

## Rumble by the Refuge hits the newsstands Mound City event featured in Pro Pulling Magazine

The 5th annual Rumble by the Refuge in deluge on the first day of the two-day Mound City was a big success again this year, despite the interference by Mother Nature on the first night. Recently, the local truck and tractor pull was featured in a popular pulling magazine, boosting the event's stature even higher.

The August/September 2015 issue of *Pro Pulling Magazine* recapped the Lucas Oil Pro Pulling League event that was held on Saturday, June 27, with several color pictures of the event gracing the pages. The magazine gives the Rumble by the Refuge the honored distinction of being called a destination event, meaning "no matter how far you travel to the pull it is fully worth your while."

The article noted the significant rains in the weeks prior to the pull and the

event, Friday, June 26. Credit was given to the Mound City Rural Fire Department and event promoters Chris Waegele and Mitchell Corbin for *"leaping into action"* to coordinate unprecedented activity on Saturday morning, June 27, to ensure the show would go on as planned. Additional gravel was hauled in to firm up the pit area and one of the best tracks in the history of the Rumble by the Refuge rose out of the muddy mess from Friday night. Approximately 5,000 fans turned out for the Champions Tour at Saturday night's pull, with "growth on top of last year's successes."

An annual event of the Rumble by the Refuge is the presentation of a firearm to class winners., courtesy of the local gun shop, Open Season. This giveaway is named the Claude Corbin/Gordon Lemar Memorial Farmers Challenge. Four Henry 22 rifles were awarded to pullers in Protect the Harvest Pro Stock, Speedco Pro Mod FWD Trucks, iON Camera Unlimited Super Stocks and the 4.1 Limited Pro Stock class.

The article noted, "As Waegele, Corbin and company seek to improve their event each year .... the goal is to turn their regional phenomenon into a nationally recognized player in high quality pulling action"

Pro Pulling's article concluded with the compliment that "Rumble by the Refuge has all the tools: great promotion, great location and great pulling action. Make plans to attend the (2016) event now!"

Director Luebbering also noted the General Revenue Fund borrowed \$200 million from the Budget Reserve Fund for cash flow purposes. The funds will be repaid before the Constitutional deadline of May 15, 2016.

From the Mound City News archives

## 50 Years Ago - 1965

• Music instructor Dave Holland announced that the senior band would start rehearsals August 16th at 9:30 a.m., and would practice two hours each morning thereafter, until school started. All band members, except the varsity football players who were in the band, were expected to attend. The majorettes were to bring their instruments as well as batons.

• Some 430 aces of land, which had been on Holt County's tax books for many years, were removed. The reason, of course, was understandable: State of Missouri acquisition for Interstate Highway No. 29 construction. The land was then not taxable, and it was basically quite a loss for most of the right-of-way area affected from the Nodaway River on Highway 59 to the old Field's Fruit Stand site, situated on the same highway between Oregon and Mound City. The land was assessed in the higher bracket of \$60 per acre.

• Mound City football coach Larry Brandt announced that the first football practice session would be held at 7:30 Monday night of the following week.

## 25 Years Ago - 1990

• Results of the Primary Election were: Democratic ticket winner for Presiding Commissioner was John Killin over Bob Doebbeling, with Killin to face Ray Biermann in the General Election; Bill Richards would be the new Associate Circuit Judge, leading his primary opponent Robert Shepherd, with no opponent in the upcoming General Election; Wayne Hall was victorious over Kenneth Weis for First District Board of Commissioner and would oppose Glenn E. Meyer; Jim Luce, running for the Republican Clerk nomination, had a victory over Alita Meyer; Nancy Elliott held off Patsy Smith and Richard Buntz for the Collector race; and Anna Lou Doebbeling won the Treasurer race over Susan Noland and Sharon Greiner.

# Holt County Commissioners decline formation of NID; FEMA projects nearing completion

at the Holt County Courthouse in Oregon, MO. Presiding Commissioner Mark Sitherwood, First District Commissioner Bill Gordon and Second District Commissioner David Carroll were in attendance.

R.T. Turner of Kansas City Power and Light (KCP&L) provided a bond of \$50,000 for Holt County Road and Bridge to ensure that roadway damage that might occur associated with the construction of a transmission line across the northern part of Holt County will be repaired by the contractor and not at the expense of Holt County.

