans. If so, there is one way to eliminate them. Come up with a way to curb the fight for power and greed in the U.S. and the world and there will be no need for potential veterans.

Oh yes, and you might ask a veteran in your family, "What did you do?", if it's not too late.

primary residence to the recent floods. The service delivery site will be open Monday through Saturday, 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., and Sunday from 12:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.

A copy of the proposed ordinance is available at City Hall.

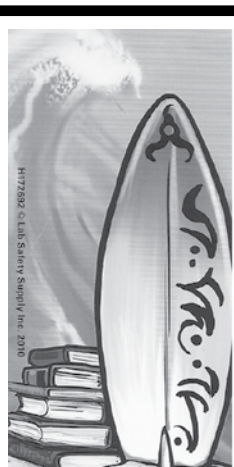
The Zoning Board has five members, which are appointed by the Board of Alderman, one per year. One of the members also serves on the Planning Commission.

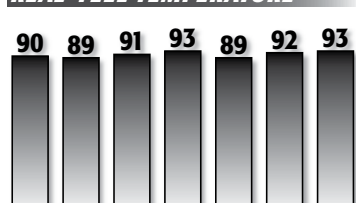

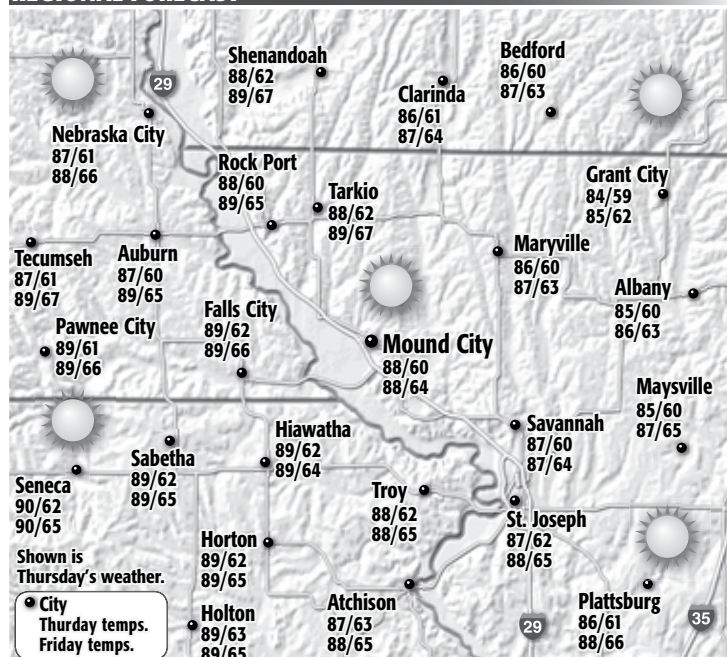

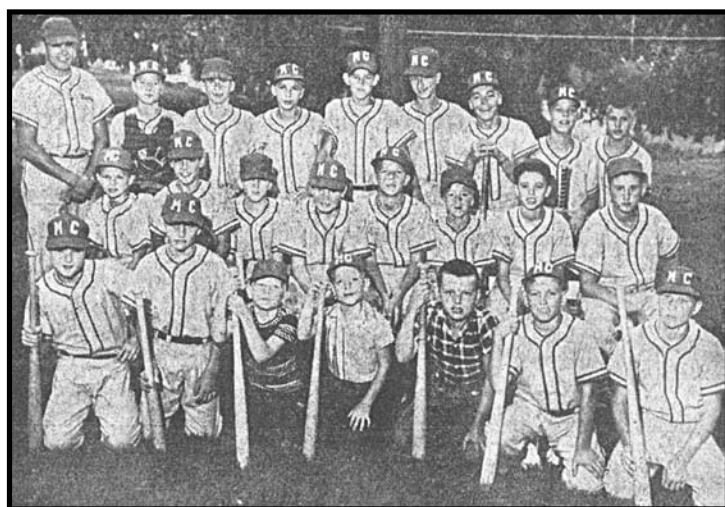

provide quality hunting opportunities for hunters. The Squaw Creek Refuge managed hunt number is 69 when applying for the January, 2011, hunt.

The Holt County Commission met Monday, June 14, 2010, at 9:00 a.m. with Presiding Commissioner Mark Sitherwood, First District Commissioner Bill Gordon and Second District Commissioner Don Holstine present.

After review, Commissioner Gordon made a motion to accept the minutes as written by County Clerk Kathy J. Kunkel. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Holstine.

Brenda Nelson, R.N., Health Department Administrator, met with the commission to renew contracts for the Health Department.

Road and Bridge Supervisor Daryl Biermann joined the commission to report on recent flooding and ongoing work.

Sheriff Scott Wedlock reported the water patrol is present at Big Lake. A number of non-residents with second homes at the lake have moved their belongings in preparation for flooding. Permanent residents are preparing for high water.

