## Meetings explain transmission line requirements to landowners

Approximately 20 representatives from KCP&L and the Omaha Public Power District (OPPD) were on hand at a public meeting at the Mound City School on Tuesday, August 21, allowing local citizens the opportunity to learn and ask questions about the Midwest Transmission Project (MTP). The two companies are working in partnership to ultimately construct a new 345 kV transmission line from Sibley, MO, to Nebraska City, NE. These lines could ultimately be built through Holt County.

The Southwest Power Pool (SPP), a regional transmission organization, oversees compliance enforcement and reliability standards development. The SPP is mandated to ensure reliable supplies of power, adequate transmission infrastructure, and competitive wholesale prices for electricity. This project is determined to be a

'priority', and KCP&L and OPPD are responsible for making it happen. The project will provide an alternative route for electricity during emergencies and greater service reliability across northwest Missouri, eastern Nebraska and the surrounding region. It will also reduce congestion on the current system.

The open forum style meeting allowed for personal explanation of the process behind the need and the placement of the new lines. The purpose of the initial meetings is to gather information from the public, residents, landowners and stakeholders in preparation for the routing process for the new lines. Following the various meetings, this fall, the companies will begin developing the potential routes, which may be as many as 3,000 initially. At the vari-

# Landowners vote to complete work on Holt County Levee District #15

Holt County Levee District #15 was held on Thursday, August 23, 2012, at the Legion Building in Craig, MO. At said meeting, the Board of Levee District 15, Steve Cunningham, Vice-President, acting President in the absence of President Johnny Haer, and Secretary Eddie Drewes opened the meeting. They explained the purpose of the meeting was for the presentation of the proposed work to be completed by the district and for return of assessment; and for the landowners to then vote on whether or not to complete the work. Randy Mendenhal of Snyder Engineering presented plans and specifications for the work to be complet-

ed by the district. The district will be rebuilding

A meeting of landowners of the high bank levee constructed prior to the flooding by local farmers. The levee will tie in on the south end with Union Levee District's levee southwest of Gail Heitman's residence. The levee will run along the high bank and tie into the Big Tarkio River levee behind the chicken barns west of the Haer property. The district will also assume responsibility of a portion of the Big Tarkio River levee on the east side that has historically been maintained by the Big Tarkio Drainage District. This section is where the breach occurred the previous year and approximately a quarter mile north thereof to the southern line of responsibility of the Big Tarkio Drainage District.

After presentation of the pro-

posed work and assessment, landowners were told the expected cost of the levee. Landowners were informed that the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has committed \$1,043,966 for levee repair within the district, and the 25% required local contributions to the FEMA levee repair projects will be funded through Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds totaling \$302,074. Total additional funds required for the proposed levee work were explained to be approximately \$265,000, resulting in a onetime construction tax of 18% or .18/ assessed dollar value. Landowners will be given the option of paying the tax over a 3-year period with the statutorily required interest of 8% charged on

outstanding installments. Landowners were also informed that a maintenance tax of approximately 2% would be assessed.

After presentation of the information and answering of landowner questions, the vote was held. A simple majority of landowners voting in person, power of attorney, attorney or proxy was required to pass the tax for the proposed work. The vote was counted by Holt County Clerk Kathy Kunkel, and passed by a vote of 80 in favor to 21 against. Work is expected to begin this fall after harvest. The Northwest Missouri Regional Council of Governments will be administering the solicitation of bids and grant administration and oversee the construction process.

The Missouri Bureau of Emergency Medical Services would like to recognize the Atchison-Holt Ambulance District for supporting the Missouri Emergency Medical Services for Children State Partnership Grant in its endeavor to provide the best possible emergency medical care to the pediatric population.

Without the necessary pediatric medical equipment and supplies, healthcare professionals are limited in the quality of care they can provide to the nation's children. It is thus imperative that pre-hospital emergency care providers, emergency department (ED) personnel, and office-based pediatricians/physicians have the appropriate equipment and supplies to provide care for the critically ill and injured children they may encounter in their practice.

A number of professional organizations and government agencies have addressed this issue through the development of essential and/or recommended equipment and supply lists for inclusion in basic life support (BLS) and advanced life support (ALS) ambulances, EDs, and physicians' offices.

With the Atchison-Holt Ambulance District's participation on the latest Pediatric Readiness Survey, the Missouri Emergency Medical Services for Children State Partnership Grant was able to identify that only 73% of Missouri's ground ambulance services had pediatric sized traction splints. Pediatric sized traction

> splints realign a fractured femur to its proper position, reducing pain and restoring perfusion to an injured leg. It also inhibits further hemorrhage and additional nerve, vascular, bone and muscle damage.

> The majority of the pediatric sized traction splints were distributed during the latter half of May, 2012, corresponding with National Emergency Medical Services Week, May 20-26, 2012.





# What do you remember?

The Holt County Historical Society is looking for answers to these questions that have been submitted by researchers.

#### Where is Lyke (Lick) Skillet??

A Brown family lived in Dallas Township in the 1870 census and in Bigelow Township in the 1880 census. A daughter, Perlina Ann Brown, was born in 1873, in Holt County, in Lyke Skillet.

#### Where is this burial?

Members of the Greater Washington Area Historical Society in Washington, Macomb County, Michigan, are researching Civil War veterans from that area and have found that a government issued Military headstone for William Wilkinson (Lt. Colonel, 9 Michigan Infantry) is listed as delivered to a Mound City cemetery. Wilkinson died July 21, 1895, and it is noted in <u>Gone Home I</u> that he is buried in the Old Mound City Cemetery. Need to locate the burial site and tombstone.

#### The Wilber Francis Newton family

It is in excellent original unrestored condition and was driven at the museum's annual "History Road" car show in June, 2012. It is known that motor hearses of this age are very rare.

- A new county organization was formed with the purpose of heading a drive to obtain a majority vote in the November General Election for the establishment of a Holt County Memorial Hospital District.


# 25 Years Ago - 1987







Conner Derr, 9 yearold son of Randy Derr and grandson of LeRoyce Derr, of Mound City, has collected various ribbons at fairs this summer that culminated with 1st place class finishes at the Missouri State Fair in Sedalia this month.


Conner entered the DeKalb County Fair in Maysville, MO, on June 14th. He earned three ribbons: 1st place January Gilt; Champion Spot Gilt; and Reserve Grand Champion gilt (overall breeds).

Two weeks later, on June 29, the father/son (Randy/Conner) duo travelled to Springfield, IL, to participate in the Team

Purebred National Show, which is the largest team purebred show in the nation with over 1,000 entries. In the Class 9 gilt division, the local team brought home a 6th place ribbon.

Conner participated in the Nodaway County Fair in Maryville, MO, on July 19-21. He finished the fair with the 1st Place January Gilt and the Champion Spot Gilt.

The Missouri State Fair was held from August 9-19. Missouri has the largest state fair spotted hog show in the nation. Conner, who is in his first year as a member of the Shiloh 4-H Club, attended the fair and entered in the 4-H competition, as well as in the general entries. Conner claimed 1st Place in Class I 4-H Spot Gilt and 1st Place Class I Open Division Spot Gilt.
