Community Hospital-Fairfax to open primary care clinic in Oregon

Community Hospital-Fairfax (MO) (CH-F) has announced its commitment to open a family medicine clinic in Oregon, MO, to serve southern Holt County.

CH-F has been exploring the prospect of opening a clinic in Oregon for several months. Meeting with civic groups and the city council and initiating a community survey were all part of the hospital’s effort to ensure that a clinic in southern Holt County would be a good fit for the hospital and community.

Richard Wilson, Oregon’s mayor, along with Steve Rogers and Tom Stoecklein, have worked closely with leadership from Community Hospital-Fairfax to bring primary care back to Oregon.

“We feel very strongly that southern Holt County has a need for access to a provider and are very excited to



have Community Hospital-Fairfax in our community,” commented Wilson.

“The community has been extremely gracious over the last few months. The warm reception certainly helped us to feel very confident about the success of this clinic and our partnership with the community moving forward,” indicated Roger Steinkruger, Community Hospital-Fairfax CEO.

The hospital intends to open the clinic in the city

owned medical office building at 101 S. Washington. The clinic will be staffed with a Family Nurse Practitioner that will work in partnership with Dustin Carpenter, M.D., who currently sees patients at Mound City Family Medicine.

The timeline for opening the clinic is still being finalized and will be publicized as soon as possible.

“We have a number of items that need checked off the list before we open. We are working enthusiastically on the list and can’t wait to open the doors,” explained Ann Schlueter, Business Development Executive.

Kenneth Hamilton is a new science teacher at South Holt, teaching primarily at the middle school level. Hamilton, originally from Braddyville, IA, lives in Maryville, MO, with his wife, Megan, who teaches kindergarten in Maryville. The Hamiltons have two children, Harper, 3, and Hinton, 1. Hamilton is a graduate of Northwest Missouri State University (NWMSU) in Maryville with a Bachelor’s of Science in Agronomy and Environmental Science, with a graduate certification for elementary education. Letter to the editor

The Holt County commissioners have made a final decision regarding the new pool project in Oregon. They have unanimously voted not to move forward with construction. The Southern Holt Joint Recreation System Commission, appointed by the county, the City of Oregon, and the City of Forest City, have been working with the commission since the community voted to pay for the pool assessment in April. The commissioners initially had a list of requests for the board including finding donations to lower the overall cost to the Neighborhood Improvement District, finding alternate companies that could bid the project to comply with state statutes, and finding an outside source to administer the funds and oversee the project. In July, the recreation board went back to the county commissioners with all that they had asked including reducing the overall cost by 30%.

At that meeting, the commissioners had additional concerns regarding the way the assessment would be collected and the bidding process. They were not able to give a yes or no answer at that time and postponed the decision until the Aug. 3 meeting. At that time, the recreation board again met with the county to get the final decision. The commissioners had not received all of the information from the outside source as of that meeting, and stated that they would know by Aug. 7. On Friday, August 7, the recreation board received a voice message stating that the commissioners would not be moving forward with the project.

The commissioners did recommend that the board try to move forward with a separate project that would not involve the county and would require a petition and new vote from the residents in Southern Holt County. The recreation board is looking into all possibilities. However, this will slow the process and upon the recommendation of the engineering firm which examined the pool three years ago, the pool will not open next summer.

Fatal accident on I-29 claims life

An accident on I-29 claimed the life of one man on Saturday, August 15, at 6:15 a.m. in Holt County. According to the Missouri State Highway Patrol, Terry R. Stanley, 56, of Omaha, NE, was southbound on I-29 at the 81.8 mile marker, three miles south of Mound City. The 1998 GMC Sierra he was driving veered off the road to the west and began sliding sideways. The vehicle overturned multiple times, coming to rest on its top facing west.

Mr. Stanley was pronounced dead at the scene by Holt County Coroner Susan Lentz. The body was taken by Meierhoffer Funeral Home in St. Joseph, MO. The totalled vehicle was towed by Double D Towing to its lot in Mound City.