Susan Lentz, New Point, requested work on Holt Road 242, which has standing water in the ditch, due to the design of the drainage tube and its location over a buried fiber optic cable. Mrs. Lentz agreed to contact Oregon Farmers Mutual Telephone, who owns the cable and the commission agreed to research a solution.

Being no further business, Commissioner Sitherwood adjourned the meeting until Monday, June 21, 2010, at 9:00 a.m.

June 15
The Holt County Commission met Tuesday, June 15, 2010, at 9:00 a.m., with Presiding Commissioner Mark Sitherwood and First

District Commissioner Bill Gordon present.

Commissioners called an emergency meeting to prepare for flooding. Big Lake Village Board members Denny Saunders and Vince Caputto met with the Commission, Road and Bridge Supervisor Daryl Biermann and Sheriff Scott Wedlock for a State Emergency Management Agency conference call.

Emergency as flooding in the Big Lake area is imminent. Residents were encouraged to evacuate within 24 hours. At 9:30 p.m., a Red Cross Shelter was opened in Mound City at the United Methodist Church.

Being no further business, the Commission adjourned pending new flooding concerns for the remainder of the week.

June 18
The Holt County Commission met Friday, June 18, 2010, at 9:00 a.m., with Presiding Commissioner Mark Sitherwood and First District Commissioner Bill Gordon present.

Commissioners attended a meeting with Governor Jay Nixon at the Mound City United Methodist Church. Flooding is rapidly occurring in the Missouri River flood plain and impacting the unincorporated areas of Holt County lying primarily west of the Little Tarkio Creek levee and the incorporated areas of the Village of Big Lake.

The Commission has dedicated resources and is in contact with the State Emergency Management Agency throughout the emergency and ensuing disaster.

Being no further business, the commission adjourned, pending new flooding concerns for the remainder of the week.

Producers must report prevented planting acreage

Jackie VanGundy, executive director for Holt County Farm Service Agency (FSA), reminds producers of the requirement to report prevented planting acreage for FSA program eligibility.

Producers must report crop acreage they intended to plant, but due to natural disaster, they were prevented from planting. Prevented planting acreage must be reported on an FSA-576, Notice of Loss no later than 15 calendar days after the final planting date. For Holt County, the final planting date for soybeans was June 15, and June 20 for grain sorghum.

If a producer is unable to report the prevented planting acreage within the 15 calendar days following the final planting date, a late-filed report can be submitted. Late-filed reports can only be accepted if a farm visit can be made to assess the eligible disaster condition that prevented the crop from being planted. A mea-

surement service fee will be charged.

Filing an accurate and timely report for all crops and land uses can prevent loss of benefits for a variety of FSA programs. All cropland on the farm must be reported to receive benefits from the Direct and Counter-cyclical Program (DCP), Marketing Assistance Loans and Loan Deficiency Payments (LDPs).

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Precautionary measures- Were taken in Craig, MO, on Wednesday, June 23, as Dennis Showalter, Rob Liles and Phil Morris converged on the south side of town to erect an earthen levee to ward off possible flood waters. The breach in the levee at the Tarkio River and Missouri River juncture on Thursday, June 17, caused the water to run south at a quick rate. But, when the water had filled up to the south, it started to back up to the north, and Craig residents decided they needed to prepare. Craig has up to 15,000 sandbags on hand and acquired two large pumps in case they are needed.



Some homes at Big Lake- Like this one that sits nearer to the flood stage, only received minimal water invasion. Nearly 100 homes on the lake are permanent residences, with 100% of the homes having water damage.



Just west of the juncture of Highway 111 and Highway 118- Water was still boiling over the road on its way south as shown in this photo taken Thursday, June 24. With the strong current rushing through the area for quite some time, one might expect to see some road damage when the water recedes. Only time will tell the magnitude of the damage done on all facets of natural and manmade designs.

Flood of 2010 continues

The constant ebb and flow of the Missouri River is keeping Holt County residents at the ready.

Since publication last week, a levee on the Ideker farm, southwest of Corning, MO, ruptured on Tuesday, June 22, spewing additional waters over more than 1,500 acres of Missouri River bottom.

Water entered the town of Corning, MO, on Wednesday, June 23, and residents began to evacuate and prepare sandbags, although no homes were ultimately threatened at this time.

With the river cresting at record levels on Wednesday, June 23, water levels around the area were seeing their highest marks. Residents in Fortescue, MO, went to work preparing sandbags for the eminent residual effect of the break to the north.

On Friday, June 25, Big Lake State Park recorded 105" of water over the lake's normal level. Approximate-

ly 550 homes (over 100 are permanent residences) and businesses around the lake saw varying levels of water due to disparate elevations. While rooftops on some homes at the lake were all that was visible, other homes had only half of the ground floor submerged. Regardless, 100% of the homes were reported to have water in them.

With the use of Craig's telemetry system for its rural water project, officials noticed a large drop in water tower levels at Big Lake. Deciding a water main must have broken, measures were taken to isolate the area by shutting off the water there.

