Junior Naturalists

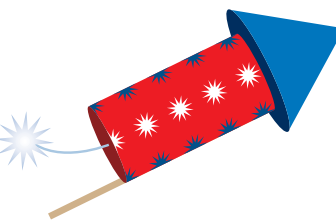

2012 Rumble by the Refuge Truck and Tractor Pull a HUGE success

Cars and trucks filled the entire grounds and were lined up along the highway for the second annual Mound City Rumble by the Refuge Truck and Tractor Pull on Saturday, July 7. The event, sponsored by the Mound City Rural Firemen who did an outstanding job engineering the event, drew an estimated 3,000 people. Despite the extreme temperatures that marked the beginning of the pull, as the sun went down, a nice breeze made a full evening of pulling action very enjoyable.

Over 75 pullers in classes that included: 9200 Super Farm, 6200 Light Super Stock, 6000 Modified, 9500 Limited Pro Stock, 6500 Unlimited Stock, and 8500 Limited Pro Stock. Hot Farm and Diesel Pickups also participated in the second annual event. The event was sanctioned by the Professional Pullers' League and Nebraska Bush Pullers' Association. The Mound City Rural Firemen dispersed a total purse to 8 classes of \$19,500.

Remembering by Eugene Poynter

The 4th of July, Independence Day, has a lot of different ways to be celebrated. In most cases, excluding flying the flag, not too much time is spent in remembering the past military who helped to keep it as such. Probably, the main reason is most veterans don't want to be involved, or were not asked to participate. I think most will agree that the day is one for family gatherings or different ways to entertain or be entertained. Not that that isn't great, but it should also be a day when veterans should be telling his/her family about what he/she may have gone through during their tenure in the military to keep the United States of America free, like it was established in the beginning of building this great country. Most people have forgotten the continuous struggle to do so, which enables us to still have a 4th of July celebration.

A few weeks ago, a young man handed me a four-page written interview of some of his granddad's World War II service activities. (This is a good example of how little time it takes to make it a part of a family history.) His grandfather was over 85 at the time of the interview and, as in most cases, is nearly too long to have waited to have the stories told. I was 76 years old myself before I started relating my experiences. The interview I received was about this man's time as a German prisoner of war.

The grandfather spoke in the interview about events that took place after the Battle of the Bulge. The Germans overran his unit and took 96 of them and put them in a railroad boxcar. His car, along with several more boxcars, was filled with captured Jews to be taken to Aushwitz

(and the ovens), where they were to be gassed and cremated. Before being loaded, the Jews had spent over 3 days without food and water. In the boxcar, they spent 6 and a half days without food and water and endured the dead body of an 18 year-old. The passengers took turns standing up so each could try to rest and sleep. For some reason, the Germans left the granddad's boxcar and had forgotten about it or those passengers would have been taken to that terrible place and been gassed and cremated. Instead, the Germans put the prisoners in a concentration camp nearby and made them work at rebuilding the railroad. It had been put out of service as a result of allied bombing.

During the grandfather's time of 4 months or more in the camp, he could only remember having but one bath and where he bathed, it was so cold that the water froze to the floor, just like a skating rink. He had to wait there barefooted and naked, while the Germans deliced his clothing and when the clothes were returned, the fumes were so strong he could hardly stand it. Almost all prisoners had frozen feet, which bothered him a lot in the winter for several years afterwards.

When working at repairing the railroad, the prisoners would be gone for 2-3 weeks from the camp and would sleep wherever they could and eat whatever they could find. As they were near the Russian front where the Germans were trying to stop moves, the trains were filled with civilians and military coming back and carried supplies and men to the front.

The American prisoners planned an escape since they were so close to the front, and used their knowledge of train movements to sneak aboard and ride to a place near a tunnel, where they, without guns, overpowered some of the Germans and secured the train and made their escape to the Allied Forces. This all took place near the time of the granddad's birthday on April 26, 1945.

What a sight the grandfather said they were, in dirty, smelly, baggy and torn clothes. Most men weighed about half as much as they did before they were captured. He was down to 85 pounds. After the prisoners were taken behind the lines, they were fed the first good meal they'd had in 5 months. He ate so much steak and potatoes that he got sick.

The American men stayed in the hospital for about 4 months. During that time, they were given new clothing, debriefed, given medicine, treated for frostbite, and fed the right foods to help get their stomachs working properly again. Finally, the men were shipped back to the United States. After 2 weeks crossing the Atlantic, they touched American soil again. He said they immediately felt 200% better.

