MOUND CITY R-2

Doug Freemyer



"I always thought Mound City had an excellent school district," Doug Freemyer said.

The 17-year classroom veteran, who will be teaching world history, American government and criminal justice, among other subjects, to high school students, is also bringing his daughter to the aforementioned excellent school district.

"Kameron...likes school quite a bit," he said. "She's really into basketball, and now she's trying out volleyball."

Kameron, Freemyer added, will also be one of his new freshman students — and not for the first time.

"I taught her at North Nodaway [in middle school]," he said. "It was great. She's a good student; she works hard."

On Thursday, Aug. 7, Pamela Joy and her daughter chatted in a Mound City R-2 classroom before heading to St. Joseph, Mo., together. Both mother and daughter are teachers, and as it turns out, both will be teaching special education this year, Joy at Mound City R-2, her daughter in Troy, Kan.

"I'm really excited," Joy said.

Joy, who has worked in Hiawatha, Kan., and Falls City, Neb., is no stranger to the classroom. She's seen students grow and graduate over the years, but one stands out: her first special education student, who finished high school in Hiawatha not too long ago.

"It's an accomplishment," she said.

Lee McFadden

For Lee McFadden, new middle school math teacher, numbers run in the family.

"My mom is a math teacher," he said.

The Missouri Western graduate prefers algebra, though he'll be teaching a "little bit of everything" in his classroom — and it's the classroom to which McFadden is counting down.

"I'm looking forward to reaching out to my students, interacting with them, getting to know them," he said.

Ashley Myers' life, it seems, will revolve around children for the next year.

Myers, who is moving to Craig R-3 from South Holt R-1 ("Every now and then you need to change it up for something new," she said), will be teaching kindergarten.

She also welcomed a daughter, Ainslee, in March.

When asked about caring for an infant and a class of kindergartners, Myers answered simply: "I enjoy spending time around kids."

Jennifer Showalter, a graduate of Emporia State University, has seen a world beyond the Midwest; she spent last year teaching in Kazakhstan.

"I taught intensive English to fourth- and sixth-[grade]...boys and girls," she said.

While the new second-grade teacher taught the children of wealthy oil company employees, she isn't anticipating her return to the American classroom to be too difficult.

"Kids are kids everywhere," Showalter said.

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Runnels closes Pantry of Plenty

Helen Runnels of Mound City, Mo., has given a decade to the Pantry of Plenty, a local food bank.

"We opened up at the Baptist Church in August 2004," Runnels said, recalling the start of the Pantry.

"It was brought up at church. We voted on it, and I was asked to run it. [I said,] 'I'll do it for awhile.'"

What she did, for awhile, was fill fridges and freezers, deliver food on occasion to those without cars, and sometimes even cover the Pantry expenses herself.

"The Panty of Plenty started because Helen saw a need," Becky Poe, director of Community Services Inc., said. "Helen has struggled paying out of her own pocket, [but] it's been a great service to people in need."

Through the Pantry of Plenty, Runnels distributed food to an average of 30 families per month and played a crucial role in recipients' survival.

"We've had elderly people come in," Runnels said. "They've had to choose between paying for food and paying for medication."

It's those little moments, those times when Runnels has truly been able to help others, that stand out, she said. Once, at Christmas, Runnels witnessed a little girl fall in love with a stuffed bear; her mother, however, said no to the teddy bear purchase. That year, Runnels picked the family for Christmas — and she gave the girl the bear (plus a box of food).

"[The Pantry of Plenty] was very rewarding," Runnels said. "It's been bittersweet to tell people I was closing."

Runnels explained that she agreed to run the Pantry for 10 years, and this year is her son, Timothy's, last in high school; she wants to be able to spend more time with him.

"I'm going to miss everybody."

The Pantry of Plenty, however, will remain a fixture in Holt County, though it is temporarily closed. Pastor Brian Lemcke of the Mound City Holy Trinity Lutheran Church is planning to take over, and Runnels has agreed to help with the transition and turn over her equipment and leftover food. The Pantry will also continue to receive food from Second Harvest and, through the organization, from Walmart in Maryville, Mo., as well.

"[It'll be] mid-September before we get it up and running," Lemcke explained, adding that he is still looking for a location for the Pantry.

Much like Runnels and the Baptist Church 10 years ago, Lemcke presented the idea of taking over the Pantry of Plenty to his congregation.

