

Letter to the editor

The Holt County commissioners have made a final decision regarding the new pool project in Oregon. They have unanimously voted not to move forward with construction. The Southern Holt Joint Recreation System Commission, appointed by the county, the City of Oregon, and the City of Forest City, have been working with the commission since the community voted to pay for the pool assessment in April. The commissioners initially had a list of requests for the board including finding donations to lower the overall cost to the Neighborhood Improvement District, finding alternate companies that could bid the project to comply with state statutes, and finding an outside source to administer the funds and oversee the project. In July, the recreation board went back to the county commissioners with all that they had asked including reducing the overall cost by 30%.

At that meeting, the commissioners had additional concerns regarding the way the assessment would be collected and the bidding process. They were not able to give a yes or no answer at that time and postponed the decision until the Aug. 3 meeting. At that time, the recreation board again met with the county to get the final decision. The commissioners had not received all of the information from the outside source as of that meeting, and stated that they would know by Aug. 7. On Friday, August 7, the recreation board received a voice message stating that the commissioners would not be moving forward with the project.

The commissioners did recommend that the board try to move forward with a separate project that would not involve the county and would require a petition and new vote from the residents in Southern Holt County. The recreation board is looking into all possibilities. However, this will slow the process and upon the recommendation of the engineering firm which examined the pool three years ago, the pool will not open next summer.

Fatal accident on I-29 claims life

An accident on I-29 claimed the life of one man on Saturday, August 15, at 6:15 a.m. in Holt County. According to the Missouri State Highway Patrol, Terry R. Mr. Stanley was pronounced dead at the scene by Holt County Coroner Susan Lentz. The body was taken by Meierhoffer Funeral Home in St. Joseph, MO. The totalled vehicle was towed by Double D Towing to its lot in Mound City.

The accident was investigated by Trooper J.W. Cotter, who was assisted by Sergeant M.P. Quilty and the Holt County Sheriff. Next of kin was notified.

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Remembering

The other day at McDonald's, one of the hotter summer days, I waited to go in as a young mother with two, one on each side of her while she was carrying a small one, was coming from her car. I held the door open for them and she stopped and thanked me for what she thought was a lost practice of holding doors open for women, and she said she knew I was from the last generation who would still do this. Even her two older ones thanked me. I knew she had been brought up that way too. Holding doors open for people and letting someone go ahead of you in a crowded line needs to happen. I always let anyone go ahead of me at the grocery store, etc. If I have a lot more items than the one behind me, they learn a lesson. The lady in front of me had more coupons to turn in that I didn't even know existed. Oh well, things aren't always what they seem, anyway, this young lady made me remember how it used to be.

Some of you might remember, back in the old days, even up in the 90s, when you moved into a new town or neighborhood and before you could get unloaded, someone would be there to welcome you and offer to help unload. I remember there was always someone who would say they just do that because they are nosy and want to find out everything about you. Maybe so, but there would have to be something wrong with a person who wouldn't appreciate help and an assortment of food, cakes, cookies, coffee, cold drinks and information about the community. We've lived where there was a "Welcome Wagon" (not a real one) that would stop by leaving a packet, usually sponsored by local businesses, that included information on schools, churches, civic organizations, lodges, types of stores, professional help, lawyers, doctors, hospitals and city offices. The last time Betty and I were visited by one of the "Welcome Wagons" was in 1998 when we moved to Georgetown, TX, in one of Del Webb's Sun City communities. That was a unique place for as we were told the reason everyone got along as if they'd been friends forever was because everyone who lived there was there because they wanted to be and not because of other circumstances that control where you do live. It was a neat place to live, but we wanted to come back to Holt County, but still keep in touch back

Some of the places we've lived were set up with "Neighborhood Watches", where there was always someone keeping an eye on things, usually just on the block you lived on. These were volunteers, usually trained and attached to others in the local area. No one had official capacity and was supposed to only alert others who were if something

wasn't normal, not waiting until it was too late. Usually a sign that was posted stating that it was a local watch would be enough to discourage acts of vandalism and quick looting, but not always. The good part of community living, like Del Webb, was they had their own groups, driving around the area to do the same, being connected by direct contact with the local police. This type of watch didn't take the place of the local police, county officers and the highway patrol, but was only extra to help out. Here in the rural area, I remember we all knew if anyone was new, different or wasn't supposed to be here. Remember how we were always somewhere, not always at home, doing chores and studying? Heck, it was our home and playground and we weren't going to let just anyone

The Project EMC sticker may help us reach you in the event you are separated from your child," explains Ashlee Driskell, Registered Nurse (RN) and Charge Nurse at CH-F.

