Monarch mania

Squaw Creek Refuge manager Ron Bell visited two Mound City R-2 classrooms on Wednesday, September 22, with a large number of monarch butterflies that he had captured from the refuge which needed tagging before their release.

Each student in the preschool and first grade classrooms, as well as several teachers and student assistants, were given the opportunity to place a tag on the wing of a monarch. The butterflies were then placed in a netted cage before the classes released them from the front yard of the school for their winter migration.

In the morning, Ron Bell appeared in the preschool classroom, donned in his monarch wings, to assist the 20 preschool students in tagging a monarch. In the afternoon, Mrs. Forehand's

first grade class tagged 22 monarchs. Each butterfly was identified as male/female, its number written down and then the student meticulously placed the tag on its wing.

The two groups of monarchs were released from the front lawn of the school. The students will use the monarch tagging website to track their monarchs' migration for arrival in Mexico.

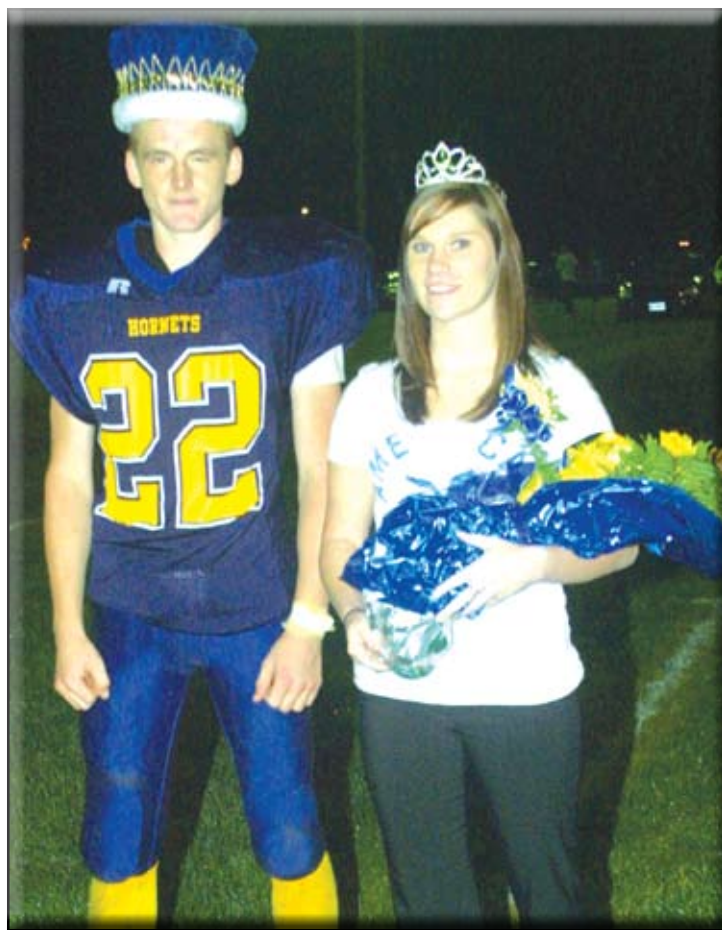

Important surveys go out in Mound City

Could mean new bridge or streets

A community survey was mailed this week to over 300 households in Mound City. The surveys are an integral part in a search for funding to make improvements to Mound City streets and/or Davis Creek Bridge.

The Mound City Mayor and Board of Aldermen are continually seeking ways to improve the community at the lowest cost to residents. One way to accomplish this is through a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG).

The city submitted the entire Mound City address list to the Missouri Department of Economic Development, which then chose the over 300 survey recipients.

Survey recipients need to fill out the survey and return it in the postage paid envelope provided. Completed surveys are then mailed to the Northwest Regional Council of Governments for

tabulation, ensuring confidentiality.

The city is required to have 80% of the surveys returned, or city personnel will have to go door to door to obtain the completed surveys. Prompt attention to the completion of the surveys will expedite the entire process.

Once the 80% is received, at least 51% of the residents surveyed must be at low-moderate income (LMI) levels for the city to be eligible to apply for the grant.

Once the LMI is met, the council will then determine the greatest use of the funds (streets and/or bridge), complete the grant application form and then send it on through a scoring process against other applications from across the state.

The city last obtained a CDBG in the mid 80's when the lagoon was expanded from one cell to three cells.