The accident was investigated by Trooper J.W. Cotter, who was assisted by Sergeant M.P. Quilty and the Holt County Sheriff. Next of kin was notified.

Remembering

The other day at McDonald’s, one of the hotter summer days, I waited to go in as a young mother with two, one on each side of her while she was carrying a small one, was coming from her car. I held the door open for them and she stopped and thanked me for what she thought was a lost practice of holding doors open for women, and she said she knew I was from the last generation who would still do this. Even her two older ones thanked me. I knew she had been brought up that way too. Holding doors open for people and letting someone go ahead of you in a crowded line needs to happen. I always let anyone go ahead of me at the grocery store, etc. If I have a lot more items than the one behind me, they learn a lesson. The lady in front of me had more coupons to turn in that I didn’t even know existed. Oh well, things aren’t always what they seem, anyway, this young lady made me remember how it used to be.

Some of you might remember, back in the old days, even up in the 90s, when you moved into a new town or neighborhood and before you could get unloaded, someone would be there to welcome you and offer to help unload. I remember there was always someone who would say they just do that because they are nosy and want to find out everything about you. Maybe so, but there would have to be something wrong

with a person who wouldn’t appreciate help and an assortment of food, cakes, cookies, coffee, cold drinks and information about the community. We’ve lived where there was a “Welcome Wagon” (not a real one) that would stop by leaving a packet, usually sponsored by local businesses, that included information on schools, churches, civic organizations, lodges, types of stores, professional help, lawyers, doctors, hospitals and city offices. The last time Betty and I were visited by one of the “Welcome Wagons” was in 1998 when we moved to Georgetown, TX, in one of Del Webb’s Sun City communities. That was a unique place for as we were told the reason everyone got along as if they’d been friends forever was because everyone who lived there was there because they wanted to be and not because of other circumstances that control where you do live. It was a neat place to live, but we wanted to come back to Holt County, but still keep in touch back there.

Some of the places we’ve lived were set up with “Neighborhood Watches”, where there was always someone keeping an eye on things, usually just on the block you lived on. These were volunteers, usually trained and attached to others in the local area. No one had official capacity and was supposed to only alert others who were if something

wasn’t normal, not waiting until it was too late. Usually a sign that was posted stating that it was a local watch would be enough to discourage acts of vandalism and quick looting, but not always. The good part of community living, like Del Webb, was they had their own groups, driving around the area to do the same, being connected by direct contact with the local police. This type of watch didn’t take the place of the local police, county officers and the highway patrol, but was only extra to help out. Here in the rural area, I remember we all knew if anyone was new, different or wasn’t supposed to be here. Remember how we were always somewhere, not always at home, doing chores and studying? Heck, it was our home and playground and we weren’t going to let just anyone mess it up, just us kids.

Today, with all the regulations to protect us, we can’t do like we did in the past. We can’t discriminate against someone else’s rights, you know, to do in some cases what they want and not necessarily what you might. In some of these cities, I wouldn’t want to go up to take some food, etc., and welcome them into the community like we used to. You would probably be hauled off. Times have changed, but not for the better. Do you think we will get things back like they were? Oh well, we can still dream, right?

CH-F introduces Project EMC for newborn safety

Kevin and Markie Sundermann of Tarkio, MO, were so excited to welcome their new son, Sage James David Sundermann, into the world at Community Hospital-Fairfax (MO) (CH-F). Along with a new member of their family, the Sundermanns took something extra home from the hospital.

Sage Sundermann was the first baby born at CH-F to participate in Project EMC. Project EMC stands for Emergency Medical Contact and is a new initiative inspired by emergency room providers, admitting personnel and nurses at CH-F. It includes attaching a sticker to each newborn’s car seat that contains important health information and emergency contact phone numbers. The stickers were developed in response to staff experiences in the emergency room where children become separated from their families and are too young to communicate with emergency personnel.

“Family is very important to us as healthcare providers at CH-F. If we care for your child in the Emergency Room, we want to involve caregivers as soon as possible. The Project EMC sticker may help us reach you in the event you are separated from your child,” explains Ashlee Driskell, Registered Nurse (RN) and Charge Nurse at CH-F.

