Truck and tractor pull draws large crowd

Around 1,500 spectators were on hand for the First Annual Mound City Rural Firemen Truck and Tractor Pull at the rodeo grounds, west of Mound City, on Friday, July 9. The Mound City Rural Firefighters offered a total prize purse for the event of \$8,500, that drew 36 pullers from Missouri, Kansas, Nebraska and Iowa. Pullers used a Bauer-built Red Rock Pulling Sled and East Central rules applied.

The Hurricane Allis Pulling Team did an exhibition at the pull that the crowd was very excited about.

Chris Waegele, who helped coordinate the event and did the announcing for the first annual Mound City pull, brought the team in to help peak interest.

Chris Waegele has been around tractor pulling since he was six years old and has announced at pulls around Northwest Missouri for nearly 10 years, including two years at the Missouri State Fair. Waegele travels with the Hurricane Allis Pulling Team out of Winchester, KS, to pulls throughout the east central United States on the Lucas Oil Pro Pulling League Champions Tour, which can be seen on ESPN2 at certain times of the year.

"I thought the pull went off excellent and the whole rural firefighter crew did a great job conducting the pull," Chris Waegele commented.

The event began at 7:00 p.m. and offsite parking fa-

cilities had to be utilized for nearly 150 cars by 7:30 p.m., with bus transportation being used to haul spectators to the grounds.

First Student, the unionized school bus transportation system that services Holt County school districts, has put out a plea for individuals to step up and become bus drivers.

Richard Corbin, Mound City's bus barn supervisor, indicated that the barn was short one driver for last year's routes. Compounded with a regular driver having to take medical leave this fall, there is a need for at least two new drivers. Drivers can be utilized for routes as well as school trips.

"Farmers, housewives, handicapped individuals and retired people need to step forward and get our kids to school," stated Richard Corbin, who is concerned about the issue.

With automatic transmissions, electric doors and good kids, being a bus driver has never been easier. Drivers must be over 21 years old, pass a D.O.T. physical, physical

More school bus drivers needed

dexterity test and successfully obtain a Class B license with a school bus and passenger endorsement.

First Student provides all the testing and training necessary to obtain credentials. Drivers are paid while they receive 39 hours of classroom training as well as doing 17 hours of actual bus driving, before obtaining their license.

Drivers' salaries begin at \$11.95 an hour. Benefits include two paid holidays in 2010 (with increases next year) and drivers having the summer off with a recall date, which means they are able to collect unemployment without having to do a work search.

Mound City routes require only three hours a day, from 6:30 to 8:00 a.m. and from 3:15 to 4:45 p.m. each school day (except for early dismissals).

If bus drivers are not found, districts may have to take measures that would cut bus routes, putting kids on buses for two and a half hours. Incidentally, by Missouri state statute, a district is only required to offer bus transportation to riders that live 3.5 miles or further from school, which may be another viable option.

"We've always been fortunate to have people step up to help our school and our community," remarked Mound City Superintendent Ken

Eaton. "I'm confident that we will get through this situation as well."

With Governor Nixon cutting school bus transportation funding in June, Holt County districts are having to make reductions in transportation expenditures.

Mound City Superintendent, Ken Eaton, indicated that the Mound City R-2 District would potentially realize a \$12,000 to \$15,000 reduction in transportation reimbursements for the 2010-2011 school year. State statute dictates that the state pay 75% of eligible transportation costs, but of Mound City's \$140,000 budget, the expectation for 2010-2011 would be roughly \$40,000 instead of the \$55,000.

Fishing Derby committee meeting

State Fiscal Year 2010 General Revenue Report

State Budget Director Linda Luebbering recently announced that Fiscal Year 2010 ended with net general revenue collections declining 9.1 percent compared to Fiscal Year 2009, from \$7.45 billion last year to \$6.77 billion this year.

Net general revenue collections for June 2010 decreased by 21.8 percent compared to those for June 2009, from \$629.3 million to \$492.2 million.

The following are the Gross Collections by Tax Type.

• Individual income tax collections

-decreased 7.6 percent for the year, from \$5.94 billion last year to \$5.48 billion this year

-decreased 0.04 percent for the month.

• Sales and use tax collections

-decreased 4.9 percent for the year from \$1.88 billion last year to \$1.79 billion this year.

-decreased 9.3 percent for the month.

• Corporate income and corporate franchise tax collections

-decreased 4.9 percent for the year, from \$528.3 million last year to \$502.2 million this year.

-increased 13.9 percent for the month.

• All other collections

-decreased 14.4 percent for the year, from \$544.5 million last year to \$465.8 million this year.