Southern Holt Recreational System District board members Elizabeth Dudeck, Landi Quinlin, Rachel Plummer, Pool Manager Mishael Barton; and community members Bob Ottman, Don Scheib, Billie Banks, Rich Mendenhall and Phyllis Dannar joined the commission to discuss formation of a Neighborhood Improvement District (NID) to build a new pool in Oregon. Board members provided cost estimates and plans for cash donations and in-kind work. Board members believed the project could be completed for an estimated \$800,000.00, which is less than the bond approval of \$1,200,000.00. Commissioners agreed to pursue three areas of questions with Edward Jones Municipal Bondsman Brian Coyman, who is acting in an advisory capacity for the county, including mechanism for special assessment of benefit to generate tax revenue; design and build concept bidding legality; and the impact of a lawsuit on the process, should the commissioners decide to proceed with the project. Commissioner Gordon agreed to report to the board the information.

Phyllis Dannar and Billie Banks, representing Oregon Merchants Around the Square, requested permission to hold a community music and entertainment event on the courthouse square on second Saturdays, beginning with Saturday, August 8, 2015. Commissioners agreed to have the electricity on at the stage and the courthouse open for restroom use during the evening events.

Brenda Nelson, R.N., Health Department Administrator, met with the commissioners to discuss ongoing Ebola preparations and two recent semi-truck wrecks involving food items. She anticipates the Environmental Services contract payment will be larger due to additional costs associated with those wrecks. Nelson plans to bill insurance for those costs

Sheriff Scott Wedlock reported that the voice recorder for 911 is not working properly. He has contacted Midwest Data, Rock Port, MO, to search for a replacement as part of the county's ongoing Information Technology (IT) services. He also reported that the small radio building needs painting.

Road and Bridge Supervisor Daryl Biermann met with the commission to review completed Federal Emergency Management Agency

The Holt County Commission met Monday, July 13, 2015, at 9 a.m. (FEMA) projects including Holt Road 120, Keystone Road, Holt Road 150 and a bridge at Holt Road 140 and Ironwood Road. Other general work on Omaha Road and Lincoln Road had also been completed.

> Commissioners took up review of the county's Hazard Mitigation program, which is set for a renewal process with the Northwest Regional Council of Governments. A series of meetings will be held to get community input on the plan. The county's match cost for the project is \$6,137.19, of which all or most will be credited as in-kind match.

> Brenda Nelson, R.N., Health Department Administrator, met with the commission to discuss having a safety activity during the Holt County Autumn Festival. She will ask Missouri State Highway Patrol to partner with her for the event.

> Carla Markt, Oregon, approached the commission to discuss an upcoming United States Corps of Engineers boat tour of the Missouri River on Tuesday, August 18.

> French Harris, Oregon, met with the commission to request payment or clarification of mowing costs for the Maitland Mausoleum. County records indicate a yearly interest payment has been sent to the Maitland Cemetery for disbursement associated with mowing costs.

> Commissioners took up extending construction workdays for Mike Long Construction and Hufford Dirt Works due to ongoing rain. Commissioner Carroll agreed to notify both contractors that an additional 30 working days have been granted to complete the various FEMA projects under their associated bid contracts.

> Being no further business, the commission adjourned until Monday, July 27, 2015.

All parties agreed that as damage occurs, Mr. Buckner will ensure that the roadway is repaired within seven days and that he will remain in contact with Commissioner Carroll regarding any complaints.

Commissioner Carroll provided a list of FEMA projects recently completed including activity on Ironwood Road, Holt Road 153, a washout on Keystone Road, and road rock application on Indian and Neptune roads.

Junior and Janice Radley appeared before the commission as part of the Board of Equalization (BOE). Assessor LaDonna Jones also joined the meeting. Mr. Radley questioned the valuation of a grade 6 farmland value that appears to be charged \$150 per acre in Nodaway County and \$158 per acre in Holt County. Commissioners contacted Nodaway County Assessor Rex Wallace to inquire about the discrepancy. Mr. Wallace agreed that the Nodaway County value should be \$158 per acre and match the Holt County value. Richard White, New Point, approached the commission to discuss the formation of a Neighborhood Improvement District (NID) for a pool project in Oregon.