Project EMC is not limited to babies. All parents and caregivers should be encouraged to consider how emergency personnel might contact them in the event of an emergency involving their child. Attaching contact information to backpacks, lunchboxes and bikes is important to consider.

Billy O. Garn

A wonderful husband, father, grandfather and great-grandfather, Bill O. Gorn of Modesto, CA, passed away peacefully on Friday, August 7, 2015, surrounded by loved ones. He was a devoted family man who loved all animals, especially cats and eagles.

Bill was born in the small town of Craig, MO, on June 16, 1932, to William and Dorothy Garn. After graduating from high school, he joined the U.S. Navy in August of 1950 and served with the Naval Air Transport Squadron until 1954. It was during his service that he met his sweetheart, Ramona Jean Brandt, and they were married in 1954. After 48 years of marriage. In 2001, he had 13 years together.

In August of 1957, Bill was selected for service in the U.S. Border Patrol, where, after short stints in Escondido, CA, and El Paso, TX, he was assigned to Homestead, FL. During his six years of service in Florida as one of only two agents, Bill was deputized as a U.S. Marshal and recognized by President John F. Kennedy and Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy for his service during the 1962 riots at the University of Mississippi during the integration of James Meredith and for guarding the camps of the Civil Rights marchers during the famous 1965 Selma, AL, march of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

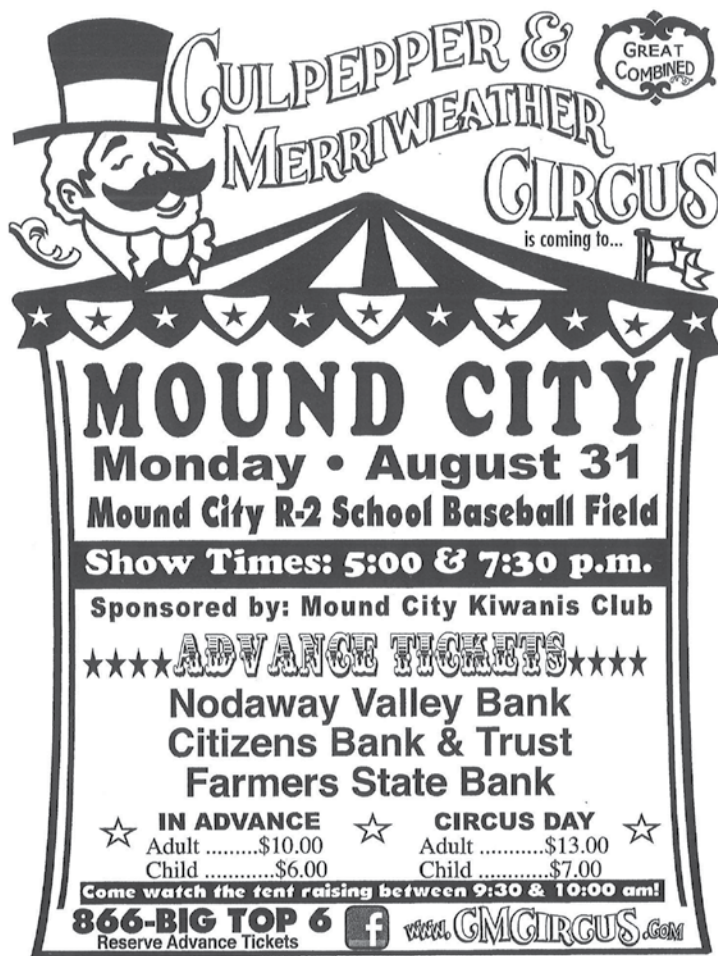

Corning school and community reunion planned

A Corning, MO, school reunion has been planned for Saturday, September 5, 2015, at 10:30 a.m. at Paula's Cafe on Main Street in Craig, MO. Any alumni, teachers, elementary and high school students who attended the school, as well as people of the Corning community, past or present, are welcome to attend. Registration should be made by Tuesday, August 25, by sending \$16.00 per person for meal and registration fee to Kay Graves Rosenbohm, 21992 State Highway Z, Fairfax, MO 64446. Attendees are asked to bring and share Corning stories, memories and memorabilia.