The very talented man says he can 'see music'. Unable to be helped by his music teacher, Bud went to the public library, checked out books and learned music theory on his own.

Bud bought his first fiddle around the age of 30, which is about the time he started writing poetry. He said, "I would just sit and write when it would come to me."

Bud has played with many individuals and groups over the years. Among those Bud remembered included: Clement Brothers Band, Forney Brothers Band, Rick Titus and Green Country, Kenny Brunner and Ted Paxson with Yellow Hair, Country Rockets, Camp Rulo Opery, John Marriott and Southwind, John Banks and the Timber City Travellers, and Grady Rivers. Bud toured the state of NE

with Dave Mayhugh in the late 70's to entertain guests before the arrival of Frank Church on his campaign trail for Democratic nomination against Jimmy Carter.

Bud is also an excellent artist. He enjoys drawin' cartoons, and creating wood burnings and pencil sketches. Many of his original works were on display in the lobby.

On Saturday, Bud took the stage with "Cousin Curtis". Curtis Stroud, a musician and music instructor, has been playing with Bud since he was in high school. Curtis expressed his heartfelt gratitude and appreciation to Bud during the performance for the time and teaching that Bud had invested in him over the years.

Bud enjoyed playing for 'his friends and neighbors in the Mayberry of the Midwest (Mound City)' and even wrote a song titled the Mound City Breakdown that began and ended the performance.

Local artist creates mural for St. Joe Boot

Larry Knapp, owner of Knapp Outdoor Displays, hung his latest 48' masterpiece on the side of St. Joe Boot Co. in St. Joseph, MO, on Monday, September 27. The Mound City artist was commissioned by Carol Crouser to create the mural of a bank robbery scene for St. Joe Boot Co.

The scene depicts Jesse and Frank James on horseback in front of an old western store front with the Missouri hills in the background. Most intriguing are the names of the buildings, named after Larry's grandchildren. They include Grady's Bank, Gavin's General Store, Gage's Livery and Tage's Saloon.

Larry had painted a different mural for St. Joe Boot Co. in 1984, that hung there for 13-14 years. This is the second time he has been commissioned for the project.

Larry and his wife, Diann, invested more than 200 hours in the 48' project, researching, drawing and painting the mural. The mural was created on twelve 4x8 panels. Larry's son Tyler also assisted in the project.

"I really enjoyed doing the mural," stated Larry. "On a 48' mural, there are a lot of brush strokes."

Larry has spent his entire life painting. He worked locally from Mound City until 1999, then moved to Colorado, before returning to Mound City in 2009.

Sheriff Wedlock completes National Sheriffs' Institute

Holt County Sheriff Scott Wedlock completed the 99th session of National Sheriffs' Institute (NSI) in Longmont, CO, on September 19-25.

NSI is the only national executive development program designed for sheriffs. The no-cost program is co-sponsored by the National Institute of Corrections (NIC) and the National Sheriffs' Association (NSA).

The NSA is a non-profit professional association located in Alexandria, VA. NSA represents the nearly 3,100 elected sheriffs across the nation and has more than 18,000 members.

The NIC is a division of the U.S. Department of Justice, Bureau of Prisons. It is the primary federal source of technical assistance, training and information services for state and local corrections.

Sheriff Wedlock applied for the opportunity and 'felt honored to be selected'. He was one of 30 sheriffs selected from across the country for the training. The event is only offered to first-term sheriffs.

"It was one of the best trainings I have ever been to," stated Sheriff Wedlock. "It was very thought provoking."

Sheriff Wedlock joined the other sheriffs for training on contemporary challenges facing America's sheriffs today. In light of those challenges, the sheriffs explored the role of the local sheriff in providing effective leadership for the public good in such areas as public safety, criminal justice system policy, community relations and organization effectiveness and efficiency. Trainees left with a plan on how to make professional and personal improvements.

Speakers for the graduation ceremony included Virginia Hutchinson of the NIC and Fred Wilson of the NSA.

Fred G. Wilson, NSA Director of Operations, said, "Sheriff Wedlock is a leader with vision for the Holt County Sheriff's Office. It is an honor to have Sheriff Wedlock join the over 2,400 graduates of the NSI since 1973."

Sheriff Wedlock is the first sheriff of Holt County to graduate from the NSI.