"They thought it was a great idea to stay open."

Lemcke also plans to form a committee of people in the area to help run the food bank.

"We're looking for volunteers from the community," he said.

In some ways, the Pantry of Plenty has circled around, Lemcke added.

"It was here in the basement at one time," he said.

Graham Street Fair to celebrate city's quartoseptcentennial

The city of Graham, Mo., is celebrating its 175th anniversary, and the Graham Street Fair, scheduled for Thursday, Aug. 21, through Saturday, Aug. 23, is set to be an affair worthy of a quartoseptcentennial.

According to fair organizers and Grand Marshal Richard T. Warner, who is sharing the position with Grand Marshal Janet Rosenbohm, the highlight of the weekend of events is the history pageant.

"The main purpose for a history pageant is to proudly remember our ancestors," the Graham Street Fair book explains. "Something inspired them to come, settle and start a community. Graham has become an honored place among the small towns of America."

Warner added that the last pageant took place at the 150th celebration (1989), and for this year, organizers have "added 25 years of information to bring it up to 175 of what Graham...is now."

The history pageant will take place at 9 p.m. on Saturday, Aug. 23, at Graham City Park; should it rain, the pageant will move to the Nodaway-Holt gym.

Other events include:

Thursday, Aug. 21

6 p.m.: Junior Miss pageant at the Graham Community Building. The "princess" in each age division (5 to 6, 7 to 8, 9 to 10, and 11 to 12 years old) receives \$5, a crown, sash and certificate and

rides in the Graham Street Fair parade on Saturday; first runner-up receives \$3, a sash and certificate, and second runner-up is awarded \$2, a sash and certificate. All other participants will take home \$1, a ribbon and a certificate.

6 p.m.: Lawn mower drag race on the west edge of Graham. Sponsored by County Line Ag, Poor Boys Kwik Stop and the Funnel Cake Crew, the race will feature stock and stock-altered classes; the top three winners in each class will receive money and trophies.

7:45 p.m. to 8:30 p.m.: B.J. Talley Magic Show at Graham City Park. Talley "promises a clean, fun and very entertaining show for all ages."

8:30 p.m.: FEWA wrestling at Graham City Park.

Friday, Aug. 22

2 p.m. to 4 p.m.: Registration and judging for the needlework/craft, agriculture/produce, flower, canned good and 4-H shows at the fire station. Following the judging, the displays will be open to the public.

4:30 p.m.: Pedal Pull in front of the Smokehouse. Age groups include 4 to 5, 6 to 7, 8 to 9, and 10 to 11-year-old children, and all participants will use the same tractor.

5:30 p.m. to 12:30 a.m.: The beer garden behind the fire station will be open.

Holt County declared disaster area

Nebraska counties and Holt and Atchison counties in Missouri are now agricultural disaster areas, the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) reported.

The Missouri counties were categorized as contiguous disaster areas due to damages and losses caused by severe storms, tornadoes, straight-line winds and flooding that occurred Sunday, June 1, through Wednesday, June 4, 2014.

All of the counties mentioned above were designated disaster areas on Monday, July 28, 2014, making all qualified farm operators eligible for low interest emergency (EM) loans from Farm Service Agency (FSA), provided eligibility requirements are met. Farmers in eligible counties have eight months from the date of the declaration to apply for loans to help cover part of their actual losses. FSA will consider each loan application on its own merits, taking into account the extent of losses, security available and repayment ability.

Loans for physical losses must be used to replace or repair damage to buildings, fences

or to compensate the farmer for losses of basic livestock, stored crops or supplies on hand and equipment that was lost due to the disaster. Loans for production losses may also be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer or livestock or to make payments on real estate or chattel debts. Generally, loans for production losses cannot be approved until crops have completed their production cycle or have been harvested.

In order to qualify, a farmer must have suffered a 30-percent loss in production or an actual physical loss that was essential to the successful operation of the farm.

USDA has also made a variety of other programs available to assist farmers in recovering from the disaster, including the Emergency Conservation Program (ECP), Federal Crop Insurance, and the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program.

The interest rate on select loans can be as low as 1.5 percent with up to 40 years to repay.

“This is an extraordinary opportunity for more farmers and ranchers to get low-interest loans to start their first farm or expand an existing family farm,” said Cadle. “There are no backlogs or waiting for funding. If you’ve dreamed about starting a farm, or if you’re looking to strengthen your farm, we want to help.”