Project EMC is not limited to babies. All parents and caregivers should be encouraged to consider how emergency personnel might contact them in the event of an emergency involving their child. Attaching contact information to backpacks, lunchboxes and bikes is important to consider.

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

U.S. Route 59 bridge over I-29 closed at **Exit 67 in Holt County**



Corning school and community reunion planned

A Corning, MO, school reunion has been planned for Saturday, September 5, 2015, at 10:30 a.m. at Paula's Cafe on Main Street in Craig, MO. Any alumni, teachers, elementary and high school students who attended the school, as well as people of the Corning community, past or present, are welcome to attend. Registration should be made by Tuesday, August 25, by sending \$16.00 per person for meal and registration fee to Kay Graves Rosenbohm, 21992 State Highway Z, Fairfax, MO 64446. Attendees are asked to bring and share Corning stories, memories and memorabilia.

Below is a brief history of Corning, written by Nancy Peters, who resides in rural Corning:

Corning, MO, was laid out in 1858 after Hemme's Landing, about two miles west of Corning, began to be chewed up by the Missouri River. Hemme's Landing was a popular steamboat landing which was about halfway between St. Joseph, MO, and Council Bluffs, IA. Some buildings were moved from the landing to Corning but for the most part, the people had to rebuild their homes and businesses. The Council Bluffs-St. Joseph Railroad was being built through northwest Missouri at that time, and it was an important shipping line for the Corning area.

St. John's Lutheran Church was moved to Corning from the woods near Hemme's Landing in 1885. There was a parochial school associated with that congregation. Those children would also attend classes from time to time at the public school in order to learn English, because only German was spoken in their homes and at the parochial school.

The Corning Independent School District, established in 1861, commenced classes in a one-story frame building. A brick, onestory structure was built in 1894, with a second story added in 1910 to accommodate the growing student population. This structure was destroyed by fire on February 10, 1916. Through an oversight, the insurance on the building had lapsed late in the previous fall. The loss was a heavy blow to the community which had suffered through flooding in July of 1915. One month after the fire, area citizens voted for bonds of \$10,000 to rebuild their school. Classes were held in the Christian Church and the Corning Opera House while a new

building was built.

Corning High School originally offered only the 9th and 10th grades. The 11th and 12th grades were added in 1919, and the first students completing the four-year course graduated in 1921.

In 1943, the school became part of the Craig Reorganized District III and Corning High School closed. The high school students were given the choice of attending school in Rock Port, Fairfax or Craig. The elementary school continued to operate until the spring of 1956, when it closed and the students were dispersed to the school districts of Rock Port, Fairfax and Craig. The school building fell into disrepair and was sold in the late 1960's. The bricks were salvaged and used to build a private residence on the bluffs north of Craig. The lot was sold and a private residence was built over the north half of the school basement.

The loss of its school and recurrent flooding added the final nails to Corning's coffin. Now "gone but not forgotten," it lives on in the memories of those who lived, worked and attended school there.





Missouri receives major disaster declaration in response to Governor Nixon's request

Missouri Governor Jay Nixon that have sustained excessive re- nonprofit agencies to seek assisannounced on Monday, August 10, President Barack Obama has approved his request for a major disaster declaration as a result of prolonged flash flooding and severe storms across the state from Friday, May 15, to Monday, July 27. Local governments and nonprofit agencies in the 68 counties included in the declaration - the most for any disaster in Missouri since the Great Flood of 1993 response and recovery expenses associated with the flooding and severe weather.

"The prolonged severe weather system that repeatedly hit Missouri with flooding and severe storms caused an estimated \$38 million in damage to roads, bridges and other public infrastructure and resulted in at least 10 deaths," Gov. Nixon said. "This declaration will help bring much needed financial assis-

sponse costs and heavy damage to essential public infrastruc-