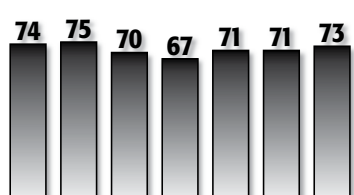

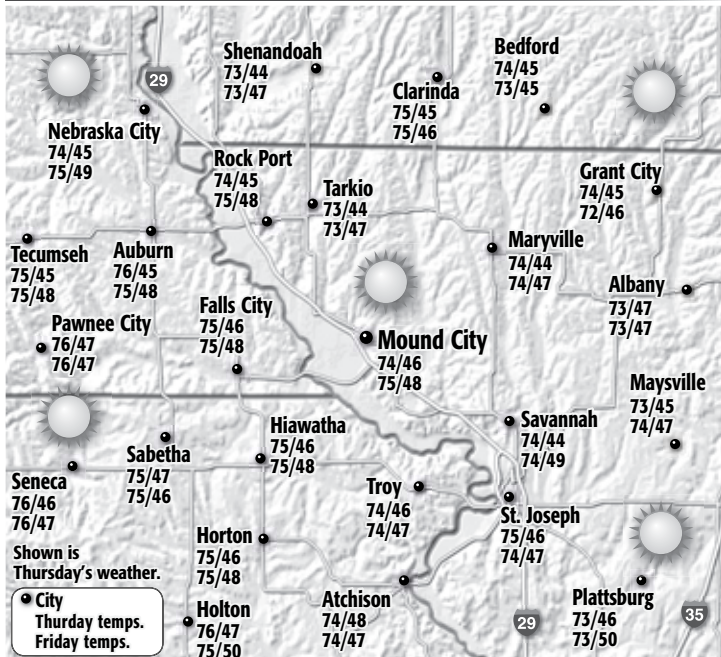

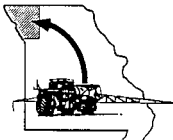

At the age of six, Brian was in a tragic accident which caused him to lose his left leg from the knee down. Needing a new adventure, Shirley, Brian's mother, decided to purchase a piano for him at the age of 13. Life directed him to the music business after graduating with a scholarship to SMSU in Springfield, MO, for classical piano. He landed his first job in Osage Beach, MO, at Mark Sexton's Starworld Showroom. Brian then went to Branson, MO, where he joined the Wilkinson Brothers Show in 1989.

Brian's next career stop was the Roy Clark Celebrity Theater in 1990. Here, he was in the house band, which opened for many nationally known music artists. Here's a short list of artists Brian opened for: Roy Clark, Tammy Wynette, Ray Stevens, Jim Stafford, Loretta Lynn, Ricky Skaggs,

Roger Miller and Conway Twitty.

In 1991, Brian moved on to Silver Dollar City to play in the Time Machine Band for the Branson Brothers in the Echo Hollow Amphitheater. During this time, Brian started a part-time gospel trio called Chosen Few with his long time friend, Ashley Ellison and Branson Brother, Terry Kaufman.

In 1994, Brian was hit by a semi-truck while en route to a church singing. This accident left him with a broken neck and paralyzed left arm. This dramatically changed his life again. One week after leaving the hospital, he married his fiancé, Diane Kukal. This was a very hard time for them, along with her daughter, Kelsey, because Brian was basically helpless. Brian's life took a completely different course with the loss of the use of his left arm. He fought bouts of depression and anger over his situation. Brian continued on though, trying to work his way through it all. Eventually he went back to playing the piano with one hand.

For the first time, ballots will be sent by secure e-mail

Absentee ballots for the November 2, 2010, General Election are now available to military and overseas voters and, for the first time, voters may choose to receive their ballot by secure e-mail. The Missouri Elections' Division is urging military and overseas voters to request their absentee ballot immediately to ensure they will be able to participate in the upcoming election.

In past elections, mailing a ballot overseas could take up to 18 days, making it difficult for voters to return their ballot by Election Day. Now, voters can decide how to receive their ballot, which may be sent by mail, e-mail, or fax. After voting, a new tracking system will allow voters to confirm that their ballot was received by their local election authority in Missouri.