Two named Missouri Century Farm recipients

Missouri Century Farm, a joint program with Missouri Farm Bureau and University of Missouri (MU) Extension, recently recognized two local, historical family farms at the annual Holt County Farm Bureau meeting at The Klub in Mound City, Mo., on Thursday, Aug. 7.

Jo Ann Brown's farm, located 3.5 miles west of Forest City, Mo., was purchased in 1898, and approximately 30 of Brown's children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren were present when the Maryville, Mo., resident received her Missouri Century Farm award.

The Steinmeyer family originally purchased their Bigelow, Mo., farm in 1907; the current owners are Marilyn Erganian, Patricia Raines, Mildred Mosiman, Carol Jean Laurent, Jen-

nifer Hoecker, John D. Kost, Andrew Kost and Wilma and Howard Sykes.

The Missouri Century Farm program recognizes families that have 40 acres or more of land that have been passed down generations for more than 100 years. The program first began in 1976 when James B. Boillot, director of the Missouri Department of Agriculture, and Elmer R. Kiehl, dean of the MU College of Agriculture, co-chaired the Missouri Committee for Agriculture. At the time, the committee's purpose was to organize the American Revolution bicentennial celebration, and Missouri Century Farm was created as one of the projects. The Century Farm program has continued since, with more than 100 farms recognized each year.

RECENT SOCIETY QUERIES INCLUDE:

- The society is looking for the area of Rousseau Island, sometimes called Cuba Island, that was located below Forbes in 1894. According to a Holt County Sentinel item in *Gone Home* I, the population at that time were the families of: W.B. Day, 7; Gibson, 3; Silas Carter, 4; Parker, 7; Dave Roderick, 2; Hargus, 4; D. Applegate, 3; Tom McAfee, 7. The island doesn't appear on the 1877 or 1898 Holt County Atlases.

- Any descendants of James R. Watson in Holt County: A Spanish-American War veteran of the 4th Missouri Infantry Regt., Watson died in the Flagstaff, Ariz., area in January 1901 from injuries sustained in a train accident. He served in the 4th Missouri Infantry from June 18, 1898 (date of enrollment was in Mound City, Mo.), until Feb. 19, 1899, the date of the regiment's muster-out. His age at death was 27; he was probably born around 1874. He may have relatives in the Mound City or Oregon areas. Efforts are being made to place a military marker on his grave in Flagstaff, and a next-of-kin is needed to do so.

This Week's History

From the *Mound City News* archives

50 Years Ago - 1964

- Tennis players were taking advantage of the lights on the court at the Mound City athletic field, but probably not all were aware that this feature was available. The prior year the Chamber of Commerce allotted funds to light the court. It necessitated a \$300 expenditure. At that time a coin meter was installed, and tennis players could have 30 minutes of lighting for just 25¢.

- The new ASCS headquarters (514 State) for Holt County would be available for occupancy about Oct. 1. Nauman Construction Co. had the general contract for the new 60-by-60-foot fireproof structure. Parking was to be provided at the back of the building for farmers, with employees having a private parking area on a lot situated on a higher level to the north and east. The new building was to be centrally air conditioned and would have hot-water heating. The entire building was wired for FM radio, and a public address system was also being made a part of the detailed inside wiring. The Holt County ASCS headquarters would be the only one in the state of Missouri which would have its own two-way radio system.

25 Years Ago - 1989

- Bob Smith resigned as Mound City police chief. With Smith's departure, the answering service, handled by his wife, Evelyn Smith, would also be left vacant. The council voted to contract with Alice Bruntmyer for the service.

- Residents of the area had been seeing an unusual sight in the early morning skies. Bob Wilits, Phoenix, Ariz., had been visiting in the area and brought along his hot air balloon. When conditions permitted, he had been making flights.

- The Rev. Walter Bean and his family moved to Mound City, where he would begin his new duties as pastor of the Nazarene Church.

- The National Future Homemakers of America convention was held in Anaheim, Calif. Representing the Holt County R-2 FHA chapter were Candy Morris and Juli Miller and their advisor, Mrs. Ruth Johnson.

- Mound City voters approved a 30-cent levy for street lighting. The measure would allow the city to provide street lighting for another four years, when it would again be on the ballot.