-decreased 34.4 percent for the month.

• Refunds

-increased 2.0 percent for the year, from \$1.44 billion last year to \$1.47 billion this year.

-increased 62.3 percent for the month.

Loess Bluff Shelter gets rebuilt

Andrew Ireland, Mound City senior and Scout from Troop 81 for five years, has been arduous in his commitment to constructing a new Loess Bluff Shelter at the top of the Loess Hill Trail at the Squaw Creek Wildlife Refuge.

The project, approved by the Eagle Board in Maryville, MO, started approximately two weeks ago. Andrew and a crew of "chosen volunteers" began demolition of the old shelter built by the CCC many years ago with all manmade timbers.

The renovated shelter is being built from 1936 structural plans that are framed and hung in the refuge headquarters. In addition to natural supplies from the refuge, costs of the materials are being covered by donations from the Mound City Kiwanis, Lions Club and Tiffany Heights Care Center.

"After speaking with refuge officials, I chose this project because it looked interesting," remarked Andrew.

The new structure's framework is made from cedar trees cut at the refuge with assistance from refuge personnel. The cedar clearing will also provide a better habitat for owls.

Hauling the supplies and logs to the site has been the most difficult aspect of the project thus far.

Andrew and his assistants, Zach Kahle, Kelby Seikman and CJ Staples, hope to have the project complete in the next couple of weeks. A cedar log awning and railing have yet to be attached at the front of the shelter. The roof of the

entire project will then be covered with wood shingles, another challenge for the prospective Eagle Scout.

"Everyone will get to see and enjoy it when they hike this trail," Andrew commented about the project.

The shelter will afford hikers a beautiful scenic respite from their hike during the refuge's 75th anniversary celebration in August.

Lifeline is a government program that offers qualified people a discount on their monthly local telephone bill. Each state has its own guidelines to qualify. Lifeline is available on one telephone service per household, whether wireline or wireless.

How much can I save on my phone bill?

NWMC offers two Lifeline Plan options, a \$17.95 plan and a \$21.95 plan. You will save up to \$8.25 on either of these selected plans.

How do I know if I'm eligible?

You're eligible for Lifeline if you participate in any of the following programs:

1. Medicaid
2. Food Stamps
3. Supplemental Security Income (SSI)
4. Federal Public Housing Assistance Program (LIHEAP)
5. Low Income Housing Assistance or Section 8
6. Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF)
7. National School Lunch free lunch program
8. Veteran Administration Disability Benefits, State Blind Pension, State Aid to Blind Persons, Federal Social Security Disability, or State Supplement Payments (only those who are totally and permanently disabled or blind).

Are there any restrictions?

Lifeline can only be used for one telephone per household - either wireless or wireline.

How do I apply?

Applications are available at social services offices, Northwest Missouri Cellular's main office, all agent locations or online at www.nwmccl.com You may also contact us at (800) 331-6341.

Other Information:

Discounts may be available on select handsets. Please see retail office for more information.

How do I continue to receive Lifeline benefits?

Eligibility is reviewed periodically.

Link-up helps households pay the activation charge for telephone service. This program pays some of the cost of installing local service in your home, but Link-Up does not cover the cost of a phone.

How much will I save by using Link-Up?

Link-Up will pay 50% of your activation charges or \$25.00, whichever is less.

How do I know if I am eligible?

If you qualify for Lifeline you also qualify for Link-Up.

Does Link-Up have any restrictions?

You must provide proof of eligibility before the service can be activated. The Link-Up discount cannot be applied to activation charges you incurred before you applied for the program.

How do I apply for Link-Up?

To apply for Link-Up you will follow the same application process as Lifeline and the same proof of eligibility as Lifeline.

Being a Lifeline or Link-Up customer does not protect you from being disconnected if you fail to pay your telephone bill. Normal collection practices apply.