The new voting options will make voting faster and more convenient for more than 112,000 Missourians; including those living overseas, the men and women

serving in the military, and their family members. The improvements to the military and overseas voting process are due to changes in state and federal law. In Missouri, the proposed improvements received broad, bipartisan support and were approved unanimously by the Missouri General Assembly as part of House Bill 1524 and 2206. Other improvements in place for 2010 include free expedited mail for military voters, and expanded availability of electronic forms such as voter registration applications and absentee ballot applications. To register to vote, request an absentee ballot or learn more about military and overseas voting in Missouri, visit www.gov.otemissouri.com.

Bed bugs are being found

Bed bugs are now a concern for the public. This pest has now been increasingly found in homes, hotels, shelters and other facilities. If you travel, be careful not to bring this pest home.

Bed bugs are small, reddish-brown insects that feed on the blood of animals. The common bed bug feeds on humans. The adults are about 3/16th of an inch long.

Once your home is infested with bed bugs, they are hard to get rid of. Nymphs can survive months without feeding. Adults can go without food for more than one year, so vacating a property will not reduce the probability of reducing this pest.

Bed bugs feed at night. During the days, they hide in crevices such as headboards of beds, mattresses and box springs.

Bed bugs bite people when they are asleep at night. They pierce the person's skin and withdraw blood. This takes about three to five minutes according to Dr. Richard Houseman, University of Missouri State Entomologist.

Symptoms after bitten differ with the individual. Some may develop an itchy red welt. Others may have little or no reaction. Luckily, bed bugs do not transmit any diseases.

Bed bugs move by hitchhiking on luggage, clothing, furniture and other items. This is of particular concern with hotels and apartments. Since the bugs are small, they can crawl into suitcases and

other belongings.

Once bed bugs are introduced into an area, they can move from room to room. Also, they can be found in very clean hotels and apartments.

Bed bugs are hard to control. They hide in many places, so using a professional pest control firm is important. Often bed bugs will hide along the seams of mattresses and box springs. If you find blackish spots, they are the excrement. Typical insecticide treatments that homeowners have available will not control this pest.

Since this pest is difficult to eradicate, it would make a lot of sense to avoid bringing them into the home accidentally. The highest risk areas are where people move about a lot such as hotels and apartments.

If you travel, get in the habit of checking beds for signs of bed bugs. Examine the bed sheets and upper and lower seams of the mattress and box spring, especially along the head of the bed. If bed bugs are found, ask to be moved to another area of the hotel.

If you experience itchy bites during your stay, it would be advisable before bringing anything into the house to place all clothing in a disposable bag in the clothes dryer on high for 45 minutes. The heat will kill this insect. As far as suitcases, they should be discarded along with any other items that cannot be cleaned. Shoes, toys and backpacks should all be placed in a clothes dryer and heated for 45 minutes to kill this pest.

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Prevention is key to turning the tide on childhood obesity epidemic

September is National Childhood Obesity Awareness Month

Missouri continues to outpace most of the nation in childhood obesity.

The latest statistics show that 29 percent of Missouri high school students are overweight or obese, compared with 28 percent nationwide. Since 2005, Missouri has moved from ninth to eighth in the country in obesity rates among high school students, a survey by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention found.

Health officials say the state's rise in the obesity rankings is a dangerous trend that puts the health and well-being of Missourians at great risk.

"Childhood obesity is a public health crisis," said Margaret Donnelly, director of the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services. "Community leaders can help by making sure that young people have places where they can be physically active. Parents can help by making fruits, vegetables and other healthy foods easily available. Only when we have environments that support healthy living will we start to reverse this epidemic."

To call attention to the nation's obesity epidemic, Congress earlier this year designated September 2010 as the first National Childhood

Obesity Awareness Month.

The American Medical Association estimates that more than 23 million children and teenagers nationwide are overweight or obese. Health experts say efforts to prevent obesity must start early before unhealthy habits are formed.

"Childhood Obesity Awareness Month supports the goals of families, schools and communities that are working to raise a healthier generation," Donnelly said. "If we keep our kids healthy now and prevent childhood obesity, we will alleviate a major burden on our health care system while giving millions of young people the opportunity to live longer, healthier lives."

Families are urged to focus on helping their children to establish lifelong healthy habits by eating balanced meals and snacks and participating regularly in physical activity. New mothers can reduce the risk of their children becoming obese by breastfeeding. Studies show that the longer that babies are breastfed, the lower their odds of becoming overweight as teens or adults.