National Guard troops arrived on Thursday evening, June 24, in response to Gov. Nixon's activation of the Missouri National Guard to provide emergency assistance to northwest Missouri residents affected by the flooding. Local law enforcement, the Missouri State

Highway Patrol, Missouri Water Patrol and Department of Natural Resource personnel have been assisting since the onset of the flooding.

The activation came as a response to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers decision to increase the release rate of water from the Gavins Point reservoir over the next four days.

"From what I'm understanding, we're going to have a high river for quite some time," said Mark Sitherwood, Holt County presiding commissioner. "The Corps indicated that the river level will remain high until the first of the year. We just don't know how high."

The commission is in constant contact with the Corps, strongly expressing the need to have the river level maintained below flood stage, so repairs can be done on the breaks.

Commissioners are also in contact with the railroad,

desirous of making plans to ideally alleviate the drainage problems caused by the elevated track at the south end of Big Lake. Because railroad traffic has been slowed due to the trains being rerouted north to Iowa, the railroad can also see how advantageous larger spillways would be.

The county is monitoring five spots where saturated seepy levees, levee breaks or sand boils may cause additional problems.

While water levels had dropped in many areas, including a 25 inch drop at the lake by Tuesday, June 29, the Missouri River is expected to rise again to near 25 feet today and Friday.

The problem is that no one knows how the increased releases from the Gavins Point Dam and the heavy rains that occurred to the north will impact the many rivers and streams here. Everyone must continue to stay on alert.

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Volunteers worked to fill sandbags- At the Little Tarkio River Bridge, west of Bigelow, MO, on Friday, June 25. Many of the volunteers had already spent six days around the county filling sandbags by hand prior to the arrival of the bagging machine. The bags were being hauled both to the north and south along the levees and boated in to protect grain bins that appeared to be in danger.

Fortescue volunteer sandbaggers get visit from Governor Nixon

Gov. Jay Nixon arrived via the Missouri National Guard Blackhawk helicopter on Tuesday, June 22, in Fortescue, MO, during sandbagging efforts. Volunteers were scrambling to ward off the encroaching waters from the northwest.

The previous day, Governor Nixon had signed Executive Order 10-22 declaring a state of emergency in Missouri in response to the severe weather that was causing significant flooding in northwest Missouri.

"The degree to which the flood waters have fanned out and deepened, affecting more communities like Craig, Corning and Fortescue in just a matter of four days, since I was last in the region, is remarkable," Gov. Nixon said. "We must protect homes, farms, businesses and transportation routes and help with recovery efforts whenever they are needed."

An automatic sandbagging machine was made available to the volunteers by the Corps of Engineers, which expedited their efforts. Many of the bags were utilized along the railroad

bridge, levees and roads in and around Fortescue. Others were stockpiled for possible future use with unstable levees and fluctuating river levels.

The automated sandbagging machine was busy on Friday, June 25, as efforts continued along the Little Tarkio River levee, west of Bigelow, MO. Sandbags were being hauled across the top of the west side of the levee to the north to secure a grain bin from invading waters.

Sandbags were also being transported nearly three miles south on the levee, transferred to boats and used at the Tom Tubbs' farm to secure the earthen levee constructed to protect the farm during the 1993 flood. With the levee becoming saturated, the 500,000 bushels of grain stored on the farm was at great risk. Family and volunteers had transported approximately 3,000 sandbags to the area to aid in protecting their livelihood.

Additional sandbags were filled and stockpiled at the Forest City water plant, Fortescue, Corning and Craig.

Congressional seat at stake

It's not too late to make sure you've been counted in the 2010 Census. The Census Bureau's Telephone Questionnaire Assistance line will remain open until July 10, 2010. Anyone who has not received a form or a visit from a Census enumerator should call 1-866-872-6868. For Spanish-language operators, call 1-866-928-2010.

At its final meeting on Monday, June 28, the Missouri Statewide Complete Count Committee wrapped up its efforts and planned a final push for getting Missourians counted.

"For the past few months, we've communicated with all residents about how important, easy and safe it is to get counted," said Kelvin Simmons, Commissioner of the Office of Administration. Simmons chairs the statewide committee, which was charged with promoting participation in the census. "We've used traditional and new media to reach as many people as possible with our message. There are still a few weeks to make sure every single person in Missouri is counted and we need that to happen."

Funding and representation

make this count crucial to the state. Missouri will keep or lose its ninth Congressional seat by a very narrow margin. Losing that seat means less representation for the state at the federal level. Additionally, estimates are that the state receives up to \$1,300 for every person included in the count. Those dollars go for services such as road and other infrastructure maintenance and repair, as well as schools, support for senior citizens and many other items that residents use every day.

Governor Jay Nixon established the committee by executive order in 2009. The committee's slogan for the state, "Everybody Counts. Get Counted", communicates how important every resident is in this process.

"It's imperative that every person in Missouri gets counted. That's how we will keep our Congressional seat. Check on your family, friends and neighbors and make sure they were counted, too," says Simmons. "If you know someone who hasn't been counted, get them to call the toll-free number and make a difference. This is vital to our future," said Simmons.



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