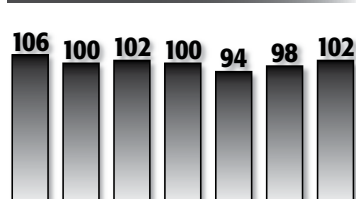

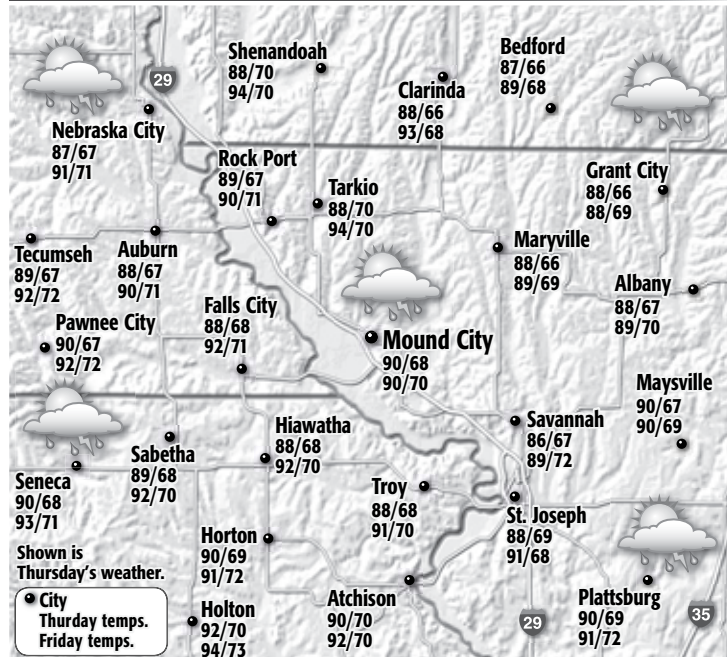

A century of life

Hazel Rother was born one of five daughters to Jim and Dolly Barker near Craig, MO, on July 13, 1910.

When she was less than ten years old, she was helping her father in the fields with some heavy duty farm tasks.

Her father would harness the horses and Hazel would drive them through the field. They mowed and baled hay. She remembers her dad and brother having a thrashing machine to harvest the wheat. They didn't plant beans.

In addition to working alongside her father in the fields, Hazel took an active role in the many farm chores that occurred. She remembers milking the cows, taking care of the hogs and chickens and helping in the garden. Butchering was done on the farm and Hazel recalls being very self-sufficient.

"We all kept busy. There wasn't any time to fool around," Hazel stated.

Hazel and her sisters entertained themselves. They had homemade dolls. They

would get one thing for Christmas and felt fortunate to get that.

"If we got a bucket of fruit for Christmas, oh, my, that was a treat," Hazel exclaimed.

Hazel remembers not having an abundance of clothes like we do today. They went barefoot in the summer, because they didn't have to buy shoes then.

"We didn't have a lot of clothes," Hazel recalled, "but enough to keep our nakedness from showing."

In comparing today with her early life, she said they just never got to go anywhere. Hazel remembers her dad coming in on a Saturday night, taking a hot bath and putting on his patent leather shoes. They would then head out for a "visit".

It wasn't announced, no big meal or deal, they just went to visit- just hop in the horse drawn wagon and go.

"That's a big change. Now, people don't visit anymore," Hazel said. "Everyone is in too big of a hurry."

Hazel's memories bear

witness to the ever-changing world we live in. Not only are the days of horses, buggies and self-sufficiency a thing of the past, but for those of us that can glean those firsthand experiences, we'd better get to "visiting".

Proposed Statutory Amendment

To be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Missouri at the Special Election to be held on Tuesday, the 3rd day of August, 2010.

PROPOSITION C Proposed by 95th General Assembly (Second Regular Session) SS SCS HCS HB 1764 Shall the Missouri Statutes be amended to: • Deny the government authority to penalize citizens for refusing to purchase private health insurance or infringe upon the right to offer or accept direct payment for lawful healthcare services? • Modify laws regarding the liquidation of certain domestic insurance companies? It is estimated this proposal will have no immediate costs or savings to state or local governmental entities. However, because of the uncertain interaction of the proposal with implementation of the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, future costs to state governmental entities are unknown. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the state of Missouri, as follows: Section A. Section 375.1175, RSMo, is repealed and two new sections enacted in lieu thereof, to be known as sections 1.330 and 375.1175, to read as follows: 1.330. 1. No law or rule shall compel, directly or indirectly, any person, employer, or health care provider to participate in any health care system. 2. A person or employer may pay directly for lawful health care services and shall not be required by law or rule to pay penalties or fines for paying directly for lawful health care services. A health care provider may accept direct payment for lawful health care services and shall not be required by law or rule to pay penalties or fines for accepting direct payment from a person or employer for lawful health care services. 3. Subject to reasonable and necessary rules that do not substantially limit a person's options, the purchase or sale of health insurance in private health care systems shall not be prohibited by law or rule. 4. This section does not: (1) Affect which health care services a health care provider or hospital is required to perform or provide; (2) Affect which health care services are permitted by law; (3) Prohibit care provided under workers' compensation as provided under state law; (4) Affect laws or regulations in effect as of January 1, 2010; (5) Affect the terms or conditions of any health care system to the extent that those terms and conditions do not have the effect of punishing a person or employer for paying directly for lawful health care services or a health care provider or hospital for accepting direct payment from a person or employer for lawful health care services. 5. As used in this section, the following terms shall mean: (1) "Compel", any penalties or fines; (2) "Direct payment or pay directly", payment for lawful health care services without a public or private third party, not including an employer, paying for any portion of the service; (3) "Health care system", any public or private entity whose function or purpose is the management of, processing of, enrollment of individuals for or payment for, in full or in part, health care services or health care data or health care information for its participants; (4) "Lawful health care services", any health-