Below is a brief history of Corning, written by Nancy Peters, who resides in rural Corning:

Corning, MO, was laid out in 1858 after Hemme's Landing, about two miles west of Corning, began to be chewed up by the Missouri River. Hemme's Landing was a popular steamboat landing which was about halfway between St. Joseph, MO, and Council Bluffs, IA. Some buildings were moved from the landing to Corning but for the most part, the people had to rebuild their homes and businesses. The Council Bluffs-St. Joseph Railroad was being built through northwest Missouri at that time, and it was an important shipping line for the Corning area.

St. John's Lutheran Church was moved to Corning from the woods near Hemme's Landing in 1885. There was a parochial school associated with that congregation. Those children would also attend classes from time to time at the public school in order to learn English, because only German was spoken in their homes and at the parochial school.

The Corning Independent School District, established in 1861, commenced classes in a one-story frame building. A brick, one-story structure was built in 1894, with a second story added in 1910 to accommodate the growing student population. This structure was destroyed by fire on February 10, 1916. Through an oversight, the insurance on the building had lapsed late in the previous fall. The loss was a heavy blow to the community which had suffered through flooding in July of 1915. One month after the fire, area citizens voted for bonds of \$10,000 to rebuild their school. Classes were held in the Christian Church and the Corning Opera House while a new

building was built.

Corning High School originally offered only the 9th and 10th grades. The 11th and 12th grades were added in 1919, and the first students completing the four-year course graduated in 1921.

In 1943, the school became part of the Craig Reorganized District III and Corning High School closed. The high school students were given the choice of attending school in Rock Port, Fairfax or Craig. The elementary school continued to operate until the spring of 1956, when it closed and the students were dispersed to the school districts of Rock Port, Fairfax and Craig. The school building fell into disrepair and was sold in the late 1960's. The bricks were salvaged and used to build a private residence on the bluffs north of Craig. The lot was sold and a private residence was built over the north half of the school basement.

The loss of its school and recurrent flooding added the final nails to Corning's coffin. Now "gone but not forgotten," it lives on in the memories of those who lived, worked and attended school there.

Mound City Board of Aldermen convene; Davis Creek flooding addressed; new city collector hired

Mayor Chris Krueger called the Mound City Board of Aldermen meeting to order at 5:30 p.m. in the council room at the city hall and led the Pledge of Allegiance on Tuesday, August 11. Mayor Krueger, Aldermen Duane Nauman, Jim Krueger, Robert Heck and Kristine Gibson were present. Others attending were City Clerk Patsy Smith, Deputy Clerk/City Collector Annissa Brandon, City Employee Randy Crowley, Police Chief John Panning, City Attorney Brian Tubbs, Marilyn and Bob Alldredge, Brian Long, Bettie and Louis Kelim, Don Volz, Steph and Richard McCann, Rodney Hicks and Harold and Karen Bruntmyer.

Marilyn Alldredge spoke on behalf of the Northwest Missouri Enterprise Facilitation's Winefest. Council members reviewed and discussed the list of 10 liquor license applications submitted. Alldredge stated that there is one applicant from Grandview, MO, that does not have all the paperwork in yet but would get that to Clerk Patsy Smith within the next few days. Alderman Gibson made a motion to accept the 10 licenses on the list and any that are turned in with proper paperwork. The motion was seconded and passed. The GREAT Northwest Winefest is scheduled for Saturday, September 19, 2015, at Griffith Park. Additional electrical outlets at the park were requested by Alldredge for the Winefest. She would like them to be placed on the pole by the drinking fountain. Mayor Krueger stated that the city would look into having additional outlets added but was not sure if this could be done by September 19.

Donna Kunkel, State Theater Arts Council, contacted City Hall by phone to inform the council that on December 5, 2015, the State Theater Arts Council will be holding the annual Christmas on State Street. The theater council would like for the city's decorations to be up and State Street closed for the festivities. The mayor agreed to turn on the Christmas tree lights again this year.