This man, and what others of us went through, whether in WWII or any other conflict, is what made the USA what it is supposed to be: A land of the free, with an Independence Day to celebrate. All veterans, regardless of their feelings, have an obligation to tell their stories to others, because it is history being lost if we don't. It doesn't take long to do it, so do it before it's too late. I still say, GOD BLESS AMERICA, even though it's not a popular saying in some circles.

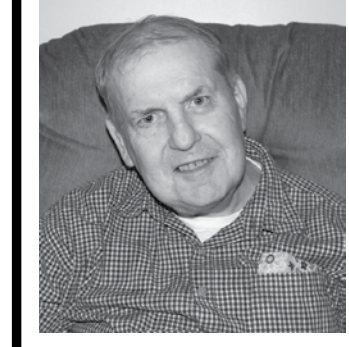

- Boy Scout Troop 59 of Maitland, MO, and the scoutmaster, Eddie Hillman, spent the weekend at Lake Three Fires in Bedford, IA.

25 Years Ago - 1987

- Nearly 1,000 people flocked to the 2nd annual Big Lake Improvement Association Luau held at the Big Lake, MO, Village Office. The event raised nearly \$4,000 profit to be used to help rebuild the levee that protects the lake.

- Dredging equipment was being hauled into Big Lake by Magruder Construction. The dredging would double the lake depth from 5 feet to 10 feet. Work would begin adjacent to the park.

- Mound City Scout Troop 71 members participated in Boy Scout Camp at Camp Geiger and qualified for their International Scouting Badge by hosting three English Scouts. Proposed Constitutional Amendment

To be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Missouri at the Special Election to be held on Tuesday, the 7th day of August, 2012.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT 2

Proposed by the 96th General Assembly (First Regular Session) HJR 2

Shall the Missouri Constitution be amended to ensure:

- That the right of Missouri citizens to express their religious beliefs shall not be infringed;
- That school children have the right to pray and acknowledge God voluntarily in their schools; and
- That all public schools shall display the Bill of Rights of the United States Constitution.

It is estimated this proposal will result in little or no costs or savings for state and local governmental entities.

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives, the Senate concurring therein:

That at the next general election to be held in the state of Missouri, on Tuesday next following the first Monday in November, 2012, or at a special election to be called by the governor for that purpose, there is hereby submitted to the qualified voters of this state, for adoption or rejection, the following amendment to article I of the Constitution of the state of Missouri: Section A. Section 5, article I, Constitution of Missouri, is repealed and one new section adopted in lieu thereof, to be

known as section 5, to read as follows:

Section 5. That all men and women have a natural and inalienable right to worship Almighty God according to the dictates of their own consciences; that no human authority can control or interfere with the rights of conscience; that no person shall, on account of his or her religious persuasion or belief, be rendered ineligible to any public office or trust or profit in this state, be disqualified from testifying or serving as a juror, or be molested in his or her person or estate; that to secure a citizen's right to acknowledge Almighty God according to the dictates of his or her own conscience, neither the state nor any of its political subdivisions shall establish any official religion, nor shall a citizen's right to pray or express his or her religious beliefs be infringed; that the state shall not coerce any person to participate in any prayer or other religious activity, but shall ensure that any person shall have the right to pray individually or corporately in a private or public setting so long as such prayer does not result in disturbance of the peace or disruption of a public meeting or assembly; that citizens as well as elected officials and employees of the state of Missouri and its political subdivisions shall have the right to pray on government premises and public property so long as such prayers abide within the same parameters placed upon any other free speech under similar circumstances; that

the General Assembly and the governing bodies of political subdivisions may extend to ministers, clergypersons, and other individuals the privilege to offer invocations or other prayers at meetings or sessions of the General Assembly or governing bodies; that students may express their beliefs about religion in written and oral assignments free from discrimination based on the religious content of their work; that no student shall be compelled to perform or participate in academic assignments or educational presentations that violate his or her religious beliefs; that the state shall ensure public school students their right to free exercise of religious expression without interference, as long as such prayer or other expression is private and voluntary, whether individually or corporately, and in a manner that is not disruptive and as long as such prayers or expressions abide within the same parameters placed upon any other free speech under similar circumstances; and, to emphasize the right to free exercise of religious expression, that all free public schools receiving state appropriations shall display, in a conspicuous and legible manner, the text of the Bill of Rights of the Constitution of the United States; but this section shall not be construed to expand the rights of prisoners in state or local custody beyond those afforded by the laws of the United States, excuse acts of licentiousness, nor to justify

practices inconsistent with the good order, peace or safety of the state, or with the rights of others.