related service or treatment to the extent that the service or treatment is permitted or not prohibited by law or regulation that may be provided by persons or businesses otherwise permitted to offer such services; and (5) "Penalties or fines", any civil or criminal penalty or fine, tax, salary or wage withholding or surcharge or any named fee with a similar effect established by law or rule by a government established, created or controlled agency that is used to punish or discourage the exercise of rights protected under this section. 375.1175. 1. The director may petition the court for an order directing him to liquidate a domestic insurer or an alien insurer domiciled in this state on the basis: (1) Of any ground for an order of rehabilitation as specified in section 375.1165, whether or not there has been a prior order directing the rehabilitation of the insurer; (2) That the insurer is insolvent; (3) That the insurer is in such condition that the further transaction of business would be hazardous, financially or otherwise, to its policyholders, its creditors or the public; (4) That the insurer is found to be in such condition after examination that it could not meet the requirements for incorporation and authorization specified in the law under which it was incorporated or is doing business; or (5) That the insurer has ceased to transact the business of insurance for a period of one year. 2. Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, a domestic insurer organized as a stock insurance company may voluntarily dissolve and liquidate as a corporation under sections 351.462 to 351.482, provided that: (1) The director, in his or her sole discretion, approves the articles of dissolution prior to filing such articles with the secretary of state. In determining whether to approve or disapprove the articles of dissolution, the director shall consider, among other factors, whether: (a) The insurer's annual financial statements filed with the director show no written insurance premiums for five years; and (b) The insurer has demonstrated that all policyholder claims have been satisfied or have been transferred to another insurer in a transaction approved by the director; and (c) An examination of the insurer pursuant to sections 374.202 to 374.207 has been completed within the last five years; and (2) The domestic insurer files with the secretary of state a copy of the director's approval, certified by the director, along with articles of dissolution as provided in section 351.462 or 351.468. Section B. This act is hereby submitted to the qualified voters of this state for approval or rejection at an election which is hereby ordered and which shall be held and conducted on Tuesday next following the first Monday in August, 2010, pursuant to the laws and constitutional provisions of this state for the submission of referendum measures by the general assembly, and this act shall become effective when approved by a majority of the votes cast thereon at such election and not otherwise. Section C. Pursuant to chapter 116, RSMo, and other applicable constitutional provisions and laws of this state allowing the general assembly to adopt ballot language for the submission of this act to the voters of this state, the official ballot title of this act shall be as follows: "Shall the Missouri Statutes be amended to: • Deny the government authority to penalize citizens for refusing to purchase private health insurance or infringe upon the right to offer or accept direct payment for lawful healthcare services? • Modify laws regarding the liquidation of certain domestic insurance companies?" A large group of nearly 100 full and part-time Big Lake residents- Turned out for the complimentary meal at the Christian Fellowship Church on Tuesday, July 6. The meal organized by the New Liberty Baptist Church gave the flood victims a chance to visit and receive important information about resources at their disposal in regard to clean-up and rebuilding.

Big Lake residents gather for food and planning

Despite the fact that residents of Big Lake are frustrated that the governor has not signed a disaster declaration for their flood-ravaged homes and the many thousands of acres of cropland, their hearts are looking to the future.

At a complimentary meal for displaced flood victims on Tuesday, July 6, by New Liberty Baptist Church, residents had a chance to visit about the conditions of their homes and about going back to Big Lake.

Another meal was hosted for residents by Big Lake Resort concessionaires, Al Schmurr and Lindsay McCormick, at Griffith Park on Friday, July 9.

In Omaha, NE, 70 part-time residents met together to discuss the issues arising from the flood and to talk about plans to go back.

Steph Miller of Miller Re-

alty and others briefly gave reliable information about resources available for clean up and rebuilding. A complete Work List was compiled to assist homeowners with every facet of the restoration process.