10 Years Ago - 2004

- Ruth Rother, Mound City, gave a program on quilt patterns known as "underground quilts," which some believe were a hidden yet open way to help slaves seeking their way to freedom. The program was given at the Holt County Historical Society meeting at the headquarters in the Methodist Church in Fortescue.

- The Craig Car Show drew 50 entries and two display vehicles. Dick and Annette Thomas were the main organizers of the third annual show.

- The 17th Annual Freedom Fest was being planned in Skidmore. It would feature an array of free entertainment, speakers, food and special activities.

- Three Mound City girls played on Trojanette ball teams: Jamie Webster, Trojanette 16 and Under, which had a season record of 15-14; Britany Johnson, Trojanette Red 16 and Under, which had a record of 19-19; and Jenny Jackson, Trojanette Red 12 and Under, which had a record of 37-22.

The people have spoken: Statewide unofficial primary election results

Holt County’s voting trends were generally reflective of the statewide results, but one issue — Amendment 1, Missouri’s “Right to Farm” bill — passed by such a narrow margin on the state level that a recount could be in the future.

According to Missouri Secretary of State Jason Kander, 50.127 percent of voters supported the bill, and 49.873 percent did not; with such a slim difference between “yes” and “no” votes, the losing side could contest the results after the election is certified later this month. In Holt County, however, the decision was clear: Amendment 1 passed with 939 votes for, 343 against.

As for the other items up for vote, Amendment 7, which would have created a sales tax to fund Missouri Department of Transportation projects, did not pass statewide (40.815 percent voted yes, 59.185 percent voted no) or in Holt County.

Amendment 5, reiterating Missourians’ right to bear arms, passed easily on the county and state level, as did Amendment 9, which protects Missourians’ electronic and digital communications from unreasonable searches and seizures.

Finally, Amendment 8, which would have created a veterans’ lottery, with funds directed toward veterans, did not pass in Holt County. At the state level, 55.016 percent voted against it.

Holt County voters also followed statewide trends with the Sixth District U.S. Representative candidates. W.A. (Bill) Hedge, who sought the Democratic nomination, won in Holt County with 56 votes and at the state level with 18,106 votes, or 51.661 percent. Likewise, his opponent, Republican incumbent Sam Graves, garnered 76.616 percent of the votes on the state level; in Holt County, he received 832 votes.

How to prevent canning lids from buckling

“In recent years, canning lids have changed several times, and so the recommendations for using them, and sealing jars successfully, have changed as well. Perhaps the most common concern is buckling lids, but this problem can be prevented.
Lids buckle, or as some would describe it, ‘crinkle’ when the lids are put on too tightly. The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) recommends using two-piece lids. One piece is what is commonly referred to as a flat. It is a relatively flat circle of metal with an inner liner and a ring of sealing compound that resembles rubber. The other piece is a metal ring that is screwed down over the flat and jar to secure the flat to the jar during the canning process. USDA guidelines say to fill the jar according to the procedure for the particular food that is being canned, wipe the rim of the jar with a clean paper towel to remove any liquid or particles that may be present and place the flat on the rim of the jar. Then tighten the ring. Although one might want to tighten the lid as tightly as it will go, manufacturers recommend finger-tip tight. This means that once the ring stops turning

freely, it is tight enough. When the screw band is tightened too much, the result is that the lid will buckle. This often results in the canned food not sealing as is needed to be safely stored on a shelf.
Also, lids sold these days should be warmed but not boiled. The sealing compound is warmed in steaming hot (NOT boiling) water. Softened, it is then ready to conform to the shape of the lip of the jar. Boiling water, on the other hand, causes that compound to melt so that it has already begun to change shape before being placed on the jar. This also often leads to the jar not sealing.
When canning, follow USDA and manufacturers’ recommendations to increase the likelihood of all the jars sealing and no food going to waste because it opens during storage.

Growers encouraged to submit Goss' wilt and blight corn samples

Growers who suspect Goss' wilt and blight in their fields are encouraged to submit a sample through the local University of Missouri (MU) Extension office to the MU Plant Diagnostic lab. The Extension service goal is to determine the extent of the disease across northwest Missouri counties.

Lookalike symptoms include Stewart's wilt, another bacterial disease, as well as drought, nutrient deficiencies and chemical injury.

The fee for lab testing is \$15, which accounts for the checking for symptoms and microscopically examining for bacterial streaming.