Road and Bridge Supervisor Daryl Biermann joined the commission by phone to discuss ongoing roadway projects and FEMA projects.

Commissioners reviewed damage to a bridge on Keystone Road and Holt Road 110, where a guardrail was damaged in a vehicle accident. Commissioners agreed to contact the driver's insurance agent for the claim.

Members of the Southern Holt Recreation System District board and interested parties, Mishael Barton, Kristen Mendenhall, Daysha Weller, Landi Quinlin, Billie Banks and Rachel Plummer, met with the commission to request a final answer from the commission regarding the establishment of the NID. Board members requested a final decision by Friday, August 7, 2015. Commissioners agreed to continue their research and render a decision by that date.

Being no further business, the commission adjourned until Friday, August 7, 2015.

The Holt County Commission met Friday, August 7, 2015, at 9 a.m. at the courthouse in Oregon. Presiding Commissioner Mark Sitherwood, First District Commissioner Bill Gordon and Second District Commissioner David Carroll were in attendance.

Commissioner Carroll reported on FEMA project work completed including: a tube replaced on Holt Road 110; a washout repaired on Holt Road 110; and gravel placed on Ember Road and Holt Road 147. Regular maintenance projects completed include a tube replacement at the intersection of Holt Road 110 and Juniper Road.

Commissioners took up the need to contract trash services at the Mound City Road and Bridge Barn. Stuart Disposal is no longer providing that service. Commissioner Carroll agreed to contact local providers for pricing and information.

Commissioners took up review of a summary from Brian Coyman, Edward Jones, St. Louis, related to the establishment of a Neighborhood Improvement District (NID). Mr. Coyman is acting in an advisory capacity and not as a bondsman for the county.

Commissioners took a conference call with Jackie Spainhower, Director of Northwest Regional Council of Governments, to discuss administration of a NID. Spainhower discussed the formation of a Community Improvement District (CID) as an alternative for the Southern Holt Public Recreation System District to consider that would allow the district to be separate from the county commission in taxing and administering a project.

Commissioners took a conference call with attorney Ivan Schraeder, Lowenbaum Partnership, St. Louis, to discuss NID and CID proposals and the risk to the county finances associated with each type of taxing district. Mr. Schraeder recommends a financial analysis and a comparative review of NID and CID to determine the economic viability of the project, bond payments and the overall risk to the county.

After due consideration and determining the project is not advisable, Commissioner Carroll made a motion not to go forward with the formation of a Neighborhood Improvement District (NID) for the pool project. The motion was seconded and passed.

Being no further business, the commission adjourned until Monday, August 10, 2015.



## **Unplanted soybean seed**

The extended rain events years ago were many times have prevented many growers from planting all planned soybean acreage. In some cases the seed could be returned, but some could not. One option is to use the leftover seed as a cover crop. Seed treated with a fungicide cannot be sold as grain; therefore, using the seed as a cover crop is a way to still be able to use the seed.

Some ask the question if the seed can be kept and used next year. Years ago, farmers saved seed they harvested in the fall and planted it in the spring. The issue with the current situation is seed from this spring was held during the heat of the summer compared to seed from fall harvest. Also, planting rates

throughout the growing season twice those of today. Seed prices are high and today's growers cut seeding rates to the minimum to maintain high yields. The University of Missouri Extension would recommend not planting old seed because, if the stand is affected, you have damaged the yield potential for that year's crop.

If a farmer decides to keep seed from this spring to next year, he should not only conduct a germination test but also an accelerated aging test to identify the loss of vigor. The germination test may show good germination but the seed under stressful conditions may not survive. The accelerated aging test is used to identify if seed has problems under stressful conditions or an estimation of the vigor of the seed. The Missouri Crop Improvement Association can conduct these tests.



## **Stockpile fescue** to supplement forage needs

Thursday, August 6, at the Hundley-Whaley Focus on Forages meeting, it was discussed that several growers have not been able to harvest forage because of the wet weather. One option to address the availability of forage for the winter would be to apply 30 to 50 pounds of nitrogen on tall fescue to stimulate fall growth and use this as feed in winter.

Research conducted at the University of Missouri (MU) indicates that if the nitrogen is not used this fall by the fescue, it will still be available for use in spring. This is a great opportunity to increase forage and use cattle to harvest the grass.