"The early period of life – including the prenatal months and infancy to age 5 – is a key time to prevent childhood obesity," said Pat

Simmons, nutrition specialist with the state health department. "If we can reduce childhood obesity, we will eventually reduce obesity in adults."

Research has found that a mother's diet and weight gain during pregnancy could influence her child's risk for obesity and other chronic diseases later in life. Infant and toddler feeding practices have also been shown to affect a child's weight status.

"It is much easier to prevent obesity than to try to treat it," Donnelly said.

Obese young people have an 80 percent chance of becoming obese adults. As a result, they are at greater risk for developing health problems in adulthood, including heart disease, diabetes, sleep apnea, stroke, several types of cancer and arthritis.

Each year, obesity costs Missouri nearly \$2 billion in direct medical costs alone. About nine percent of total medical costs in America are due to obesity related illnesses.

Northwest Missouri Transition Fair to be held in Maryville

The Community Transition Team (CTT) was established in August, 2009, through a grant awarded to the Area Cooperative for Educational Support (ACES). Six core members were asked to attend training sessions and establish goals for the team. Throughout the 2009-2010 school year, the team met regularly and expanded to include several agencies and school personnel from area co-op schools. The goal of the team is to improve transition outcomes for students as they move from special services within the schools to community living. The group hopes to improve graduation rates, post-secondary training/education, employment rates, and community living skills for students with disabilities of all levels. The group recently participated in the Back to School Fairs held in all eight counties served by ACES. These include Andrew, Holt, Atchison, Nodaway, Worth, Gentry, Daviess, and DeKalb.

One way the team hopes to improve these outcomes is by providing information and resources to those in need of services. The Northwest Missouri Community Transition Team will be hosting a Transition

Fair for students, parents, school personnel, agencies, and interested community members on Wednesday, October 6, from 4:30-6:30 p.m. This event will be held at Maryville, MO, High School in the commons area. Exhibitors will be presenting who can provide information on services available to those in ACES' twenty-one school districts. Exhibitors at this time include NOCO-MO, Community Services, MERIL, Missouri Protection and Advocacy, Maryville Chamber of Commerce, MPACT, Missouri Connections, Maryville Parks & Rec, Albany Regional Center, Vocational Rehabilitation, Department of Mental Health, Northwest Tech School, North Central Community College, Iowa Western Community College, VR Services for the Blind, and others. These exhibitors will be available from 4:30 to 6:30 p.m.

The Community Transition Team also wants to provide more specific information on topics that have been identified as necessary to parents and students. The Office of Civil Rights will give a presentation on the differences between the rights of students in high school and post-secondary

educational settings. Missouri Protection and Advocacy will present information on guardianship and conservatorship. MPACT will make a presentation on special education transition laws. These presentations will run concurrently from 4:30-5:15 p.m. and again from 5:30-6:15 p.m.

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Fall turkey hunting and safety tips

Fall turkey hunting, firearms and archery, is very different from the spring hunt. During the fall, there is little or no gobbling activity and gobblers are in small flocks, 3 to 10 birds, while hens and young of the year are together in large flocks, 10 to 20 birds. It is not unusual to find two to three hens together with all of their young.

The basic strategy for fall turkey hunting is to find and break up a flock, scattering them in all directions. Then, locate yourself near the spot where you broke up the flock and wait about 15 minutes. Gobblers can be called back by using clucks and coarse yelps. Hens and young birds can be called back using hen yelps or kee-kee run calls. Young birds usually will return within an hour while an old gobbler may take 3 or 4 hours. Hens and their young tend to vocalize a lot as they return. Old gobblers will usually return silently.

As you can see, the fall turkey hunt could be a good time to get that youngin' out who always wants to go hunting. Between walking to find the birds, scaring the birds away, and the potential short wait for the birds to come back, there is always something to keep the youngster's active mind and body busy.

While you are walking through the woods looking for that flock of turkeys, the opportunity may arise

for you to shoot a turkey in flight or running through the woods. This is not recommended for several reasons. First, you don't have time to positively identify your target. Second, the chances are slim to none of getting the desirable quick, clean kill. You will most likely only injure the bird, or surrounding birds because by the time you get a shot off, all you are able to see are tail feathers and the bottom of their feet. And third, you will have a better story to tell your friends if you have a little patience and wait for the turkeys to come back.