Regarding the storm sewer into Davis Creek and options for draining the area west of Railroad Street, nine residents were present to discuss concerns with rainwater coming onto their properties and into their basements. The residents all feel that this is a more recent problem that has not happened in the past. Frustrations were expressed about the length of time it is taking to get the tube extension placed and requested the ditch on the north side of 6th Street be dug out. Mayor Krueger stated that the council understands this frustration and a contractor has been hired to place the tube. Due to the recent rain the contractor has not been able to get his equipment in to get the tube placed. Mayor Krueger will call the contractor to discuss the need of the placement of the tube to be done soon.

In old business, the transfer of the State Theater to State Theater Arts Council was discussed in Ordinances & Resolutions.

In new business, a caterer's permit application was submitted by 2 Trendy, LLC, for an event at Extreme Fireworks. Alderman Gibson made a motion to approve a caterer's permit for 2 Trendy, LLC., pending approval by the State Division of Liquor

Control. The motion was seconded and passed. The clerk will prepare a letter of approval for submittal with O'Meara's state application.

Mayor Krueger discussed the inspection of the storm water leak in the library and stated that the water was running between the wood window sills and running down between the brick and cement. Darby Grace with Edge Construction placed an estimate of \$2,980 to cover the wood in the six windows on the south side with metal. Alderman Heck made a motion to have Edge Construction install metal wrap and seal all windows in City Hall. The motion was seconded and passed.

Alderman Heck presented Police Chief Panning with the Missouri Intergovernmental Risk Management Association (MIRMA) 100% Training Award for the Police Department.

In department reports, Police Chief Panning reviewed the monthly reports. He stated that he had received a letter denying grant funding for new radar units but will seek other funding options.

Water Department Superintendent Randy Crowley reported that he had valves replaced at the water plant and is having the filter media checked out. Painting of the water tower will begin at the end of August.

Mayor Krueger opened the public hearing for setting the 2015 tax levies. No citizens were present. Council members reviewed the budget officer's report and the projected tax levies with a total 2015 tax rate ceiling of \$1.8867 per \$100 assessed valuation. This rate is approved by the State Auditor. The total

2015 levy will be \$1.8867 staying the same as last year's total levy. The hearing was closed.

Bill No. 8-11-2015 (1): Approval of 2015 Tax Levies was placed on its first reading being for an ordinance entitled as follows:

AN ORDINANCE LEVYING A TAX UPON ALL OF THE TAXABLE PROPERTY IN THE CITY OF MOUND CITY, MISSOURI, FOR GENERAL MUNICIPAL AND SPECIAL PURPOSES FOR THE YEAR 2015 FOR THE PURPOSE OF PAYING THE ORDINARY AND CURRENT EXPENSES OF SAID CITY, INCLUDING LIGHTING OF PUBLIC STREETS AND ALLEYS; FOR THE PURPOSE OF MAINTENANCE OF THE FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY; FOR THE PURPOSE OF PROVIDING FOR THE PUBLIC HEALTH; AND FOR THE FURTHER PURPOSE OF PROVIDING FOR THE MAINTENANCE AND IMPROVEMENTS OF THE PUBLIC PARKS OF SAID CITY; AND FURTHER PROVIDING FOR THE COLLECTION OF PENALTIES ON DELINQUENT TAXES.

Alderman Heck moved to adopt the bill and the motion was seconded. After further discussion, the bill was placed on its second reading and final passage and was read by title, considered and discussed. Ordinance was approved. The bill was duly numbered Ordinance #1257.

Bill No. 8-11-2015 (2): Establish Procedures for Financial Disclosure was placed on its first reading being for an ordinance entitled as follows:

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MOUND CITY, MISSOURI, TO ESTABLISH A PROCEDURE TO DISCLOSE POTENTIAL CONFLICTS OF INTEREST AND SUBSTANTIAL INTERESTS FOR CERTAIN MUNICIPAL OFFICIALS.