EXPLANATION—Matter enclosed in bold-faced brackets [thus] in the above bill is not enacted and is intended to be omitted from the law. Matter in bold-face type in the above bill is proposed language.

Extension Council members learn about MU research participating in Extension Council to Campus event

University of Missouri Extension Council members from across the state learned about emerging research at the University of Missouri (MU) and how it connects to citizens during the seventh annual Council to Campus Conference, Friday and Saturday, June 22 and 23. MU Extension Council members, Sallie Jo Potter (Andrew County) and Dave Bomgardner (Mercer County), attended the event along with Wilson Majee, Mercer County MU Extension County Program Director, and Karma Metzgar, MU Extension Regional Director—Northwest Region.

“MU’s research and extension programs have public value and improve citizens’ quality of life by reducing costs to society, empowering citizens to implement change, protecting the environment or building the economy,” said HC Russell, chair of the State Extension Council. Metzgar presented on “Communicating Your Public Value Messages in the Media to Groups and Stakeholders”.

University of Missouri System President Tim Wolfe spoke via video on the value extension has to the entire state. He said that extension is core to higher education and a critical part of the land-grant mission.

Programs presented at the conference included:

- “Council Members’ Role in Communicating Impact

of MU Extension Programs”: MU Extension county council members learned how to communicate the impact of extension programs as an investment made in their communities.

- “Taking Care of YOU: Body-Mind-Spirit”: This research-based, multi-session program developed by MU Extension offers practical strategies to help adults better manage life’s stress and challenges.

- “Electricity Generation Sustainability Index”: This tool allows users to evaluate any new electricity generation project in terms of its feasibility, sustainability related indicators and an overall sustainability index.

- “Creating Entrepreneurs, Enterprises and Employment”: Created by MU Extension Business Development Program, the business curricula help start-up companies and existing firms enhance their competitiveness, survive economic challenges, enter new markets, commercialize technology and pursue government contracts.

- “Food and Ag Industry”: This presentation focused on reasons for the recent recession and policy options under consideration for recovery.

- “Food Power Showcase” is a fun K-5th grade program that teaches students the importance of healthy eating and physical activity in an exciting and interactive way.

The facility was designed to provide research infrastructure so that new technologies and advance-

ments in clinical care for older people could be a part of the everyday experience.

The attendees also heard from Vice Provost and Director of Extension Michael Quart about federal and state budgets. He shared work that the campus does to support local programs and staffing levels.

Wallaces win Aruba trip

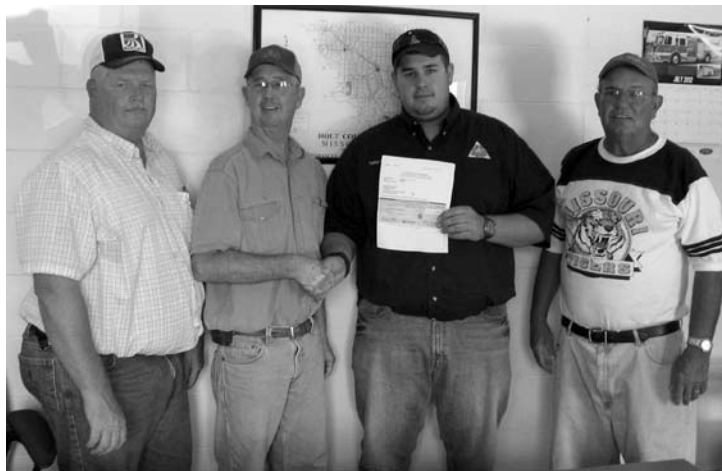

Holt County 4-H Achievement Day

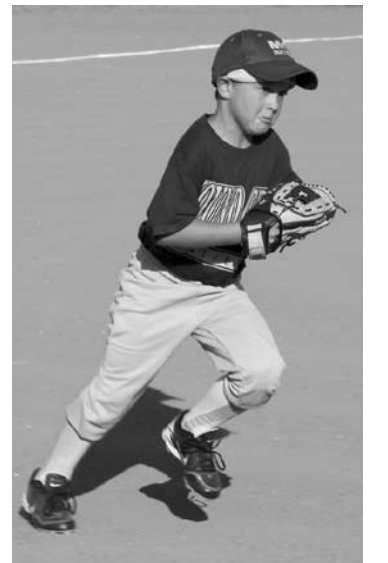