Fall turkey hunting can be an extremely enjoyable experience. The sight and sounds of 20 to 30 turkeys returning to you from all directions can be as exciting as calling in a spring gobbler. However, the fall firearms turkey season has the potential to be more dangerous than the spring because either sex may be hunted. Therefore, hunters are less likely to positively identify their target. Remember to follow the basic rules of safe turkey hunting.

A hunter orange band, wrapped around the bird to keep its wings from flopping, helps make your walk out of the woods a safer one. If you don't want to make or purchase an alert band, try using a hunter orange vest. A little precaution may keep your bird from being shot a second time - and you with it.

Regional council provides career assistance, training for northwest Missouri

With unemployment rates on the rise, more northwest Missourians are finding themselves "in-between careers" for the first time in many years. Often times, those starting a new job hunt find that their skills and training no longer align with the demands of today's dynamic workplaces. Fortunately, job seekers in Atchison, Gentry, Holt, Nodaway, and Worth counties have a resource to redevelop job skills and find challenging, family-supporting careers – the Northwest Missouri Regional Council of Governments.

As northwest Missouri's federally-designated Economic Development District, the Regional Council has operated some form of workforce development program for over twenty years. Tye Parsons, director of the Regional Council, talked about the importance of having an adequately-trained workforce. "Workforce development is a key component to all forms of economic development; really, it's the third leg of a three-legged stool. The other two parts – infrastructure and financing – really don't mean much if you don't have a pool of potential skilled employees to fill positions created by a new business or industry," said Parsons.

Funding for Missouri's workforce development programs comes primarily from two sources. The Missouri Department of Economic Development, Division of Workforce Development, is responsible for implementing federal Workforce Investment Act (WIA) programs designed to train or retrain a region's workforce. In May, 2010, the Regional Council was awarded the Next Generation Career Center contract for northwest Missouri, which reinvents Missouri's delivery of workforce development programs. "Through the Next Generation Career Center model, we are now able to offer more opportunities for job seekers to improve or gain new skills, which increases their employability," stated Kim Mildward, Director of Workforce Development for the Regional Council.

"A typical visit includes meeting with a workforce specialist to discuss their unique situation and developing a plan to assist them with getting back to work or preparing for a better job. Services available range from learning how to type to preparing for interviews, career guidance and assistance with finding resources to pay for training," continued Mildward.

The second workforce development program operated by the Regional Council is Missouri Work Assistance (MWA) (formerly the Career Assistance Program), administered by the Missouri Department of Social Services, Division of Family Services. The MWA bid, which was just awarded to the Regional Council September 16, provides basic resources for those trying to re-enter the job marketplace. "The Missouri Work Assistance program is an opportunity for individuals receiving welfare to improve their skills and enter the workforce. An individual can only receive welfare from the state for 60 months in their lifetime. Through MWA the individual has an opportunity to gain work experience and training and hopefully increase their family income and leave welfare," stated Mildward.

The Regional Council operates both the Next Generation Career Center and Missouri Workforce Assistance programs from two

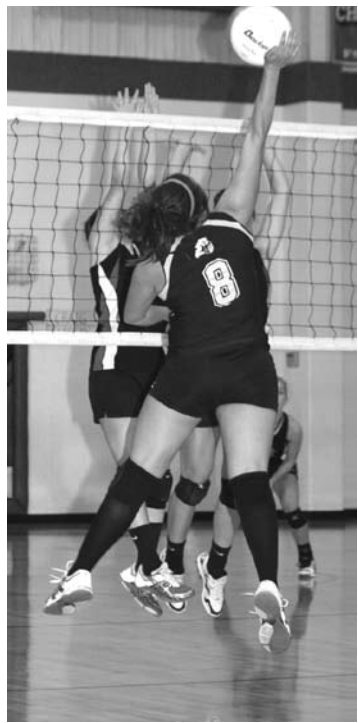

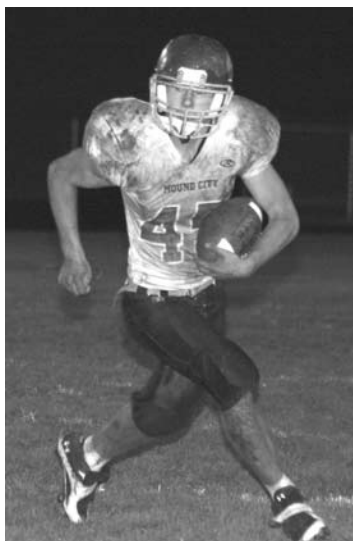
The top two two-person teams' scores were combined for a four-person team score. The Savannah team finished first with a 164 and the Maryville team finished second with a 165.