Samples may be submitted directly to the lab or to the local Extension office. Those submitting should make sure to read the sampling and packaging directions at <http://plantclinic.missouri.edu>.

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Diet and exercise make great bedfellows for men and women looking to live a healthier lifestyle. A combination of a healthy diet and regular exercise makes it easier for everyone to maintain a healthy weight while lowering the risk of various ailments, including heart disease and diabetes.

A heightened awareness of what makes for a healthy and unhealthy diet coupled with the increased availability of healthy foods has helped many people smoothly transition to a healthier diet. Finding time to exercise during the day, however, can still be a struggle. Commitments to work and family make it difficult to squeeze in regular workouts, and the call of the couch is often more appealing than a trip to the gym at the end of a long day juggling both personal and professional obligations. - Figure out free time.** Finding free time is perhaps the biggest hurdle adults must clear when attempting to exercise more. Track the daily schedule for a week or two, making note of down times during the day when it might be possible to squeeze in 30 to 60 minutes of exercise. Consider joining a gym near the office and turning lunch hours into workouts. If mornings are not dominated by getting the kids ready for school, then wake up a half hour earlier each

morning to squeeze in some time on the treadmill. There is likely to be some down time in a daily schedule, and identifying such time is the first step toward making better use of it.

- **Make it a team effort.** Daily exercise is not just good for adults; it's great for kids, too. Parents looking to fit more physical activity into their daily routines should consider involving their children, many of whom are dealing with a fitness crisis of their own. According to a 2014 report in the *Journal of the American Medical Association*, childhood obesity has more than doubled in children and quadrupled in adolescents over the last three decades, putting youngsters at increased risk for cardiovascular disease, prediabetes, bone and joint problems, and sleep apnea. Parents can make daily exercise a family affair, which increases the time they spend with their children while ensuring their kids stay fit as well. Men and women without families also can make daily exercise a team effort by working out with a friend or significant other. The buddy system often proves motivational, encouraging men and women to exercise even on those days when the couch is calling.
- **Make exercise more interesting.** Many work-

out routines fall by the wayside because they simply do not engage men and women enough. An hour on the treadmill can seem like an eternity to those who could benefit by choosing workout routines that are less monotonous. Zumba, for example, is a combination of dance and aerobic exercise that is growing in popularity. In lieu of spending an hour on the treadmill or elliptical machine, Zumba participants get an equally, if not exceedingly challenging cardiovascular workout that many find more fun than traditional aerobic exercise, thanks to its incorporation of dance. For those without such happy feet, bring a tablet along to the gym and catch up on favorite television shows or read a good book during cardiovascular routines. The more interesting the workout, the more likely a person is to find time for that routine every day.

- **Choose an accessible routine.** When planning a workout, make it as accessible as possible. While sports like kayaking and mountain biking and racing make for great exercise, such activities are not readily accessible to many working professionals with busy schedules. Join a gym that's only a short drive from home, or purchase some gym equipment to use at home.

The call of the couch can be difficult to ignore, but the side effects of a sedentary lifestyle can be grave; everyone should work to find ways to include exercise in their daily routines.

Toxins are deadly to horses



Striped blister beetles are no strangers to the Show-Me State, and problems arise when harvesting equipment and methods are changed. This summer, according to University of Missouri (MU) Extension Entomologist Wayne Bailey, the beetles, which can be toxic to horses, are out in force in alfalfa fields.

The striped blister beetle produces a compound called “cantharidin” that remains toxic in alfalfa hay for at least four to five years after harvesting. Adult beetles generally do not appear in the first cutting of alfalfa, and risk exists mostly in second and third cuttings.

To go into further detail, beetles appear in alfalfa, soybean and weed patches in July and August after emerging from the soil. They range in length from 1/2 to 1 inch and are easily recognized by their characteristic stripes, shape and prominent "neck" area.

At an immature stage, striped blister beetles feed on grasshopper egg pods in the soil, which can cause population growth after years of heavy grasshopper numbers.

“There will be high numbers of striped blister beetles after a year of high grasshopper numbers,” Bailey said.

The beetles also move quickly in packs to protect themselves and to mate.

“They drop to the ground as a protective behavior,” Bailey said, adding that the beetles scurry when perceiving a threat.

Striped blister beetles move quickly between fields of soybean and alfalfa, so farmers should scout alfalfa frequently to determine pest numbers. Damage to alfalfa may be minimal, but risk to horses increases when large numbers of beetles are found in small areas of a field.