Alderman Heck moved to adopt the bill and the motion was seconded. After further discus-

sion, the bill was placed on its second reading and final passage and was read by title, considered and discussed. Ordinance was approved. The bill was duly numbered Ordinance #1258.

Bill No. 8-11-2015 (3): Conveyance of Real Estate at 512 State Street was placed on its first reading being for an ordinance entitled as follows:

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO ENTER INTO THE DOCUMENTS NECESSARY TO EFFECT THE SALE AND CONVEYANCE OF A TRACT OF REAL PROPERTY OWNED BY THE CITY OF MOUND CITY AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

Alderman Krueger moved to adopt the bill and the motion was seconded. After further discussion, the bill was placed on its second reading and final passage and was read by title, considered and discussed. Ordinance was approved, Gibson abstained. The bill was duly numbered Ordinance #1259.

City Attorney Tubbs stated that he has been in contact with the construction company that will be taking down the building at 602 State Street. The company stated that it would be October before it would get to it. Tubbs informed the company that if progress was not shown by October then further action will be taken.

Alderman Krueger made a motion to accept the \$4,000 bid from Art White & Associates for an audit for the year ending June 30, 2015. The motion was seconded and passed.

Council set the next regular meeting for Thursday, September 10, 2015, at 5:30 p.m..

Alderman Gibson made a motion to change the work week for administration and office employees to 40 hours a week in the Personnel Policy. The motion was seconded and passed.

At 6:40 p.m., Alderman Gibson moved to close the meeting pursuant to RSMo 610.021 (3) & (13) – Personnel. The motion

was seconded and passed.

Alderman Nauman moved to come out of closed session at 7:15 p.m. The motion was seconded and passed.

Alderman Gibson made a motion to hire Nancy Nauman at \$11.00 per hour for the City Collector position. The motion was seconded and passed.

On a motion made by Alderman Heck and seconded by Gibson the meeting was adjourned at 7:20 p.m.



Mayor Krueger called a special meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. on Friday, August 14, in the council room at the city hall to discuss the storm water flowing into Davis Creek and the city collector position. Those present were Bob Heck, Jim Krueger, Kristine Gibson, Clerk Patsy Smith and Deputy Clerk/Collector Annissa Brandon. The mayor stated that he and Alderman Heck had met with Hall Construction, Mound City, to discuss the extension of the tube being placed into Davis Creek. The existing tube is under water and Hall Construction could not add the extension. Alderman Heck met with some of the residents to discuss this issue. They all agreed that an engineer was needed to determine how to properly fix the ongoing problem. Mayor Krueger stated that Clerk Smith had contacted Snyder & Associates to have an engineer inspect Davis Creek. The engineer was scheduled to be here Monday, August 17.

At 9:13 a.m., Alderman Heck moved to close the meeting pursuant to RSMo 610.021(3) & (13) – Personnel. The motion was seconded and passed.

Alderman Heck moved to come out of closed session at 9:35 a.m. The motion was seconded and passed.

27th Annual Graves-Chapple Research Center Field Day on Tuesday, August 25

Several topics will be discussed in depth at the 27th annual Graves-Chapple Research Center Field Day on Tuesday, Aug. 25. The Field Day will touch on nutrient management, pest management and crop management.

“We’re really excited,” Superintendent Jim Crawford said. “We have a lot of great topics and great speakers lined up. It’s also good to have several University of Missouri professors there to discuss their research. They reinforce the topics being discussed and it’s really educational for us, too.”

Tours begin at 8 a.m. with a lunch at noon. Kent Fisher Insurance will sponsor lunch. Ice cream will also be provided, sponsored by MO Valley Ag. Atchison-Holt REA will sponsor doughnuts and coffee in the morning.

Stopping pests and diseases from ravaging crops and land will be a big discussion topic. Wayne Bailey will look at current and future insect problems. Kevin Bradley will discuss marestail and resistant weed management and Laura Sweets will examine soybean diseases and how to manage them.