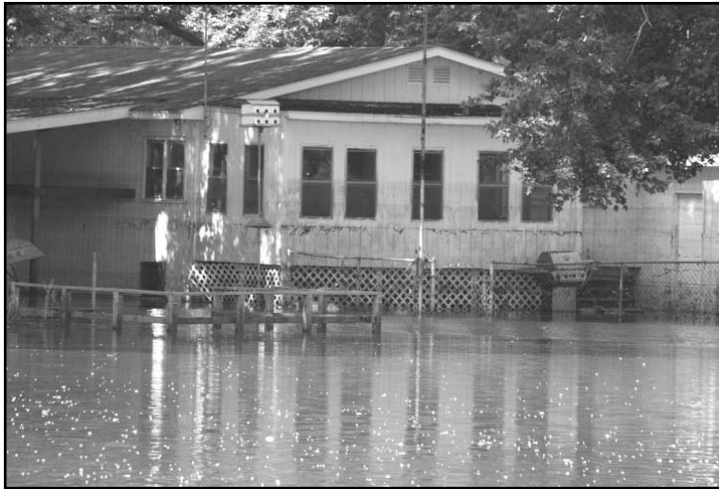
"People come back to the lake because of the people," stated Miller, "That was obvious this past week with all the meetings. The camaraderie among people is so strong."

The part-timers in Omaha were asking what they could do for the full-timers at the lake, even going so far as to volunteer to come up and help them clean up their residences.

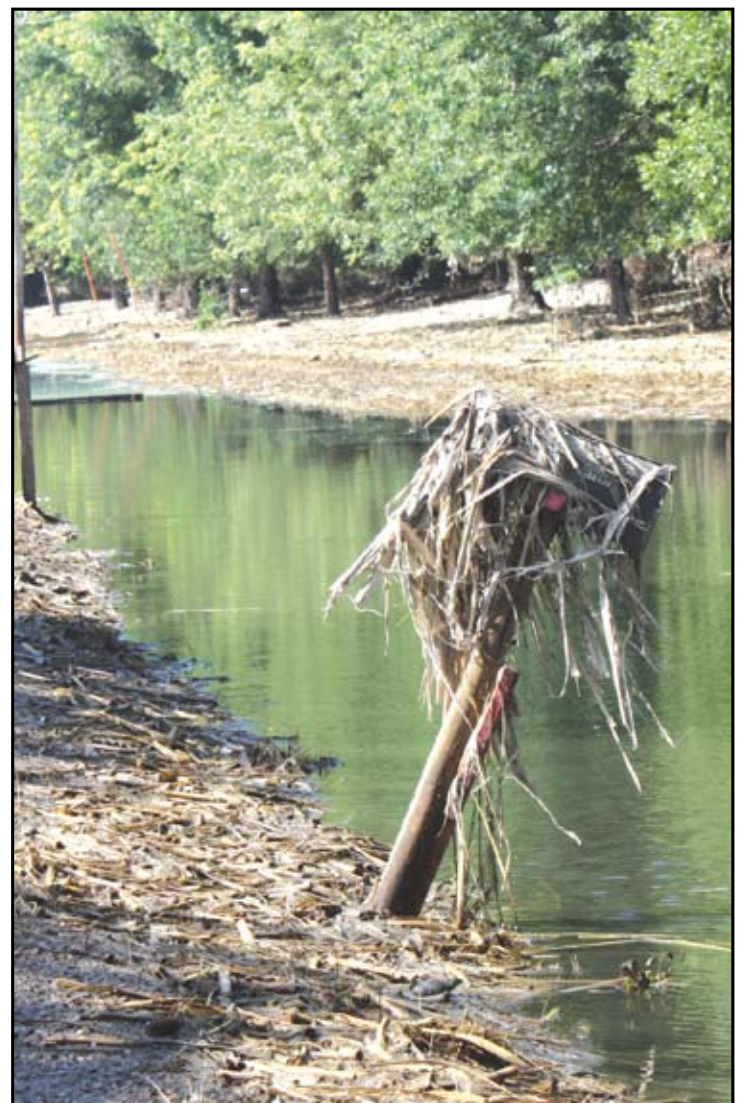
While the water recedes, Big Lake residents forge ahead, hoping that once they're able to get to their property, there will be funds to help them with the process.



What is suspected to be an enormous hole- On Road 220 on the northwest side of Big Lake, makes it impossible for residents to return to their homes. Aside from the large ditch at the corner of Road 220, silted in areas and debris, residents are still waiting for the flood waters to recede. This hole created in the early stages of the flood, as the current burst through the area, could contain the damaged water main that rendered Big Lake without water.



As water receded from Big Lake- This home on Mobile Lane was visibly "marked" from the water that has inundated the structure over the past four weeks.



This mailbox- Is located on the east side of Big Lake headquarters along Highway 111. Flood waters still prohibit full access to the south end of Big Lake, and as the water goes down, the devastation becomes more evident.
