### More school bus drivers needed

dexterity test and successfully obtain a Class B license with a school bus and passenger endorsement.

First Student provides all the testing and training necessary to obtain credentials. Drivers are paid while they receive 39 hours of classroom training as well as doing 17 hours of actual bus driving, before obtaining their license.

Drivers' salaries begin at \$11.95 an hour. Benefits include two paid holidays in (with increases next year) and drivers having the summer off with a recall date, which means they are able to collect unemployment without having to do a work search.

Mound City routes require only three hours a day, from 6:30 to 8:00 a.m. and from 3:15 to 4:45 p.m. each school day (except for early dismissals).

If bus drivers are not found, districts may have to take measures that would cut bus routes, putting kids on busses for two and a half hours. Incidentally, by Missouri state statute, a district is only required to offer bus transportation to riders that live 3.5 miles or further from school, which may be another viable option.

"We've always been fortunate to have people step up to help our school and our community," remarked Mound Superintendent Ken at 660-582-7787.

Eaton. "I'm confident that we will get through this situation as well."

With Governor Nixon cutting school bus transportation funding in June, Holt County districts are having to make reductions in transportation expenditures.

Mound City Superintendent, Ken Eaton, indicated that the Mound City R-2 District would potentially realize a \$12,000 to \$15,000 reduction in transportation reimbursements for the 2010-2011 school year. State statute dictates that the state pay 75% of eligible transportation costs, but of Mound City's \$140,000 budget, the expectation for 2010-2011 would be roughly \$40,000 instead of the \$55,000.



Board of Aldermen for the City of Mound City was held on Thursday, July 8, 2010, at 5:30 p.m. The following minutes were from that meeting.

Alderman Nauman called the meeting to order. Those present were Duane Nauman, Jim Krueger, Robert Heck, City Clerk Patsy Smith, City Collector Kelly Miller, Sewer Superintendent Kelly Graves, Officer Luke Lee, Marilyn Alldredge, Joe Laukemper and Kevin Rost. Larry Russell was absent.

Minutes.

Presentations/guests: Holt County R-II School: Retaining Wall/Landscaping Project – Kevin Rost, Ellison-Auxier Architects, presented plans and sketches for replacing the retaining wall on the west side of the school. It is proposed to remove 110' of the existing wall north of the stairs which go into the main entrance. A tiered retaining wall, probably made with large stacked blocks, and new stairs would be constructed. Mr. Rost proposed constructing a new 6' wide sidewalk further east on school property and utilizing the current sidewalk and grass parkway area for off-street parking, which should create six parking spaces. The parking area would be concrete to match

Krueger moved to approve the proposed construction on the city's right-of-way, Heck seconded. Approved unanimously.

Alderman Seitz mentioned working with the school to establish a designated crosswalk for kids walking between the school and the Ag building.

Street Drainage – Not present. Kelly Graves reported he has done some work to alleviate the problem of water coming off of Gillis Street onto the Kunkels' property.

New Business:

4th of July Parade – Alderman Seitz and Officer Lee reported receiving numerous complaints about a parade entry that was driving carelessly. Seitz feels this should be addressed before future parades and stressed this reinforces the reason for requiring certificates of insurance and hold harmless agreements from organizations that plan events on city property. It was pointed out officials where a little lax in getting certificates for some events this year.

NW MO Enterprise Facilitation: Liquor Permit - Marilyn Alldredge, Fairfax, with Northwest MO Enterprise Facilitation discussed its plans to hold a wine tasting fundraiser on Saturday, October 9, with 15-20 booths for artisans. The original plan was to hold the event at Big Lake State park, but with the flooding they are looking for a different location and requested use of Griffith Park, which is conveniently close to the Mound City Development Corp members vineyards. The event would be outdoors and they would somehow rope off the area and charge admission. There would be local entertainment on the stage, grape stomping, displays, etc. After further discussion, Alderman Seitz moved to waive the city ordinance which prohibits drinking liquor in Griffith Park for the date, time and area utilized by the Northwest MO Enterprise Facilitation winetasting fundraiser provided they meet the criteria for providing a certificate of insurance, fencing and security; and to approve issuance of a temporary liquor license for the wine tasting. Alderman Heck seconded. Ap-

proved unanimously.

**Department Reports:** Police - Officer Luke Lee reviewed and discussed the monthly report with the councilmen. When questioned about reported two assists for Troop H Highway Patrol and one assist for the Holt County Sheriff's Department. Council members are concerned with whether calls for assistance from the Sheriff's Department are actually needed or if city officers are being taken advantage of. Alderman Seitz suggested the city may need to draft a formal mutual aid agreement and take it to the County

Commissioners for approval. Officer Lee reported that things are going well in the absence of Chief Panning and he has had minimal problems. Water - Leak detection surveys are done annually at a cost of \$1,000. It could actually be a cost savings if surveys are Robert & Donna Kunkel: done semi-annually and detected leaks are repaired sooner thereby reducing water loss. The council agreed to have leak detection surveys done semiannually.