“It can be hard to identify pests or disease because you usually don’t know until you find the damage,” Crawford said. “These

speakers will shed some light on how to battle pests and disease before they become too big of a problem. Pests and diseases are always changing, so it’s very important to stay on top of them.”

Getting fair value for farmland leases will also be an important topic of discussion at the Graves-Chapple Field Day.

“There are some real questions on this topic,” Crawford said. “Both sides want to make sure that they’re getting fair value. When that lease is up, you want to know what the fair value number is going to be.”

Using a cover crop can also be valuable for farmers. Crawford said the Field Day will feature some of the pros of using a cover crop.

“It has been a wet year,” Crawford said. “A cover crop can help prevent erosion and improve soil health. The weather has been kind of a mixed blessing. While extra water isn’t ideal, it does give farmers an opportunity to improve the health of their soil.”

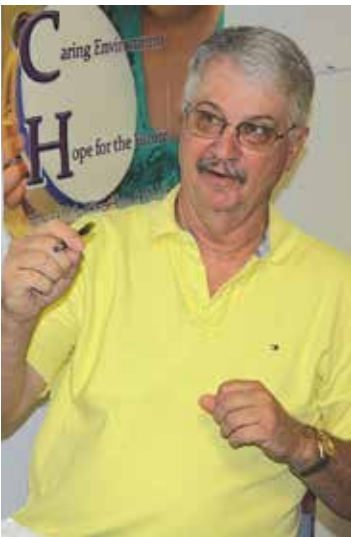

Missouri receives major disaster declaration in response to Governor Nixon’s request

Missouri Governor Jay Nixon announced on Monday, August 10, President Barack Obama has approved his request for a major disaster declaration as a result of prolonged flash flooding and severe storms across the state from Friday, May 15, to Monday, July 27. Local governments and non-profit agencies in the 68 counties included in the declaration - the most for any disaster in Missouri since the Great Flood of 1993 - can seek federal assistance for response and recovery expenses associated with the flooding and severe weather.

“The prolonged severe weather system that repeatedly hit Missouri with flooding and severe storms caused an estimated \$38 million in damage to roads, bridges and other public infrastructure and resulted in at least 10 deaths,” Gov. Nixon said. “This declaration will help bring much needed financial assistance to the many communities

that have sustained excessive response costs and heavy damage to essential public infrastructure.”

The counties included in the federal public assistance disaster declaration are: Adair, Andrew, Atchison, Audrain, Barry, Bates, Benton, Buchanan, Caldwell, Chariton, Christian, Clark, Clay, Clinton, Cole, Crawford, Dade, Dallas, Daviess, DeKalb, Douglas, Gentry, Harrison, Henry, Hickory, Holt, Jefferson, Johnson, Knox, Laclede, Lafayette, Lewis, Lincoln, Linn, Livingston, McDonald, Macon, Maries, Marion, Miller, Moniteau, Monroe, Montgomery, Morgan, Osage, Ozark, Perry, Pettis, Pike, Platte, Polk, Putnam, Ralls, Ray, Ste. Genevieve, Saline, Schuyler, Scotland, Shannon, Shelby, Stone, Sullivan, Taney, Texas, Washington, Webster, Worth and Wright.

Public assistance allows local governments and eligible

nonprofit agencies to seek assistance for response and recovery expenses associated with the severe weather and flooding. The Governor said he will likely request that additional counties be added to the federal declaration.

The federal government said the Governor’s request seeking individual assistance for residents in Barry, Clay, Christian, Greene, Jackson, Jefferson, Knox, Lewis, Lincoln, Marion, Osage, Ray, Ste. Genevieve, Stone and Webster counties is under review. That request was made Tuesday, July 21.

Individual assistance means

that eligible individuals and households can seek federal assistance for uninsured losses from severe weather and flooding.


Gov. Nixon first declared a state of emergency in Missouri on Thursday, June 18. The Governor’s order activated the State Emergency Operations Center and enabled the state to mobilize its resources, including the State Emergency Management Agency (SEMA) to assist local authorities. The Governor has extended the state of emergency until Friday, Aug. 14.