Risks to humans and animals

The striped blister beetles earn their name because they can cause blisters on the skin of humans and in the mouths of animals.

Additionally, the oily, caustic cantharidin in striped blister beetles can cause animals to become sick or die. According to Bailey, studies from university researchers indicate that it takes between 25 and 225 striped blister beetles consumed in a 24-hour period to be lethal, depending on the size

Fruits and vegetables are the building blocks of a healthy diet, but many people do not eat the recommended number of servings of produce. That trend is especially true among growing children, who can benefit greatly from the vitamins and nutrients fruits and vegetables provide.

According to the latest data from the NPD Group, a market research firm, Americans eat a little more than half a cup of fruit and a cup of vegetables per day, which is less than half of what the government recommends. Anyone who eats roughly 2,000 calories per day, however, should strive to consume between two to three cups of vegetables and two cups of fruit per day. Produce helps to fight disease because it contains healthy antioxi-

dants, fiber, minerals and vitamins. Eating four cups per day may seem difficult, but there are many ways to incorporate fruits and vegetables into everyday recipes.

- Substitute pureed fruit, like figs, pears and apples, for oil in recipes for cakes and cookies. Doing so will ensure the baked goods are moist but with a lot less fat.
- Add cauliflower or squash to boiled potatoes before mashing them to increase the nutritional punch and flavor of mashed potatoes.
- Blend fruits and vegetables to create smoothies for breakfast or lunch on the go.
- Mix stewed tomatoes in with a broth soup base to make a vegetable or chicken

soup even more nutritious.

- Opt for vegetables piled high atop a slice of pizza in lieu of meats or extra cheese.
- Divide the dinner plate into quadrants, filling half of the plate with vegetables, one quarter with meat and the remainder with a whole grain.
- Replace lettuce on a sandwich or burger with a fresh leaf of spinach. While dressing a sandwich, add a slice of tomato, too.
- Substitute fresh vegetables and fruit slices for chips when serving dips and salsas. Kale chips are growing in popularity.
- Give children a cup of sliced

grapes with their lunches as
a refreshing and healthy
snack.

- Use vegetables instead of pasta in traditional dishes. Layer eggplant slices to make a lasagna, or use a spiral slicer to slice zucchini or carrots when making homemade noodles.
- Make a vegetable roll-up, filling pizza dough with broccoli or spinach and shredded cheese.
- Use pureed vegetables to thicken cheese sauce for macaroni and cheese recipes.
- Shred vegetables and add them to beaten eggs for omelets or scrambles.

What’s biting in the garden?

No matter how long a gardener has had his or her hands in the dirt, running into a problem with a pest or two is almost guaranteed. Ragged, chewed leaves and holey stems are just two signs that may indicate that there is a pest problem. Of course, the best course of treatment is to determine the likely culprit and then work to eradicate it from the garden.

It is not always easy to tell specifically what type of pest a gardener is facing. While it might be possible to catch a glimpse of some pests, others may be harder to detect. The telltale signs lie in the damage the pest creates. To determine for certain who is invading the garden, use the following guide:

Culprit: Sign

- Aphids:** Sticky honeydew on leaf undersides
- Cabbageworms:** Chewed leaves on cabbage group plants
- Cutworms:** Vegetable plants cut off at the ground
- Grasshoppers:** Ragged feeding holes on leaf edges
- Mealybugs:** White, waxy blobs or yellow, deformed leaves
- Slugs and snails:** Slimy, holey leaves
- Spider mites:** Yellow leaves interspersed with cobwebs
- Spittlebugs:** White, frothy substance on plants
- Squash vine borer’s larvae:** Wilting plants with holey stems

These are just some of the common pests that may invade a garden. If the garden appears to be suffering from a pest prob-

lem, get a handle on it as soon as possible. A search online or a trip to the nursery or garden center should uncover products for helping eradicate whatever pests there may be.

To prevent future pest problems, work to keep a garden healthy. Water it regularly. Fertilize it as needed. Finally, inspect it often for signs of trouble and correct any problems that may arise. The healthier the garden, the more resistant it will be to pests of all types.

Almost all gardens come under the attack of pests at some point. Don’t be caught unaware. Pests can invade a garden quickly and multiply rapidly, making it even harder to eradicate them. Keep a close eye on a garden and stay ahead of the game.

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