#### **PROPOSITION C** Proposed by 95th General Assembly (Second

Regular Session) SS SCS HCS HB 1764 Shall the Missouri Statutes be amended to:

• Deny the government authority to penalize citizens for refusing to purchase private health insurance or infringe upon the right to offer or accept direct payment for lawful healthcare services?

· Modify laws regarding the liquidation of certain domestic insurance companies?

It is estimated this proposal will have no immediate costs or savings to state or local governmental entities. However, because of the uncertain interaction of the proposal with implementation of the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, future costs to state governmental entities are

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the state of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Section 375.1175, RSMo, is repealed and two new sections enacted in lieu thereof, to be known as sections 1.330 and 375.1175, to read as follows:

1.330. 1. No law or rule shall compel,  $\ directly\ or\ indirectly, any\ person, employer,$ or health care provider to participate in any health care system.

2. A person or employer may pay directly for lawful health care services and shall not be required by law or rule to pay penalties or fines for paying directly for lawful health care services. A health care provider may accept direct payment for lawful health care services and shall not be required by law or rule to pay penalties or fines for accepting

direct payment from a person or employer for lawful health care services.

3. Subject to reasonable and necessary rules that do not substantially limit a person's options, the purchase or sale of health insurance in private health care systems shall not be prohibited by law or rule.

4. This section does not: (1) Affect which health care services a health care provider or hospital is required to perform or provide;

(2) Affect which health care services are permitted by law; (3) Prohibit care provided under workers' compensation as provided under state law;

(4) Affect laws or regulations in effect as of January 1, 2010; (5) Affect the terms or conditions of any health care system to the extent that those terms and conditions do not have the effect of punishing a person or employer for paying directly for lawful health care services or a health care provider or hospital for accepting direct

payment from a person or employer for lawful health care services. 5. As used in this section, the following terms

shall mean: (1) "Compel", any penalties or fines;

(2) "Direct payment or pay directly", payment for lawful health care services without a public or private third party, not including an employer, paying for any portion of the service:

(3) "Health care system", any public or private entity whose function or purpose is the management of, processing of, enrollment of individuals for or payment for, in full or in part, health care services or health care data or health care information for its participants; (4) "Lawful health care services", any healthrelated service or treatment to the extent that the service or treatment is permitted or not prohibited by law or regulation that may be provided by persons or businesses otherwise permitted to offer such services; and

(5) "Penalties or fines", any civil or criminal penalty or fine, tax, salary or wage withholding or surcharge or any named fee with a similar effect established by law or rule by a government established, created or controlled agency that is used to punish or discourage the exercise of rights protected under this section. 375.1175. 1. The director may petition the court for an order directing him to liquidate a domestic insurer or an alien insurer domiciled in this state

on the basis: (1) Of any ground for an order of rehabilitation as specified in section 375.1165, whether or not there has been a prior order directing the rehabilitation of the insurer;

(2) That the insurer is insolvent;

(3) That the insurer is in such condition that the further transaction of business would be hazardous, financially or otherwise, to its policyholders, its creditors or the public;

(4) That the insurer is found to be in such condition after examination that it could not meet the requirements for incorporation and authorization specified in the law under which it was incorporated or is doing business; or

(5) That the insurer has ceased to transact the business of insurance for a period of one year. 2. Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, a domestic insurer organized as a stock insurance company may voluntarily dissolve and liquidate as a corporation under sections 351.462 to 351.482, provided that:

(1) The director, in his or her sole discretion, approves the articles of dissolution prior to filing such articles with the secretary of state. In determining whether to approve or disapprove the articles of dissolution, the director shall consider, among other factors, whether: (a) The insurer's annual financial statements

filed with the director show no written insurance premiums for five years; and (b) The insurer has demonstrated that all policyholder claims have been satisfied or have been transferred to another insurer in a transaction approved by the director; and (c) An examination of the insurer pursuant to

within the last five years; and (2) The domestic insurer files with the secretary of state a copy of the director's approval, certified by the director, along with articles of dissolution as provided in section 351.462 or

Section B. This act is hereby submitted to the qualified voters of this state for approval or rejection at an election which is hereby ordered and which shall be held and conducted on Tuesday next following the first Monday in August, 2010, pursuant to the laws and constitutional provisions of this state for the submission of referendum measures by the general assembly, and this act shall become effective when approved by a majority of the votes cast thereon at such election

and not otherwise. Section C. Pursuant to chapter 116, RSMo, and other applicable constitutional provisions and laws of this state allowing the general assembly to adopt ballot language for the submission of this act to the voters of this state, the official ballot title of this act shall be as follows:



The offensive MVP was Toby Prussman from South Holt and the defensive MVP was Andy Luke of Stanberry.