Household Hazardous Waste and Electronics Waste Collection to be held October 9

The Northwest Missouri Regional Council of Governments announces a Household Hazardous Waste and Electronics Waste (HHW/E-waste) Collection to be held Saturday, October 9, 2010, in Nodaway County. The collections are open to residents of Atchison, Gentry, Holt, Nodaway and Worth counties only.

On Saturday, October 9, 2010, the Nodaway County HHW/E-waste Collection will be held from 8 a.m. until noon at the Nodaway County Maintenance Barn located at 1516 E. Halsey, Maryville, MO.

There is a variety of acceptable wastes that will be collected at the event. Examples of Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) are: fertilizers and pesticides, household chemicals (bleach, ammonia, cleaners), batteries, CFL bulbs, mercury, antifreeze, paint, and varnish. Do not mix HHW together; keep HHW in original packaging. Examples of E-waste to be collected are: computer monitors, computer hard drives, computer accessories, fax machines, televisions, microwaves, and cell phones. Changes in policies have been enacted this year disallowing motor oil, syringes, prescription medicines, compressed gas cylinders, smoke detectors, commercial waste, radioactive waste, explosive waste and unknown wastes. For a complete listing of acceptable wastes please visit www.nwmorcog.org. On the website there will also be proper disposal techniques described to dispose of the unacceptable wastes.

Minimal fees will apply for proper disposal of waste to help offset the high costs of recycling and proper disposal –

1. Each participant must pay \$5 to dispose of HHW.
2. Each participant is allowed one of the following: TV, computer monitor or microwave free of charge. Additional quantities of these items require a \$5 per unit fee. All other E-waste is free of charge.

Both collections are open to residents of Atchison, Gentry, Holt, Nodaway, and Worth counties. Photo identification is required. Businesses are not eligible for the program and are subject to the rules established by the

Missouri Statutes regarding HHW/E-waste Disposal.

Jerry Stanfill, Solid Waste Planner for the Northwest Missouri Regional Council of Governments, emphasizes that, “Special collections are vital for our region because a typical home can contain many types of household hazardous products and electronic waste. In northwest Missouri there is no permanent facility that can handle the household chemicals that are collected during the one-day event in Maryville. The closest facility for residents to properly dispose of household hazardous waste is in the Kansas City Metro and disposal fees are charged.”

Hazardous products are used for cleaning, painting, beautifying, lubricating and disinfecting the house, yard, workshop and garage. The average American home accumulates 100 pounds of hazardous products by storing it in their basements, closets and garages. The health of our community and the environment is endangered when these types of products are discarded in storm drains, household garbage, or sinks.

In 2007, the amount of electronic waste discarded such as TVs, computers, peripherals (including printers, scanners, faxes), mice, keyboards and cell phones totaled about 2.5 million tons. The quantity of electronic waste that is being generated is steadily increasing. Lead, mercury, cadmium and brominated flame retardants are among the substances of concern in electronics. These substances are included in the products for important performance characteristics, but can cause problems if the products are not properly managed at end of life.

The collection is sponsored by County Commissions and the Northwest Missouri Regional Council of Governments and is funded by a grant through the Missouri Department of Natural Resources and the Northwest Missouri Regional Solid Waste Management District. Congress declared National Adult Education and Family Literacy Week

According to the latest national survey of adults, over 93 million American adults have Basic or Below Basic literacy skills that limit their ability to advance at work and in education, help their children with school work, interact with their health care professionals and participate in their communities.

Family literacy programs serve parents and their young children, teaching basic skills, English as a Second Language, and parenting skills to the adults while the children are provided high quality preschool programming. These programs are focused on breaking the cycles of low literacy, low education and poverty. More information about family literacy programs is available at the National Center for Family Literacy, a NCL member, at <http://www.familit.org/>.

In Holt County, there is an estimated 9% rate of low literacy. The Northwest Missouri AEL program is working to change that. The Northwest program serves, not only Holt County, but also Gentry, Worth, Nodaway and Atchison counties. Classes are offered in Grant City, Albany, Stanberry, Tarkio, Mound City and Maryville.
